

DANDROW TECHNOLOGY'S POSSIBLE FIRST PLACE WINNER

CORNELL CANCELS GOLF MATCH WITH INSTITUTE

Ithicans Compelled to Withdraw Challenge Owing to Sudden Sickness of Two of Their Players

MEET AMHERST AT WOODLAND

Bulletin—Cornell cancelled the golf match scheduled with Technology for this afternoon, because of the sudden sickness of two of their players, it was learned at a late hour last night.

Particular interest was attached to this match, due to the challenge having been issued by Cornell, and also to the fact that the Ithicans boast of one of the strongest golf teams in the country. In fact Cornell is listed as

one of the three best contenders in American inter-collegiate golf. The match was scheduled for 2:30 o'clock, with the following men composing the Beaver iron-handlers: H. M. Schley, 1; J. Y. Ballard, 2; Captain A. L. Johnson, 3; W. M. K. Freeman, 4; F. G. Clement, 5; and J. Duane, 6.

The match with Amherst will also be at Woodland. The team for Technology will probably consist of the first four of the above mentioned team. The men playing for Amherst are: Captain Hooker, 1, Neale, 2, Bagg, 3, and Stearns, 4, with Clapp as substitute. Hooker and Neale are veterans, Bagg, a freshman, is very good, and Stearns is a fair player.

Prime for Intercollegiates

The Institute team has aroused particular interest in golf circles this year since it has shown up so well in its matches. This was particularly the case when Harvard was beaten 9-0. Various associations and colleges have asked to meet it but the matches could not be arranged. It is the hope among New England golfers that the Technology aggregation will be a winning one at the intercollegiates which will be held at

Greenwich, Conn. the latter part of June.

The team was officially recognized by the A. A. last Tuesday. The members consisting of Schley, Ballard, Johnson, Freeman, Clement, and Duane with the manager, G. A. Midwood, were awarded g't's. J. H. Zane was elected manager for next year on account of his success in the recent competition. The captain for next year will be chosen this afternoon.

Hurdles Will be Close

Thomson, Dartmouth's champion hurdler, is generally conceded his 120-yard high hurdle event but Barron of Penn State is likely to give him some good competition. He has been clocked in 15 1-5 earlier this spring. It is in the low barrier that Barron has done his best work this year. He recently turned in a time of 24 3-5 seconds which is the best that any Easterner has done so far this season. Wells of Leland Stanford is another man who is likely to beat Thomson out in the low hurdles tomorrow.

Dandrow Will Toss Hammer

George Dandrow is Technology's most likely first place winner. He was a member of the American Olympic Team and he has been throwing the hammer a good distance all spring. In the I. C. A. A. A. Meet last year, he was the only man who could give Merchant of California, last year's winner, any competition at all.

Forecasting a winner of the meet is, at best, nothing short of wild guess-work, but there are certain teams that will finish up well, judging from their previous work this year. At present, it looks as though Cornell, Pennsylvania and California have the best scoring outfits. The University of California only brought a dozen men east with them, but all of these have enviable strings of titles connected to their names. Pennsylvania and Cornell always have had strong and well rounded teams and this year is no exception.

RIFLE TEAM LOSES MATCH WITH BOSTON UNIVERSITY

The Institute rifle team met defeat Saturday at the hands of the strong Boston University. The winning team rolled up a score of 385 out of a possible 400, while the Institute shooters could gather but 373 points. The scoring Tech men were: H. S. Rubins '23—96; P. M. Johnson '21—95; S. Hall '22—91; G. E. Dean '22—91. The distances were 200 and 500 yards. At the same time they held a telegraph match with Westfield, scoring 390 out of 400 at 200 yards prone. The Westfield score has not yet been received, so the outcome of this match is yet in doubt.

An indoor match has been arranged with Cambridge University, England, to be conducted by cable. This match is to be shot the 9th of June.

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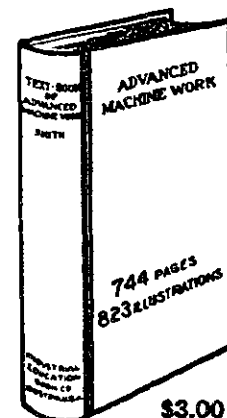
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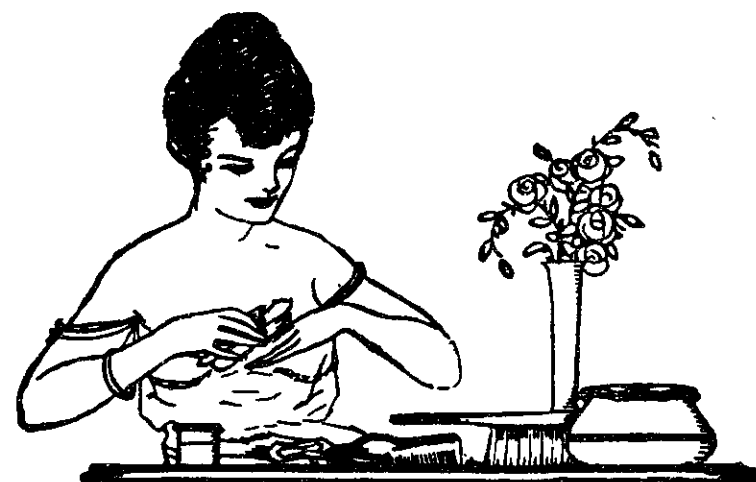
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
