TECH GYMNASTS ARE ACTIVE

Call for Sophomore and freshman Managers to be Made Soon

At present about 35 men have signified their intention of going out for the gym team, although no official call for candidates has been made. The departure of Whipple and Humphrey has left quite a gap in the Beaver squad, but the management hopes that, with the present tenure of the Engineer squad, they may be able to turn out a strong team. They are also counting strongly on a turnout of new men.

The present schedule for the gym team is, at best, tentative; but it gives some idea of the sort of meets in prospect. The following meets have either been arranged, or are in process of negotiation. A triangular meet with Harvard and Princeton, at Harvard; a triangular meet with Harvard and Haverford University, at the Walker gym; a meet with Brown University, at Walker; a triangular meet with Princeton and Penn, at Princeton.

Plan Exhibition Meets

The possibility of staging several exhibition meets, in and around Boston, is at present under consideration. At the last meeting of the I. C. A. A. G. A. (The Inter-Collegiate Association of Amateur Gymnasts of America), held at Princeton last year, Nesmith Thompson '24, captain of this year's gym team, was elected president of the association. At this meeting it was voted to hold the 1922 inter-collegiate at the Walker Memorial in March.

Competition for the positions of assistant managers will soon start, and since this competition is open only to Sophomores, it is suggested by Manager Blake that all men desirous of going out should appear at the M. I. T. A. A. office at Walker any time between 5 and 6 o'clock on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. All freshmen desirous of entering the competition for second assistant manager are asked to show up at the same time and place. The position leads to manager in the candidate's third year.

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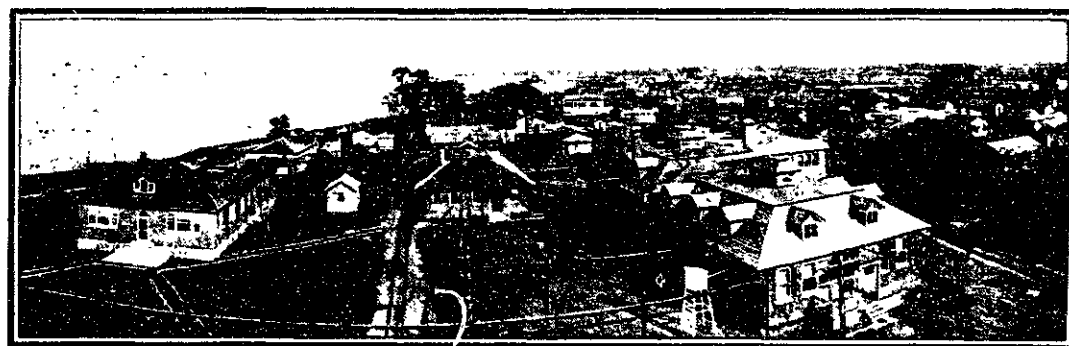
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
