Make Report on Finance

Any man desiring information concerning the expenditure of the student tax can obtain full information by applying to the Institute Committee.

Furthermore, when the new tax becomes effective, it is proposed that a complete report be made and printed as a supplement to the report now made by the president and the Bursar's office, of the finance of all the student activities and this will be available to all students desiring such information.

The allotments at present are: Classes \$.75, athletics \$2.50, Institute Committee \$.17, Walker Memorial \$4.00, health service \$1.00, and the reserve contingent \$.60. Under the new tax the allotments will be: Classes \$.75, athletics \$8.50, Institute Committee \$.20, Walker Memorial \$4.00, health service \$1.00 and reserve contingent \$.55.

New Freshmen First Hit

The tax, if carried, will not apply to the freshman class of this year, but will first affect the incoming freshmen next fall.

INTERCOLLEGIATE NOTES

A Senior honorary society has been formed at the Sibley School of Mechanical Engineering of Cornell University. This society, which will be known as Atmos, was formed under the leadership of Professor H. Dedrichs, and 18 charter members were chosen at the first meeting. The purpose of the Society is: To serve Cornell University at all times and as efficiently as possible to serve Sibley School of Mechanical Engineering by supporting all of its worthy movements, and by inaugurating and advancing anything that may benefit the school, to promote closer relations between the Faculty and the students, and also unite its members in the interests of good-fellowship.

Public School teachers and college professors today who protest against the low wages paid to members of their profession, should take hope and be thankful that they do not fall in the same class with Adam Roelantsen, first school teacher of the Island of Manhattan, whose salary was so small that he was compelled to take in washing in order to subsist, or in the same class with Evert Pietersen, the last man to teach under the Dutch rule who received \$15 a month in his pay envelope, with an extra compensation of \$60 a year for board.—The New York University News.

In connection with the Commencement, June 22, Dr. James Rowland Angell's inauguration as President of Yale University will take place after the degree of Doctor of Laws has been conferred on him. Dr. Chittenden, of the Sheffield Scientific School, Senior Dean of the University, will deliver an address of welcome on the part of the faculties, and President Hadley will induct Dr. Angell, who will make a brief inaugural speech.

A point system has recently been adopted at the Carnegie Institute of Technology as a solution of the problem of regulating the extent to which a man may participate in activities. Ten points is the highest number allotted to any single position, this number being for presidents of the different organizations and for the Editor-in-Chief of the "Tartan." Not more than 20 points will be allowed; but special permission may be granted a man in athletics to carry one position besides the sports. An interesting feature of the plan is the provision that two points are required as a minimum for graduation.

Negotiations begun last July have resulted in a tentative agreement for a tennis match to be played between the combined Oxford-Cambridge and Harvard-Yale teams on July 4 and 5, at Longwood Cricket Club at Chestnut Hill.

Plans for the organization of a Student Court are being drawn up by the older men at the University of Virginia, to handle petty offenses not considered breaches of the honor code, yet deserving of censure, suspension or expulsion, as an act that brings discredit or disrepute to the name of the University.

One of the chief promulgators of the court, J. A. Steward, attended the Intercollegiate Conference here, and secured the advice of delegates on what brings discredit or disrepute on involving honor.

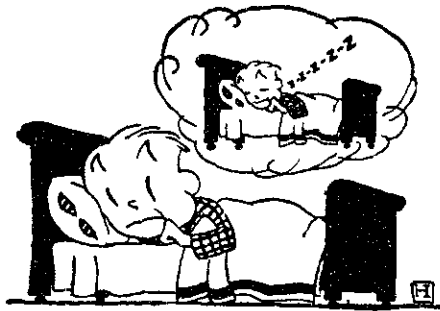
The 36th annual conference of eastern college students will be held at Silver Bay, Lake George, from June 24 to July 3. BUSINESS STUDENTS REGISTER

The Harvard Graduate Business School has received to date 150 applications for admission to the first year class of the school for next year. The requirements for admission for this group were unchanged last year except the requirement of a registration fee of \$10. Applications from now on, however, must be accompanied by a complete transcript of the man's college record and the school reserves the right to reject any applicant.

At this time last year no formal applications for admission to the Business School had been received, and yet at the opening of the school year in the fall over 300 men were enrolled in the first year class. The faculty of the Business School has voted to limit the first year class to 300 in order that the quality of the instruction may not be impaired by large numbers and that no more men may be admitted than can be taken care of. Notwithstanding the increase in the tuition fee of the Business School to \$400 next year, applications have

been received which more than half fill next year's first-year class. If applications continue to come in at the current rate, registration probably will be closed about Commencement Week.
