FALL TRACK ENROLLMENT OF 115 BREAKS RECORD

The number of athletes reporting to Frank Kanaly for varsity and freshman cross-country, varsity track, Sophomore and freshman relays now totals 115. Last year at the top of the spring season only 180 men were turning out. With but two day's recruits tabulated the total this fall is astonishingly large.

The candidates are distributed as follows: 41 varsity and 15 freshman cross-country, 27 varsity track, 18 Sophomore and 11 freshman relay.

The cross-country squad will be divided into four grades for the annual run at Belmont tomorrow. Freshmen and health men will cover three miles and the varsity the full course of six miles. The pace will be very slow so that men not yet in condition can travel the whole route and so that instruction can be given.

The first real test will come on October 15, the Handicap Cross Country Run, a five mile race at Franklin Park.

PRACTICE FENCING TODAY

A meeting of the candidates for the Fencing Team was held in the Gymnasium Wednesday afternoon. Twelve men reported. It was found that Falkenberg, who was a promising freshman last year, has not returned to the Institute. However, in addition to the veterans of last year's team, Robert Arnold '22, who has had some experience with the foils, is out for the team.

Only two men from the class of '25 reported. More are needed. Freshmen who sign up for fencing with Mr. Kanaly are excused from gymnasium work.

Men who wish to try out for the job of freshman assistant manager will report to the A. A. office on Friday at 4 o'clock or on Monday at 5. Competition will start immediately so that it is to the advantage of those interested to sign up as soon as possible.

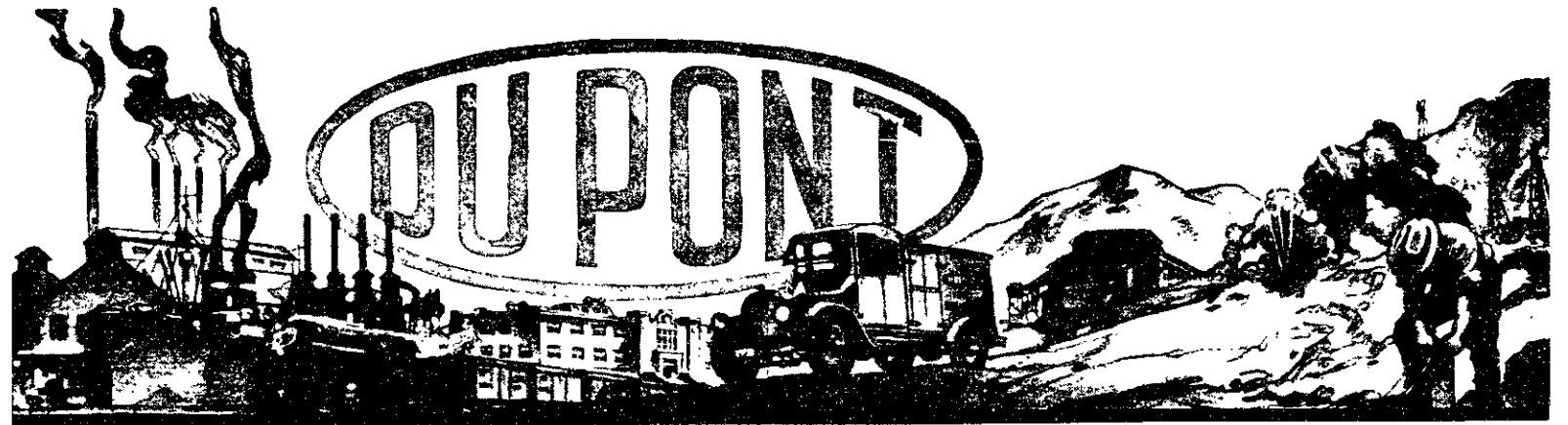

The freshman pullers met yesterday afternoon in back of the track house. About 20 men were present and the estimated average weight was 150 lbs. More men must report and the heavier the better.



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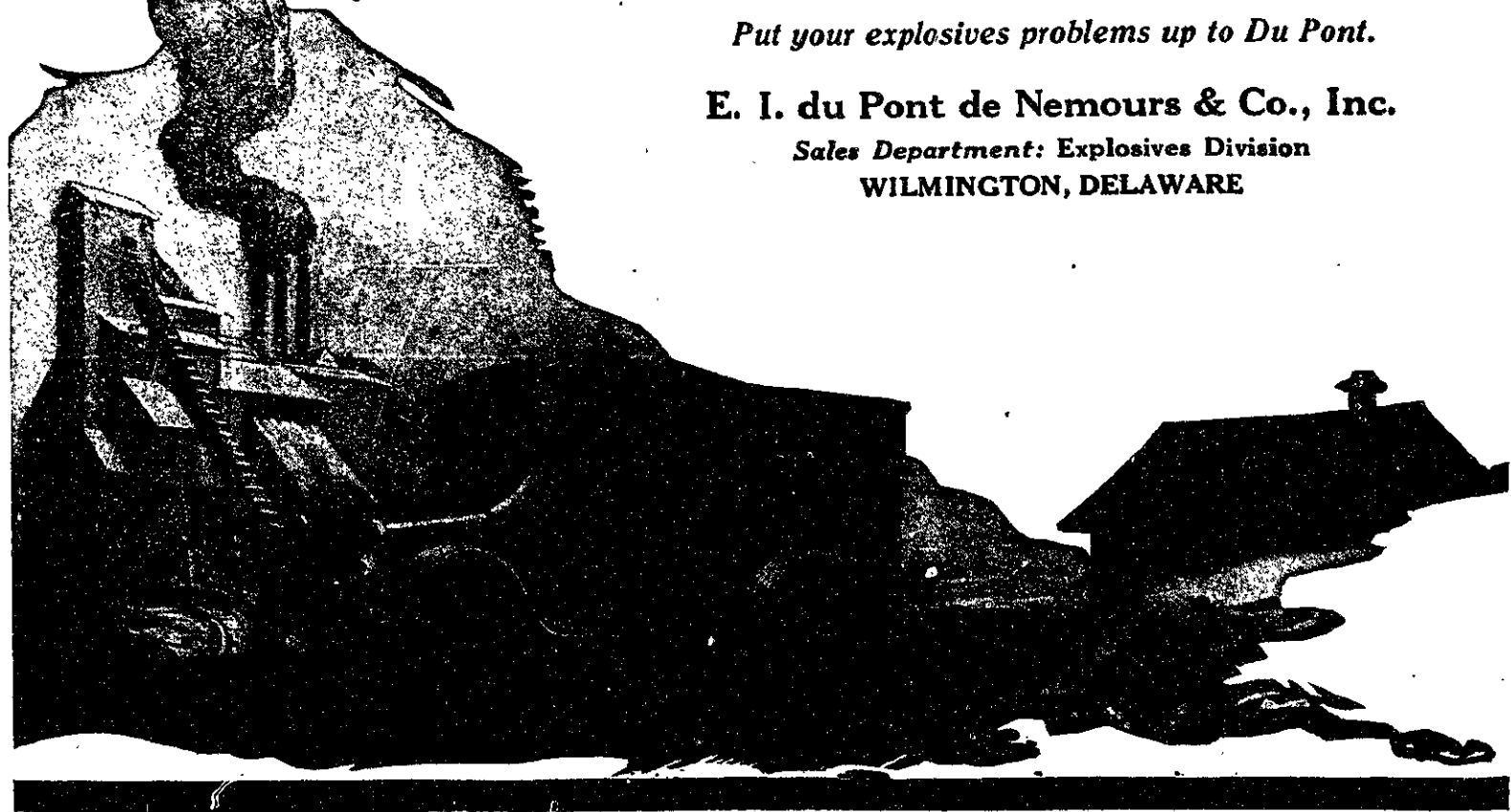
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
