Governor Cox and President Lowell to Make Addresses—Acting President Thomson Will Preside

Fourth Musical Club Will Use Only Classical Numbers

The recent intercollegiate conference on dramatics and musical clubs brought out the fact that there was need for a college glee club which could sing only classical music, light opera and similar types of compositions. At a conference of the general managers of the musical clubs with the Alumni advisors of the clubs yesterday morning, it was decided that such an organization would be formed at Technology and it will become the fourth member of the Combined Musical Clubs. Organization plans are now being considered and the general manager presumes that all men who are interested in the proposition see him in the musical clubs' office before the end of the year, and offer suggestions. The formation of a fourth club by the Combined Musical Clubs' organization is a new move, the original club having been three in number. Other college glee clubs have been highly successful in giving only an amateur or high class program, and the opinion of the conference was that the general public was ready to support such an organization. The club will conflict in no way with the plans of the original glee club and hence there will be two glee clubs in the combined clubs next year. General Manager R. C. Rundlett said that men who had any experience in singing in choral organizations or had done work in church choirs would be especially fitted to enter the competitions which will begin in the fall at the same time as regular competitions for the other clubs.

SET JUNIOR WEEK DATES FOR 1922

Faculty Committee on Examinations and Joint Junior Week Committee Approve April 15 to 19

NOT TO COME BETWEEN TERMS

Junior Week 1922 will be held from Saturday to Wednesday, April 15 to 19, next year. This was recently decided by a joint agreement between the Faculty Committee on examinations and the Junior Week Committee of which Professor Spofford is Chairman and which is composed of representatives from the activities, the Faculty, the alumni council, and the Institute Committee. The Technique Rush will open Junior Week, as formerly, but will take place on Saturday, April 15, and will be followed by the Faculty tea dance and the fraternity dances in the afternoon and evening. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 17, 18 and 19, will be given over to the Tech Show. The Spring Concert and the Junior Prom, and other events. This action resulted from the reports to the Junior Week Committee from the activities. As the plan worked out this year, examinations in courses ending the second term were not given, but in their place 2 or 3 one hour quizzes were held, which virtually made a 9 week term. It is supposed that students were tempted not to work for the success of the 1921 plan, for fear that they would be deprived of the usual extra three days vacation usually enjoyed in April. As a result the Faculty is much gratified with the successful outcome. The program used this year originated in the fall of 1919 when the joint committee was formed to straighten out the tangle, and would have been put into effect in the spring of 1920 but it was advanced so late in the year that it was impossible for the Tech Show and the Technique to comply. Professor Pearson in commenting on the success of this year's Junior Week, said that it was "splendid work."

AVIATION UNIT ELIMINATES MEN IN PHYSICAL EXAMS

Competition Will Continue Until
Twelve Men Pass

Physical examinations for candidates for the advanced camp of the Aviation Unit are already in progress, and will be continued until twelve men have successfully met all requirements. Of the Juniors who are desirous of going to the advanced camp this summer, two have already been eliminated. Technology has been allotted twelve men to send to the training camp, and the examinations will be continued until twelve men have been accepted. In the event that any of the Juniors fail, Sophomores will be selected to fill their places. In place of the two Juniors who were disqualified, two Sophomores, R. H. Park, and A. M. Keller, have been selected as candidates. It is expected that by examining three a day, the final results will be known by June 1. The Military Science Department received from General Shanks and the other officers reviewing the freshman unit on Monday, their congratulations, to be transmitted to the freshman class, on their splendid showing.

MECHANICAL ENGINEERS AT CHICAGO CONVENTION

The American Society of Mechanical Engineers, in convention this week at Chicago, have announced the appointment of Professor W. L. Kennelly of the Institute as a member of a deputation from the four leading engineering societies of the country to visit London next month. The John medal, an American award will be presented to Sir Robert Hadfield for his invention of manganese steel. The convention is being attended by more than 1000 scientists, technologists, and educators. They have pledged the co-operation of the American Society to the engineers of Great Britain in the movement to promote the progress of mankind through a closer union of the engineers of the two nations.

Morss '93 told the shipbuilders incidents of his many experiences. Professor J. R. Jack and J. A. Bowers '22, president of the society, also spoke.

After the dinner Professor Owen spoke of the work of Professor Peabody who organized Course XIII, and regretted very much the fact that Professor Peabody was unable to attend the banquet as it had been hoped he would. Professor Jack was then introduced and spoke further of Professor Peabody. In addition Professor Jack emphasized the necessity of concise writing.

Most of the evening was spent in listening to the stories of Mr. Morss who carried his listeners through fog and spray from the coast of Nova Scotia to the Bermudas, in his tales of personal racing experiences. He told of the troubles in learning the use of the sextant, of finding his position by soundings, and of unbelievable accuracies in dead reckoning.

The attendance at the banquet numbered nearly 50. At the close of the evening a rising vote of thanks was extended Mr. Morss.

The Technology track team will enter the final meet on its schedule today and tomorrow when it competes in the annual I. C. A. A. A. Meet at the Harvard Stadium. Twenty-eight universities and colleges have entered men, comprising practically all the star athletes that this country boasts. To the winner of this meet goes the title of the college championship on the track for the year following.

Fast Field in Century

The 100 will probably show one of the fastest fields in this event that has been brought together for a long time. Gordin of Harvard has done the distance in 9.45 already this year and Maxam, who will run for Pennsylvania, has also been running the 100 in about the same time this spring. These two gathered the second and third places in this event last year and are out after honors again this time.

Lafayette will count upon Leconey to bring home some points for them. The West Coast has sent down two exceptional sprinters in Kirksey of Leland Stanford and Hutchinson of the University of California. The latter is reputed to have done the century in 9.35 seconds.

Howlett will probably be unable to run for the Institute in this meet as his foot is still lame. He has been on the sidelines for two weeks. The most probable place winners for Technology are Ted Bossert, Al Hayes, Johnny Poole and Ted Spitz.

West Sends Crack Sprinters

Kirksey of Leland Stanford and Hutchinson of California are the two best looking men in the 220-yard dash. Both of these men have done the furlong in 21 seconds and they look like the West's best bids for place winners. The best man the East can offer in this race is Maxam of the University of Pennsylvania. He has been clocked in 21 seconds more than once this year.

The entries for Technology in this event will be practically the same as their entries in the 100.
