

ALUMNI NOTES

CHOSEN EXCHANGE DIRECTOR

Marshall O. Leighton '96 has been made director of the Washington, D. C., office of the Engineering Business Exchange, a widely known firm which conducts the exchange of engineering and technical properties.

Mr. Leighton, who is well known to engineers in the country, has made Montclair, New Jersey, famous in sanitary circles by his original research, when he took charge of the health department in that city after his graduation. Six years later he became connected with the United States Geological Survey and did a large part of hydrographic work. He served on many government commissions including the United States Inland Water Commission and the Commission on the drainage of the Florida Everglades. For the past eight years he has been engaged in consulting engineering practice in Washington, D. C.

The engineering societies have recognized Mr. Leighton's surpassing service and have made him leader of the organization created by them for the establishing of a Federal Department of Public Works. The present determined policy to reorganize the Government business at Washington and introduce into it modern methods of efficiency has been the outcome of this work.

HONORED BY CIVIL ENGINEERS

H. W. Griswold '08, chief assistant in the engineering department of the Hartford Water Works, was elected vice-president of the Connecticut section of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Mr. Griswold has been previously connected with the army. He was first stationed at Alabama as a junior engineer in the Engineer Corps and in 1915 he became division engineer in

the Design and Division Department. At the same time he was connected with the United States Reclamation Board in Washington, in the capacity of irrigation engineer. When the war broke out, the government made him superintendent of Construction at the navy yard in Portsmouth, Virginia. He is an associate member of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Capt. Kaneko Goto '11, of the Imperial Japanese Navy, is chief of the office of the Japanese Naval Inspector in America and is stationed at New York. Captain Goto, who saw service as chief engineer for the fast destroyers of the Japanese Navy in the war, is in charge of the purchase of all material for naval armament for Japan in this country.

Kwaso Suzuki '11, has been cabled & Co., silk merchants, of which he is a member, to come from Japan for the Class of 1911 reunion. A few years ago he married one of the emperor's nieces.

CHARLES E. RICH '83

Charles E. Rich '83, an old newspaperman of Boston and New York, died at his home in Flatbush, New York at the age of 62. He studied architecture at the Institute, but soon gave this up for newspaper work. He started as a correspondent for Boston papers, then he went to New York to work on the staff of the New York World. He was connected with some of the largest dailies in New York, including "The Morning Journal," "The Record," and "The Herald." At the time of his death he was a member of the staff of the "New York Times Analyst," of which his son, E. G. Rich, is editor.

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ELECTED PRESIDENT
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F. B. Jewett '03, chief engineer of the Western Electric Company has been elected to be a vice-president and director of the company. Mr. Jewett is one of the best known telephone engineers of the country, having charge of the technical work of

the great telephone manufacturing industry.

Mr. Jewett, who was a Lieutenant-Colonel in the Signal Corps during the war and who was decorated with the Distinguished Service Medal, is a graduate of the California Institute of Technology and Chicago University, where he studied under our distinguished physicist, Professor Michelson. He received his doctor's degree at the university. He worked with the class of 1903 and then continued as instructor in electrical engineering and physics at the Institute for one year.

He has been connected with the great development and research in commercial telephones in various capacities. He is connected with the perfection of the eight gauge circuit, the phantom cable loading, the construction of the New York-Denver circuit, and the laying of the Boston to Washington underground cable. He was called to the Western Electric Company as assistant-chief-engineer. His greatest undertaking is directing the perfecting of wireless telephony.

Colonel Jewett is past vice-president and a fellow of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, a member of the National Academy of Science and is connected with various other large scientific organizations. He is author of a number of books and pamphlets on subjects dealing with telephony and has published addresses on similar subjects.

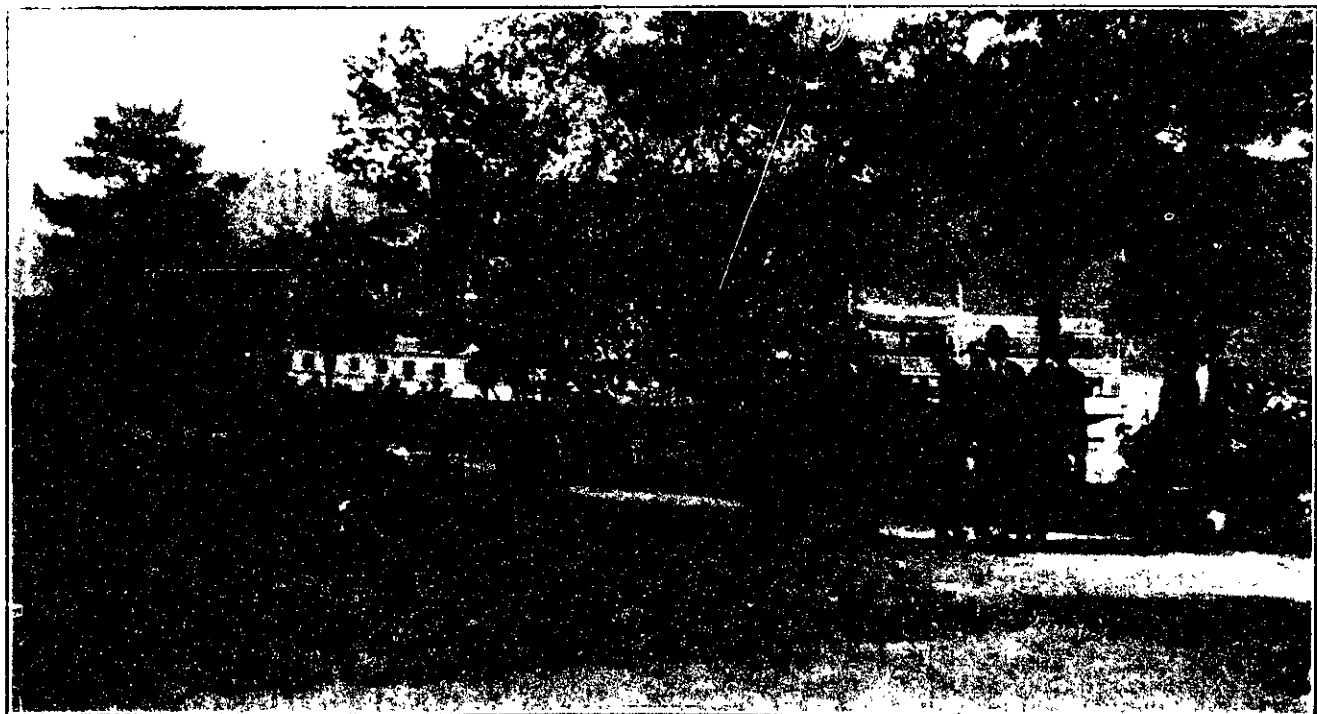
The location, on Silver Bay of Lake George, in the heart of the Adirondacks, is an ideal place for a vacation and gathering such as this.
