



AIR SERVICE EXAMS ARE FATAL TO MANY

But Two Juniors Out of Seven
Pass Physical Examination.
Those Who Fail To Take Up
Work in Other Branches

CAMP WILL LAST SIX WEEKS

The physical examinations for the Advanced Course Air Service group to train at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, have so far taken a heavy toll of the applicants, only two juniors out of seven being declared fit.

Since such a large number of the applicants for the Air Service are expected to be declared unfit, it has been decided that men failing for that branch might take up other appropriate branches, that is, other branches in which their school work has fitted them.

The schedule of work for the men to attend the coast artillery camp at Fortress Monroe, Va., has been forwarded to the local Military Science Department by the commander of the unit in the fort and includes a varied and interesting program. There will be practice in arms firing all the way from the rifle and pistol to the actual

BURSAR ADVOCATES A LARGER STUDENT TAX

If the tax is then found to be too much it may be lowered, but the money saved would do no harm in the reserve fund.

Neale won over Ballard on account of the latter's weakness in the first few holes and he piled up such a lead that the Engineer could not overtake him despite good playing during the latter half of the match. Schley of the Institute turned in the best score of the day an 81, and Ballard followed him a close second with an 84, despite the few bad holes at the start.

Freeman was a little out of form on his putting and this threw him off in his single. No advantage can be claimed that the visitors were entirely unused to the course for they had played over the course Friday, after their meet with Brown had been called off.

CHOOSE DANDROW AS NEXT TRACK CAPTAIN

Institute's Stellar Hammer
Thrower Chosen to Captain
1922 Track Team—Will Be
His Last Year

HOLDS COLLEGIATE TITLES

At a meeting of the members of this season's track team held yesterday, George Dandrow '22, of Boston, Massachusetts, was elected to captain the 1922 track team. He will be here throughout the entire year and will graduate with the class of 1922.

He has shown up as one of the foremost field athletes in college circles and has been the mainstay of the team in the field events for the past two years. In the I. C. A. A. A. meet held at the stadium, he easily lead the field of collegiate hammer throwers and it was no streak of luck that gave him the first place. Earlier in the year, he took his place as the best of all the college weight men in the 56-pound weight event at the annual Penn Relays.

Last summer, he was on the American Olympic team that went abroad to represent the United States in the 1920 Games.

Outside of being the best hammer thrower in college circles in this country today, he is a shot putter and discus thrower. He placed in both these events at the N. E. I. C. A. A. meet this spring.

CATHOLIC CLUB ANNOUNCE ELECTIONS AT DINNER

Michael Ryan Discusses Ireland at
Meeting

The Catholic Club closed the season with a dinner and meeting held in Walker last Friday evening. The results of the recent elections were announced at the dinner. Later, the club was addressed by Michael J. Ryan of Philadelphia who was one of the Americans who pleaded for a hearing of the Irish delegates by the Peace Conference. His topic was, "Ireland, An American Question."

During his speech, he declared that there could be no enduring peace until the Irish Republic had been recognized. He said that one of the most contemptible arguments against it, is that it is religious, and cited the names of many Protestant leaders in their fight for freedom. "When we entered the war," he said, "Our President declared that thereafter,

The Institute track team ended an unusually successful season last Saturday when they collected a total of ten points in the annual I.C.A.A.A. meet at the Harvard Stadium. This tied Technology with Pennsylvania State College for the eighth place in the track rating of American colleges. George Dandrow easily first in the hammer throw and both Captain Billy MacMahon and Mich Bawden placed in their events.

Two Mile Hard Fought

One of the biggest features of the meet was the two mile race. Brown of Cornell finished the eight laps in 9 minutes 32 seconds. At the crack of the starter's gun, Crofts of Williams stepped out in front but Raymond of Maine soon passed him. However, the pace was too fast for either of these New Englanders and Billy MacMahon was in the lead at the end of the first half mile.

He kept this lead and paced the field until the first lap of the second mile when Romig of Penn State caught up to him and, after running together for nearly half a lap, finally passed him. At the mile and three-quarter point, things began to develop and the fight for places started. About this time, Brown decided to speed up a little and he broke into second, running about eight yards behind the leader. Dorr of California and N. P. Brown of Cornell were both leading MacMahon at this stage of the race. The real excitement developed when there was less than two hundred yards to go. Billy MacMahon speeded up and passed from fifth to fourth place. He did his best to break into third place but the lead that Dorr had was too big for him.

When there was only fifty yards to go, R. E. Brown, who had been running in second place pulled a final burst of speed and beat Romig to the tape. Dorr beat Billy MacMahon to third place and N. P. Brown took the other place for Cornell.

Dandrow Hammer Champion

George Dandrow goes down in the records as the intercollegiate hammer throw champion for this year by virtue of winning the event in the meet last Saturday. The five points he gave Technology were considered safe when he beat his closest competitor by almost 14 feet in the trial Friday. In the final, he tossed the weight a distance of 157 feet 4 1/2 inches, beating Brown of Harvard by more than 8 feet. There was no question of closeness about it, he easily won by a big margin.

Bawden Pulls Surprise

Mich Bawden pulled a surprise when he broke into third place in the half mile. He was running several
