

UNDERGRADUATES TO REGISTER NOW FOR COMING FALL TERM

Material Has Been Distributed to Sophomores and Freshmen—Juniors Will Get Theirs Monday

COMPLETE BEFORE OCTOBER

Registration for the fall term began last Wednesday when material was distributed to the Sophomores and freshmen. This work is now being carried on in order to expedite matters so that there will no longer be a large number of students trying to register at the beginning of the term. The plan was formulated at the earlier part of the year to meet just this need, since the student body had grown so large.

Material Distributed at Classes

The material for the class of 1924 distributed at the military exercises the freshmen is to be filled out and returned at the next following exercise. Students who did not take military science are to report to one of the classes in order to get this material.

The Sophomores also received the books at military science and the same regulation as to students not taking this course holds for them as for the freshmen.

APPROVE NEW POINT SYSTEM FOR 1921-22

Institute Committee Presents Revised Schedule at Yesterday's Meeting—Tech Night Committee Appointed

POINT LIST COMPLETE

At the meeting of the Institute Committee yesterday afternoon in the faculty room of Walker, the revised point system for next year was presented and accepted. In making this revision, the Point System Committee sent out about thirty letters to the various Technology organizations asking them to submit the number of points they thought should go with each job in their activity. With this data, the committee made the changes. Where the changes were made they went over them with the head of the activity affected, so these changes are as exact as it is possible to make them. Points will be rigidly enforced. No changes can be made in the points until the end of next year, when another revision can be made, if necessary.

The New Point System

Next year's Tech Night Committee was appointed, consisting of Charles E. Brokaw '22, H. J. Horn '22, and J. C. Willson '23.

The following men were absent from this meeting: G. Bawden '22, K. R. Sutherland '22, A. J. Browning '22, W. K. Ramsey '21, H. Kirkham '23, A. J. Wescott '23, and A. J. Kemp '24. Bowers and Lindsley were late.

The Point System which has just been revised, is an institution which aims to prevent a student from carrying too much outside work to the detriment of his studies and to enable more men to take part in student activities. Each office and activity is assigned a definite number of points, and no man is allowed to carry more than a total of ten points; excepting that a man may compete on an athletic team or be a member of the musical clubs other than managing even when such participation given him is more than ten points.

The system was put in operation by the Institute Committee in the fall of 1908 and is enforced by the Point System Committee.

A man may not resign from a position without election position to accept a subsequent position.

A man on Institute Committee by virtue of some other office which he holds, shall have only the points attached to that office provided they exceed or equal 5; otherwise he shall have 5 points only as attached to Institute Committee membership.

Technology and Boston College Favorites—Dandrow Will Find Little Competition—Buker Brothers Favored in Distances

MEET WILL FEATURE MANY CHAMPIONS

Tech field will be the scene of the New England Intercollegiate today and tomorrow. The trial heats of the meet will be run off today, leaving all the final events for tomorrow. New England colleges will enter athletes in the meets. Those institutions that are to participate in the meet are Amherst, Bates, Boston College, Bowdoin, Brown, Colby, Holy Cross, Mass. Aggies, Middlebury, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, New Hampshire State, Trinity University of Maine, Wesleyan, Williams, and Worcester Academy.

AWARD INSIGNIA AT ATHLETIC BANQUET

Dean Burton, Kanaly, Dr. Rowe and Dr. Rockwell Speak—Spring Meet Winners Get Cups—Russell Toastmaster

SPECIAL AWARDS OF "T"

The first athletic banquet held by the M. I. T. A. A. was given in the main hall of Walker last Tuesday evening at 6:30 o'clock. There were about two hundred men in athletics, and men interested in athletics at Technology, present.

After the eating was over, Bill Russell, as toastmaster, presented the Dean, who spoke on the history of athletics at the Institute. Dr. Burton divided this history into three ages. The Stone Age, when "the softest place in the Institute was Rogers' steps," the Barbaric Age, when activity in athletics was fierce and wild, and the later period of more or less regulated activity.

Sorry to Lose Dean

Frank Kanaly, the track coach, was the next speaker. He said that the one sad thing in his mind about the banquet was that it would be the last at which the Dean would be present. He praised the support that Dr. Burton had given athletics and said that he would be much missed on the Athletic Advisory Council. He also told of the help that Major Briggs had rendered to Institute athletic activities.

Dr. Rowe, who spoke next, told of the work that the advisory council had been doing. He said that the present gymnasium was inadequate for the needs of the various teams. He voiced the hope that in the near future we might get a distinctly athletic building, with a large gymnasium and swimming pool. He called attention to the fact that the Institute was maintaining all its athletics on about \$8,000 a year in contrast to some of the larger colleges that spend several hundred thousand dollars, for about the same thing.

Dr. Rockwell Makes Awards

Before the awards were made by Dr. Rockwell, Frank Gage added an important bit to the evening's program with several of his well-known selections.

Then Dr. Rockwell, with a brief prologue in which he said that the "T" was a high athletic honor and hard to win, and that the athletic council had no intention of making it less so, read off the names of the men by teams, each member standing up as his name was called and remaining standing until the entire team was up, when the captain or manager went forward to get the certificates of award. As the names were read, there was much applause.

Silver cups were presented to winners of events in the spring interclass meet. In previous years, there have been cups for only three events, but this year by enlarging the list of donors, cups were obtained for all events.

Technology, the winner of the meet for the past four years, will find that they will have to show all the speed they have to repeat their performance this year. Boston College will be represented by their Olympic star, Driscoll, who is slated to win the 440. They also have an exceptional hurdler in Sullivan. The meet will be a tough fight between all the colleges entered but B. C. and Technology look like the high scorers.

Many Stars in 440

The quarter mile promises to be a fast and exciting race. Driscoll, the Boston College champion, will again wear the colors of the college on the heights, and he looks like a winner as far as paper calculations go. Forstall of Brown placed second in the event last year and he will be back again running for the Bruins. Stibson of Wesleyan and Maher of Holy Cross are two other men who have been doing some good running this year.

The two best Technology entries will be Ollie Bards and Mich Bawden. Both of these men ran strong races against Dartmouth last Saturday. One or both of them are likely to break into the scoring column tomorrow.

Mile Will Be Fast

From the list of entries in the mile, Carol Stone and Elmer Sancier will find a powerful field against them. Both of the Institute runners are fast men and will give the rest of the field a good run.

Bates College has two brothers who should show the spectators some record-breaking time. Raymond and Richard Buker are entered in the half mile, the mile, and the two mile. Whichever races they are entered in, they look like winners. Raymond Buker is the man who put up such a plucky race and finally won the International two mile at the Penn Games last month. He will be entered in the two mile, but just which race his brother will run in is doubtful.

Beside Buker, Captain Billy MacMahon will have Crofts of Williams, who placed in the event last year, Goodwin of Bowdoin, and Leath of New Hampshire State in the field against him. All these men are good, but Billy MacMahon rules a favorite for the second honors.

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Oarsmen Row Harvard in Last Regatta of Season

Technology's Crews Meet Crimson on the Charles Tomorrow
Afternoon—Broken Oar Causes Defeat by Union Boat Club

FRESHMEN BEATEN BY HARVARD '24

Technology will bring its crew season to a close tomorrow with a race against Harvard over a 1.78 mile course on the Charles. Both the Varsity and Junior Varsity boats are entered. From the point of view of victory and defeat, the Institute oarsmen have thus far broken about even.

However, the race against Union Boat Club, which the Varsity dropped Tuesday can hardly be taken as a criterion, for the Engineers rowed practically the entire course with one oar, the other sweep having snapped off on the fifteenth stroke.

In the second start, necessitated by the breaking of McCurdy's oar, Union won the first ten strokes, but showed its speed in getting under way and had a small advantage when Valentine's oar, at 6, snapped at the rigging. Since the contest was well under way, the crews could not be called back again.

Row With Seven Oars

From this point on, Technology is fighting a desperate battle against terrific odds, for besides losing the power from 6, Valentine merely added to the dead weight of the oar, and Chub Davidson had to put further drag on the boat by pulling the rudder to one side in order to keep a straight course.

The club men finished four lengths behind the lead, most of which was gained at the end of the race. The time, 8 minutes 54 seconds was slow for the crew.

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RADIO CLUB ELECTS

New Officers Announced at Final Meeting of Year

The new officers for the coming year were announced last night at the meeting of the Radio Society. They comprise the following men: President, F. D. Webster '22, Vice-president Edmund Bruce '24, and Treasurer Weeks '24. There was a close contest for the position of treasurer and only after the last vote came in just before the meeting, was the position decided. The officers-elect made short speeches which were well received. The secretary was appointed by the president, R. S. Hays '22 being chosen.

The president and vice-president were elected to represent the Institute station in the new radio organization of Boston and vicinity, namely: the Greater Boston Council.

Describes Making of Apparatus

The chief speaker of the evening was Mr. Richmond, of the General Radio Company. He went into detail of the work of the company and its experiments on the continuous waves recently performed there. He told of the difficulties of the manufacturing of apparatus on account of the rapid advancement of wireless telegraphy and the uselessness of patenting new improvements.
