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SEVERAL VETERANS MISSING IN WRESTLING TEAM OUTLOOK

The wrestling season at Technolgy opens this fall with several large gaps in the varsity team who last year went through an excellent season defeating Yale this being the second defeat suffered by the Eli matmen in seven years both of which were inflicted by the Beavers. Harvard was also severely punished, as was Brooklyn Polytech.

In the 115 pound class Davis and Barnard formerly officiated for the Institute, but this year Davis seems to be among the missing while Barnard may possibly join the boxing squad. This is a matter to be deplored for Davis was one of the best men the Institute had in his weight, while Barnard had to be matched with Davis three times in the elimination bouts before a definite decision was reached. Warburton and Hazel-tine who wrestled for the Beavers last year in the 125 pound class are back this year, while Tuttle who finished a successful season with the cub mat-men by copping the New England Amateur Championship in his weight is now available for varsity material.

T. O. Richards who held the 135 pound berth on the team last year is still a claimant to the position with a possible competitor in Weatherly of the former freshman squad. George Butler, who has been re-elected to the captaincy of the wrestling team, holder of the amateur New England Championship in his weight,

will no doubt cover the 145 pound position.

At present Ames, formerly of the Beaver cubs, Tommy Thomas and Briggs of the varsity squad are candidates for the 158 pound crown. The departure of Watts Humphrey leaves vacancies in both the 175 pound class and in the unlimited division in both of which berths Watts wrestled. Bill Russell, who formerly disputed all claims to the unlimited class, is still 'hors du combat', and so all classes over the 158 pound limit are in urgent need of new blood.

The wrestling schedule includes practically the same colleges that were met last year. The meet with Dartmouth which was cancelled last year due to conflicts is a certainty this year, and the other opponents include Yale, Harvard, Tufts, Princeton, Springfield Y. M. C. A., and Brooklyn Polytech. The date of the New England Inter-collegiate, which were not held last year, is at present undecided but will probably be sometime in May. The Beaver wrestlers will enter this meet.
