You are to be complimented on your editorial entitled "The Slide Rule Forgotten?" in the September issue.

I had the good fortune to take the excellent course, given by Professor Louis Derr, on the use of the slide rule. Since this course was entirely optional and given after regular hours, a great many men did not take it, and I noticed all through the four years at the Institute that many of these never really learned to be at home with the slide rule. Operating the slide rule is, in one essential, very much like playing golf; form counts and must be acquired early in the game to be of much use. Even in the Senior year, some men had not become accustomed to the polyphase, and were thus wholly inefficient in the use of the slide rule, and probably have remained so.

I trust that the faculty will be guided by the excellent advice given by the TECH.
