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ACTIVITIES PASS ON PROPOSED STUDENT TAX RAISE AT ONCE

General Ballot Impossible This
Term—Plan to Put Measure
in Effect in Fall Term—1925
First Class Affected

WILL BENEFIT ATHLETICS

A new student tax of \$5 per man, passed upon by the Institute Committee at its last meeting, which if approved will become effective next fall, will relieve the financial strain placed at present upon the managers of the various teams.

At least so says C. E. Brokaw '22, treasurer of the Institute Committee, chairman of the Budget Committee, and President of the T. A. C. The measure will now go before the activities, as there is not time enough left this term to put it up to a vote by the whole student body. It is expected that the activities will write letters commending the proposed tax, so that it may become effective next fall.

The present rate is wholly inadequate for the expenses of Institute athletics. This can readily be seen when it is considered that Technology had only five or six teams to support when the tax was started, against the present 18.

Also, the cost of supporting teams on the field, particularly railroad fares, which is one of the most important expenses incurred by competing teams, has more than doubled.

Success Depends on Second Teams
Out of the present student tax 73 cents is given each class for its banquet, smoker and the like. This is now all turned over to help support athletics, and still there has never been money enough to pay for second teams or coaches.

Success in athletics in any college is largely dependent on second teams for in these seemingly unimportant squads is developed the material for the varsities.

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HARVARD OUTGOLFED 9-0 BY TECHNOLOGY

JUNIOR OARSMEN ROW DEAD HEAT ON RIVER

Varsity Puts Up Game Race but Loses to Crimson's First Eight—Rough Water Causes Late Start of Races

FRESHMEN LOSE BY FOUR FEET

Harvard's junior varsity struck a snag Saturday afternoon when they ran up against the Institute's juniors. Over the Charlesbank one and seven-eighths mile course, a seemingly beaten eight at the halfway mark, the Technology crew came up from the ruck and crossed the finish line neck and neck with their rivals.

The varsity did not fare so well at the hands of the Crimson's best, losing over the same course by three lengths. Harvard was good, their new stroke, Appleton, apparently being the solution of their problem.

The Institute's oarsmen rowed in good form throughout, but were out-classed. Harvard started fast and led all the way. The time, 9 minutes and 59 seconds, was excellent, considering the conditions.

Although those who were sweltering in the hot sun may not have realized it, there was a varying breeze which kicked up quite a sea in the basin. The first race, between Harvard and Yale class crews, did not start until 5 o'clock, the junior varsities rowed next, so the varsities were not able to get under way until almost 7 o'clock. Harvard Bridge was literally black with spectators, and a long line of machines followed the progress of the race along the bank.

The surprise of the regatta was sprung by the junior oarsmen. Using a slow stroke from the start, Technology was about three-quarters of a length to the bad when Harvard Bridge was reached, but then things began to happen. Without quickening the stroke but putting every bit of strength into each pull, the Institute's shell began to creep up little by little, and finally gained a slight advantage. Technology Gathers in 46 Points by Scoring in All But Three Events—Boston College and Williams Take Second and Third

Technology, with some points in every event except the low hurdles, the 220 and the running broad jump, easily ran away with the New England Intercollegiate meet Saturday when the Engineers rolled up a total of 46 points, just double the number taken by Boston College, which placed second. The Beavers came through with three firsts in the field and one on the track.

Williams Takes Third

Boston College came second with 23 points to its credit. Driscoll was the high point winner of the meet, giving his Alma Mater a first in the 220 and the same in the 440. Williams just trailed the Boston team with 21 counts.

The Beavers pulled a surprise when they took 9 points in the pole vault. Sheldon easily ran off with first honors when he cleared the bar at 11 feet 6 inches. Phil Stearns and Al Fletcher tied with Chapin of Williams for the second place.

Bawden Breaks Field Record

Mich Bawden succeeded in lowering the Tech Field record in the half mile when he covered the distance in 1 minute 57 seconds, one-fifth of a second better than the former time. His running in this race was one of the thrills of the afternoon. King of Holy Cross won the event last year and started the race Saturday, as though he wanted to win it again. At the end of the first quarter, he was leading the Institute runner by three yards. Bawden waited until he had rounded the last corner and then cut loose with his final sprint, which finally gave him a lead of nine yards when he broke the tape.

Driscoll Stars in 440

Jake Driscoll was the only man to break a N. E. I. A. A. record in the meet. He lowered the old mark of 49 and 3-5 seconds, for the quarter, set by Lester of Williams back in 1911, when he did the distance in 2-5 second less. His new mark equals the Tech Field record. Ollie Barden, of Technology followed him in and took a clean second.
