The author explicates the characters from this seemingly hopeless tangle successfully but somewhat abruptly and leaves little to the couple in the way of future happiness.

The part of the wife is played by Margaret Anglin who handles the role with unusual skill and her acting through alternate phases of hope and despair carried the audience with her to the last minute. The role of husband was played by Harry Minton who did exceedingly well considering the difficult and thankless part that it was.

CROSS COUNTRY PROSPECTS GOOD

Elmer Sanborn '22 to Lead This Season's Harriers

FIVE OLD MEN BACK

Cross-Country prospects at the Institute are bright in spite of the fact that three of last year's team will not compete this year. Carol Stone and Don Robbins have graduated while Billy MacMahon, last year's captain is barred by the three year ruling. However, Captain Sanborn, Art Flanders, Bob Hendrie, Jack Hennessey, and MacIntyre are out and running in their usual form. Robertson of last year's freshman team has shown up well. Coach Kanaly states that the team will be picked largely from the results of the Fall Handicap, which will be held at Franklin Park a week from Saturday.

Saturday the squad will run Belmont. Following his usual plan for the first run, Coach Kanaly will divide his squad into four groups, one for the health squad, one for the freshmen, one for the varsity men with less training, and one for the varsity men who are in first class condition. The health squad will cover about three miles, while the varsity will run the full six miles of the course, the other two squads taking distances between these two extremes.

FIELD DAY ASPIRANTS ENLIVEN TECH FIELD

Yesterday afternoon Tech Field hummed with activity. Coach Frank Kanaly, of track and cross-country was besieged by freshmen and Sophomore athletes until dark. The classes got an even start in the month's drilling that will come to a climax on Field Day, November 24.

Field Day was established following a fatality occurring in the 1900 cane rush. The victorious class has its name engraved upon a silver loving cup. Class 1924 having been shutout 13-0 last year will have to trounce 1925 to win this honor.

The competition consists of a football game, a crew race, a 12-man relay and three tug-of-war pulls.

G. L. Bateman, ex-Andover half-miler and Makepeace, formerly a relay man at Exeter are two of the best prospects among the freshmen runners. Both are speedsters of class and will very probably be among '25's dozen.

The Sophomore relay registration in the track house is not complete because all the men have not had their medical examination. Indications are that the veterans are all on deck. Horace Burt and Bob Spurdle were out limbering up yesterday. Russ Robertson, who ran for '24 last fall is working on cross-country this fall.

About 30 football chasers reported to Charles Phelps '24 yesterday afternoon. All last year's warriors except Kemp and Bowers renewed acquaintance with the pigskin. Hawkins, who hails from Hamilton College looks like a big addition. A frosh squad also loosened up.

The '24 crew will take to the water next Saturday. Twenty-five men attended the preliminary meeting yesterday.

So far 35 huskies have signed up for the Sophomore tug-of-war team. An effort is being made to secure the heaviest men in the class. Manager Dick Eaton will treat the lads to about five short pulls this afternoon on the far side of the football field at 5 o'clock.

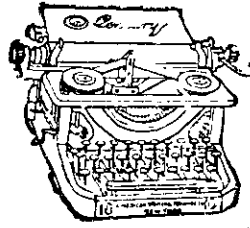
The closing date for candidates for the Field Day relay teams will soon be announced. Men interested in this event should also report immediately at the track house.

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SUPERINTENDENT CALLS FOR KEYS

The Superintendent of Buildings and Power requests that the 200 or more men who have not yet turned in their locker keys from last year please do so at once. To continue to hold these keys will force the superintendent to have new keys made and keep the lockers out of use since they will, of course, be sealed and inaccessible to the present key holders. The purchase of 400 new lockers this year makes a total of 4900 in Walker, the track house, and the locker rooms but all of these are needed and those who are withholding some from use by not returning keys are asked to turn them in.

The superintendent states that the increasing of the deposit for lockers to \$1 is merely to get men to be less lax in the matter of turning in keys and not to place any additional expense upon the student.
