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HARRIERS WORK OUT ON BELMONT COURSE

60 Men Start Training Under Coach Kanaly---Many Veterans Back

ISSUES CALL FOR FRESHMEN

The cross country team had their first hard workout last Saturday when they ran over the cross country course at Belmont. Coach Kanaly divided his men into three groups. Seventeen men, including the members of last year's squad, jogged over the six and one-quarter mile course under the direction of Captain Sanborn. Eighteen more covered five miles of the course, while the third group, made up of the "health squad" and freshmen, covered the three and one-half mile freshman course.

More Freshmen Needed

From the point of view of the varsity the afternoon's run was very successful. The members of last year's varsity that are back are running in excellent form and much good new material has shown up. Coach Kanaly was a little disappointed, however, at the lack of interest displayed by the incoming class towards Technology's major fall sport.

It would be impossible for the Institute to turn out a first-class team every year unless strengthened by incoming freshmen. To date but nine freshmen have turned out for cross country. These men may be excellent runners but it will be hard to select a team of 12 men from their ranks to meet Harvard a week from Saturday.

Fall Handicap Saturday

The harriers are looking forward to the annual fall handicap at Franklin Park as the first thing on their schedule. The results of this run will largely determine the makeup of the season's team. Handicaps will be given up to six minutes for the five-mile course. The times of the freshmen will be taken at the three and one-half mile mark to determine the makeup of the freshman team. Last Sunday morning Coach Kanaly took the cross country men over the course so that it would be familiar to them Saturday.

FROSH HUSKIES SHOW UP WELL IN FIRST SCRIMMAGE

The first freshman football scrimmage yesterday afternoon on Tect Field certainly made the fur fly. Two elevens of husky frosh with every man determined to play for '25 on Field Day, clashed with a vigor worthy of real instead of practice combat.

The coaching staff headed by Walt Metcalf has adopted the policy of no publicity but every one of the mentors glowed with satisfaction. More candidates are desired, particularly tackles, guards and quarter-backs. The line coach very conservatively estimates the average weight of his division to be in the neighborhood of 155 pounds.

There is keen competition among the backs and every man put his full drive behind each plunge. The list of backfield men includes Bartlett, Egan, Carrier, Leonard, Lumb and Quinn. The drill yesterday was chiefly on straight plunging, very few end runs being attempted. Every back on the field was given a chance to handle the ball.

There is but one candidate for center, Bob Grant, and the coaches are particularly anxious to have a couple of rivals for the position report. In fact the entire line from end to end could be stronger and new men have an excellent opportunity for these posts.

Soccer Strong In First Game

PRACTICE GAME SHOWS
REAL SOCCER QUALITY

George Collins, Famous Football Star, Coaches Team

Saturday's practice game, the first of the season, showed the coaches that the soccer team has already its legs under it, and is ready for the intensive work. Although some of the new men are making excellent showings in practice, they will probably meet strong competition from the remainder of last year's team which has not yet shown up. These few men are going to be needed, as they have had the experience of last year's games and practice on the same team.

Coaching this year will be much more thorough than ever before, and will be under George Collins, the famous football star. Under his direction expert players will be reached who will be at Tech Field at least once a week. The various parts of the team will be coached separately to some extent, forwards being coached by a man who understands the playing of the forward positions and the backs by someone who has played back himself. After a little difficulty, arrangements have been made by which the soccer team is given the exclusive use of Tech Field three times a week. This is really necessary for the development of a Varsity team, and if the team had not been able to get this privilege, it would have had to take some field in Cambridge. Fernando de la Macorra, who played last year has been prevented coming out for the team until this week on account of his foot, which was injured, but is now practising and will be able to continue with the squad.

START FALL TRACK WORK

New Training Plans for the Fall
---Olympic Star in '25

This year Coach Kanaly plans to return to his training schedule of some time ago and begin Varsity track work, distinct from the usual fall cross country training, at once so that the men may be in better shape for the early spring meets. Since Technology has no indoor quarters for winter practice an enforced vacation is necessary during the months of Jan. and Feb. and it is to make up for this loss of time and be able to compete with colleges which do continue track work indoors through the winter, that Coach Kanaly has deemed fall training important.

The work will consist of both track and field events and be as carefully supervised by Kanaly himself as it is in the spring even though he now has the cross country team to occupy his time. It is very important that every man at the Institute who intends to enter Varsity or freshman track competition next spring report now and begin training. The work will be separate from all cross country training so that men now staying away in order to escape the long grinds at Belmont need do so no longer as they will not be required to take part in these runs.

At the Varsity dinner last Friday which was attended by 45 "T" men, the announcement of the new plan met with enthusiastic approval. Maj. Briggs, the toastmaster, commended the idea and spoke of the need of strenuous work to maintain Tech's record of past achievements in track.

Freshman Olympic Star

The frost are boasting the possession of an Olympic star in the ranks of their track team. Ralph G. Hill, who prepared for Technology at the Hill School, is this promising member of the class of '25. He was an alternate on the team representing the U. S. at the last Olympic games, his specialty being the shot put. Judging from his past achievements in this event it may be expected that the Technology record will soon be changed from the 42 ft. mark at which it now stands.

Hill is also very good in the hammer throw, though he is accustomed to the 12lb. hammer of schoolboy competition which is considerably lighter than the one used in intercollegiate meets. Being a freshman he is ineligible for varsity competition until next year but he will be a tower of strength to the frosh team next spring in their meets and can count on a varsity berth in his Soph year.

TUG-O-WAR TEAMS AT WORK

Monday night the Sophomore tug-o-war team again demonstrated that they were still capable of pulling a mean rope. The almost perfect rhythm of their pulling was a contrast to the see-saw motion of their rivals, the frosh. An agreement has been made to the effect that the freshmen will use the rope one night and the Sophomores the next until the new rope is ready.
