CROSS COUNTRY OPENS WITH HANDICAP MEET

Run Over Franklin Park Course to Decide Team to Meet Harvard

WINNER RECEIVES CUP

The first real run of the Institute cross country teams comes tomorrow. It is the full handicap meet at Franklin Field. The freshmen will start promptly at 3:00 from the club house, and the Varsity and second Varsity men will follow in order of their handicaps.

The course is five and one-half miles and is a rather difficult one to follow. In order to avoid any man's losing the trail both markers, and stakes painted a distinctive color have been provided. The freshmen are to run only three and one-half miles of the course, the Varsity, of course, will finish the whole.

The meet is really to determine the men who are to compete with Harvard next Friday. The first twelve Varsity men to finish the whole course, and the first twelve freshmen to finish their three and one-half miles will compose the teams to meet the Crimson harriers.

Cups Add Interest to Meet

Added interest attaches to the meet inasmuch as cups are being offered to the men, varsity or freshmen, who break the tape at the end of the course. These cups are being donated by alumni of the Institute. Mr. H. S. Benson '17, former captain of cross country and a member of the Advisory Council on Athletics, will give the cup for the man to finish the five and one-half miles first. Mr. A. F. Nye '15 has promised the cup for the man making the best running time over the entire course.

The freshmen have as good a chance for these cups as the Varsity for, with their relatively large handicap, they can cover the course and finish sooner than the Varsity. In past years several freshmen have done this and have succeeded in showing up well amongst the first to finish.

SHOW ORCHESTRA ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR NEW JAZZ BAND

According to information given out by Assistant Manager J. A. Penny-packer '23, the Tech Show orchestra is planning a full schedule for the coming year. A series of concerts and dances has been arranged by the management which they feel should make the season a most successful one.

The Show Orchestra has been admitted to a position as an integral part of the Show, just as the Business and Stage Departments are. '25 FOOTBALL WARRIORS MAKE COACHES RUSTLE

Freshman football stock took another abrupt jump yesterday afternoon, in the estimation of the '23 coaching staff. The squad of instructors scrimmaged the frosh for about 20 minutes and fought like fury for the single score of the brawl. Sophomore gridiron chances continued to decline with but 15 men on deck.

Coach Walt Metcalf '23 battered the freshman defense with all the power of last fall's victorious eleven, almost in vain. The '25 line proved to be a very tough proposition, being in fine condition. Arnold Taylor at center for '25 had a particularly hard job. This afternoon signal practice, only, staged in preparation for the game with St. John's Academy tomorrow.

The squad of '24 warriors again took honors for persistent work finishing its practice by moonlight. A scrimmage was planned but with only four men over a team present the event

The Sophomores are not doing as well, not even having all of last year's team back on the job. The '24 team was strengthened, however, by the return of Rowe and Reed of last year's combination, last Tuesday.

One of the best men out this fall is undecided as to which class can command his allegiance. This lad is Philips from New Zealand who transferred to the Institute and is taking a mixture of Freshman and Sophomore subjects. It will be up to the Dean to decide in which year he is taking a majority of his subjects and determine his athletic standing. At present both classes are hoping to have the Dean's verdict in their favor.

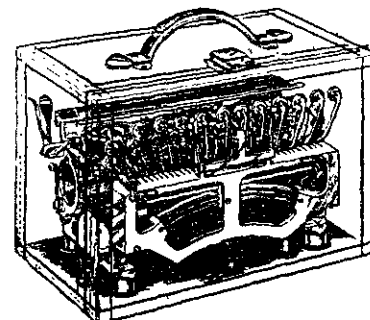
