will enter the Intercollegiate Freshman Cross Country Championship at Van Cortland Park on the 21st of November. Plans are under way for meets with Andover and Worcester Academy.

Many Stars Back

El Sanborn '22 has been elected to captain the team and Coach Kanaly looks to him for some good running this year. The loss of Billy MacMahon will be a hard blow to the team this fall but there is still a host of good men who were on last year's team. Arthur Flanders placed as the second man for the Beavers in both the New England Meet and the I. C. A. A. A. A. Championships last year. He is expected to be back to his old form this season. Bob Hendrie has a record to be proud of in both the Cross Country races and the two-mile track event. He has been doing a lot of running during the summer and should be in good condition to start the season this fall.

McIntyre and Jack Hennessey, both of last year's Cross Country outfit and last spring's crack track team, will be out again to wear the Cardinal and Gray. Besides these men, there will be a host of new material from the old freshman team.

The outlook for the season looks good this year and Coach Kanaly hopes that the team can beat the record set by the team last year. That team beat both Harvard and Dartmouth and later ran away with the New England Meet. In the final clash of the season, they placed third in the Intercollegiate Meet, being led by Cornell and Princeton alone.

CALL FOR SOCCER CANDIDATES

Manager J. E. Hoffman '23 of the Institute soccer team has issued a call for candidates for both the varsity and freshman teams and for the managerships. The candidates for these positions will meet in front of the Track House at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

The managerships are open to Sophomores and freshmen. Sophomores being wanted to compete for the varsity managership for next year and freshmen for the freshman managership. The three upper classes are eligible for the varsity team and the freshmen for the frosh eleven. Candidates for both the managerships and the teams are asked by Manager Hoffman to attend the meeting.

STUDENTS ABROAD CONTINUE

Four of the twenty-four American college graduates who have been attending Belgian universities since last fall under the auspices of the Commission for Relief in Belgium Educational Foundation have been granted a year's extension in their studies abroad.

Four of the Belgian exchange fellows now at American universities have likewise been granted a year's renewal to their fellowships. There are six women among the newly appointed fellows to Belgium for the academic year 1921-1922.

The C. R. B. Educational Foundation and its Belgian parallel were established after the Armistice to commemorate the feeding of 7,500,000 people directed by Herbert Hoover.

TRACK TEAM STARTS FALL TRAINING NOW

New Candidates Strongly Urged to Come Out

THREE STARS INELIGIBLE

The fall season for track opens today. Coach Frank Kanaly has issued a first call for candidates for both the Freshman and Varsity teams. The men are to report at the track house this afternoon from 8 until 6 o'clock to see Mr. Kanaly.

The loss of Dandrow, Bawden and McMahon was a severe blow to the team. The only way this loss can be overcome is by the team starting to practice now in reparation for the spring season. New men are urged to come out for the team now so that the material at hand may be developed to the fullest extent.

Experience Not Necessary

It is not necessary that a man have had previous experience at track for him to report out to try for the team. In years past, some of the Institute's star athletes have been men who "just came out for track for the fun of it" or for the exercise that is to be derived therefrom.

All that is needed for a candidate is the willingness to practice, a clear bill of health from the medical examiner, and a track suit of any description. The requirements will be that the men report out only on week days except Saturdays between the hours of 2 and 6. No training will be required Saturdays this fall.

A handicap meet will be arranged for track candidates some time before December. The date has not been definitely decided upon as yet on account of the still uncertain state of two of the cross-country's meets. At this meet all contestants will be given sufficient handicap as adjudged from their performance to make each event closely contested and be exciting to both the veteran and the beginner.

Manager Waterman promises a very good schedule for both the fresh-

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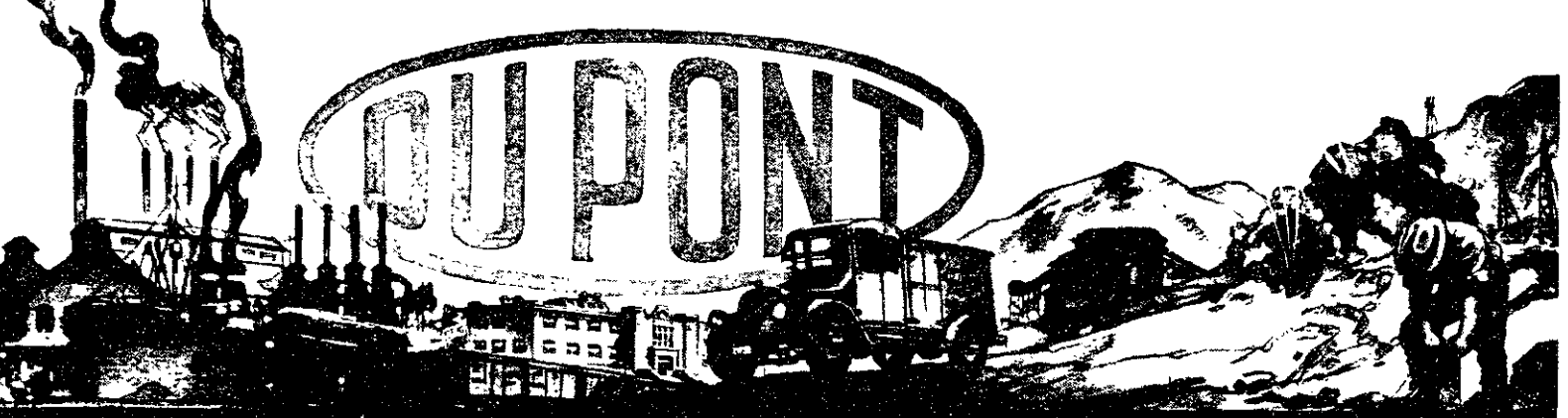
men and varsity in the spring. The varsity meets will probably include one with Harvard, with Dartmouth, and with Cornell; and, of course, the Penn Relay Carnival and the I. C. A. A. A. The freshmen will meet Exeter, Andover, Worcester Academy, and the Harvard freshmen. All work a man does this fall puts him a long ways toward competing in these meets in the spring.

New Material Promising

Varsity material shapes up well for a successful season. W. L. Smith '23, ineligible last spring for intercollegiate competition, will run the quarter. He showed up remarkably well last spring when he won the dashes in the interclass meet.

R. G. Hills, the Hill school's wonderful scholastic athlete, will do much to contribute to the success of the freshmen. With such a man as he on the team, the freshmen should go a long way toward cleaning up their meets. But no man, unsupported, can win a track meet. It would seem a great pity if the freshmen evinced little or no interest in their track team and did not go out to support it now that it has such good prospects.

"A star a year" is Coach Kanaly's motto for the track team and the three-year rule is doing much toward furthering this. Although it deprived the team of three of its best men this year, yet the rule will undoubtedly do good for the track team, judging from the way it has worked out. Indeed the Advisory Council on Athletics is to be complimented on this and other actions of like nature.



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
