CUB CREWS FURROW CHARLES TOMORROW

Freshman Races Openers For Technology's Crew Season—Two Prep Schools Will Furnish Opposition

FROSH CHOOSE CAPTAIN

Though the first race of the season for the freshman crews is but one day off, the make up of the first eight still remains a mystery to all except perhaps Pat Manning, the coach, on this subject, and he is maintaining the silence of a sphinx. As a result of the election held yesterday at the boat house, the yearlings have chosen E. P. Dunleavy, who stroked the Field Day combination to captain them.

In the races which will be run off tomorrow on the Charles River Basin over a course laid between the Harvard and Cottage Farm bridges, the 1924 oarsmen will give battle to Huntington, against whom they will enter their first octet, and Brown and Nichols, whom they will meet in their first and second fours. The contests are called for 3.30 o'clock; the direction in which the boats will head and consequently, the position of the finish of the contest will depend entirely upon weather conditions.

Dunleavy is Cox

Ed. Dunleavy, henceforth leader of the yearling oarsmen, gained his first experience with the sweeps at Tabor Academy, where he prepped for Technology. During his last year there he stroked the four on which he rowed. Last fall, Pat Manning put him in as stroke of the frosh crew, and he rowed at this position on Field Day, and has usually been seated at number 8 during the practice spins this spring. Dun has not confined his attention to the water sport, this winter becoming one of the freshman assistant stage managers for Tech Show. He hails from Neponsit, Long Island, N. Y.

Shifts in Varsity

Though pretty well occupied recently in making his selections for the frosh boats, Technology's crew mentor has not neglected to shift about the men of the Varsity crews in an endeavor to obtain the best possible combination. The two latest substitutions in the first Varsity shell consist of Sayre for the position of number 6, which last year was held by Bryden, and Keane for coxswain. Like all other changes that Pat has made in the arrangement of the crew this spring, these substitutions merely emphasize the fact that the seating of the first eight is still in the experimental stage.

First Race Two Weeks Off

The first race for the Cardinal and Gray rowers is still two weeks off, and Pat expects to make the most of the time at his disposal in developing a well balanced crew. With five men including Bryden, Driscoll, Davidson, Jakobson and Woodruff, who were seated in last year's Varsity boat facing the possibility of losing their places in the first shell, the competition between the men is waxing hot and furious, thus tending to make it all the more difficult to detect any marked superiority on the part of any of the individual candidates.

The frosh crews as they will ship tomorrow will look as follows: first four: bow, Eton; 2, Thomas; 3, Prouty; 4, Dunleavy, and coxswain, Reid; second four: bow, Murdock; 2, Rousseau; 3, Ames; 4, Gratewood and coxswain, Taylor.

PLAY WORCESTER

Will Meet Academy Team Tomorrow

Thirteen Players and coach Sherman will leave the South Station tomorrow at 12.30 o'clock, for Worcester, to meet Worcester Academy in a battle on the diamond. The game will start as soon after 2.30 o'clock as possible.

Not the least discouraged by the defeat last week at Franklin, the Technology team has been practicing hard. In an informal game last Wednesday with the Institute employees, the frosh cleaned up all honors. Canfield took the mound during most of the game. No comparison can be made of Worcester's team to the Beaver Cubs' nine, as this is the first year of the latter's existence. Little Sharkey has proved his worth at 2nd, and Ayles has recovered from injuries in his neck enough to be able to play at shortstop.

Worcester is well known for sportsmanship, and hospitality, and assistant managers will meet the Technology men to take them to the school. A list of those taking the trip will be posted on the main bulletin board. The first home game will be with Wentworth on May 4th.

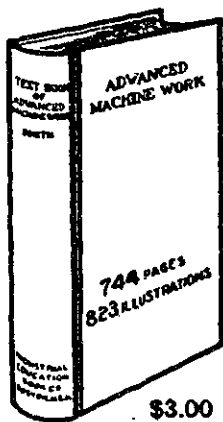
