## DEHYDRATED FOOD AND CLOTHES TESTS EXPLAINED AT MEETING

Professors Address American Chemical Society Gathering

The regular meeting of the American Chemical Society was held in Walker last Friday evening. The meeting had been announced as a ladies' night. About 400 people were present. They heard Professor Millard of the chemistry department speak on "Chemistry in a Clothing Store," and Professor Prescott of the Department of Biology and Public Health, on "Dehydrated Foods." Moving pictures of the Amoskeag Mills were exhibited and explained.

Professor Millard's talk was in the nature of a description of the tests used to determine the quality of a material, as used in one of the biggest retail stores in Boston. He explained the test used for finding the percentage of wool, cotton, and silk; tests on the wearing quality of the material and on the fastness to washing, light and perspiration. He told of the microscopic examination to find shoddy, and the methods used to separate cotton from linen, and wool from camels-hair.

Professor Prescott spoke on the work of his department on the use and development of dehydrated vegetables. Most of his talk was on the subject of dehydrated foods. He told of the history of food drying, and said that it had been known for hundreds of years. He told of the various methods of drying now in use: the tunnel system, the kiln system, the vacuum process, and by the use of special machines. He then went on to explain the advantages of dehydration, with the loss in weight and bulk, and in its stabilization of crops, and the conservation of food materials. He closed with the statement that dehydration was still in its infancy, but is expected to increase after certain problems have been solved.

Students who have failed to return their manual of interior Guard will return those at the same time.

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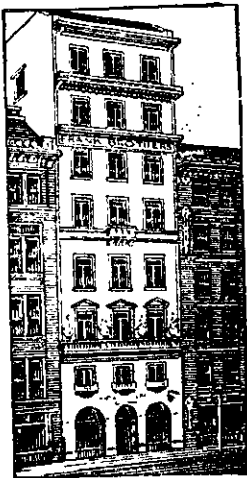
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
