White Flannels at Prom

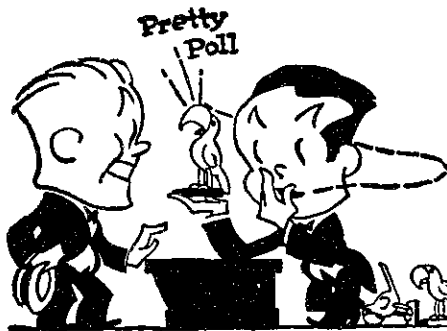

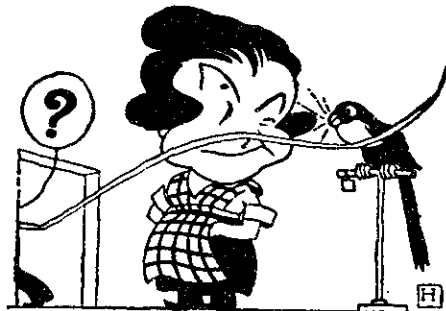
