CORNELL CLEANS UP IN SYRACUSE MEET

Syracuse Gets Second Place and Beavers Third in Invitation Meet

SANBORN FINISHES NINTH

Cornell sprung a big surprise when her harriers captured the first five places and incidentally the meet at the Syracuse Invitation Cross-Country Run last Saturday. The Cornell team had a total of 15 points. Syracuse railed for second place with 75 points; while the Institute harriers and Yale finished with 90 and 98 points respectively. The time was 22 min. 48 sec. for the four and one-half mile course.

Captain Sanborn of the Beavers started strong and at the four mile mark was 50 yards ahead of the Cornell runners who were grouped together. He weakened on a long tough hill when but half a mile from the finish but managed to be the first Tech man in with ninth place.

Ithicans Win Individual Honors

All the individual honors went to the Ithicans. Carter, N. P. Brown, R. E. Brown and Miske, all of Cornell, tied for first, while Richmond, a team-mate crossed the line a few seconds later for fifth place.

Yale was reputed to have a strong team and many expected her to rival the Cornell team for first place. The strength of the Ithicans was known and they were certain of finishing well up on the list. Such a complete walk-away, however, was not looked for. The Beavers were under a certain handicap, as none of the members of the team were familiar with the course and they did not arrive in Syracuse early enough to go over the course and rest up again for the meet. Coach Kanaly had hoped for a better showing from his men, but the Tech harriers still have the New England and the Intercollegiate in which to show their metal.

The Technology scorers were as follows: ninth, Capt. E. E. Sanborn, 23m. 23s.; eleventh, A. L. Flanders, 23m. 28s.; fourteenth, R. E. Hendrie, 23m. 43s.; twenty-second, W. W. Anderson, 24m. 22s.; thirty-fourth, L. H. Poor, 25m. 20s. G. R. Holt, the sixth Tech man finished thirty-eighth, while R. E. Robertson, the last Tech man to finish drew forty-third place.

"A CURE FOR CURABLES"

"A Cure for Curables," is crowded full of quaint, droll humor, and likeable every day people, who, like most of us, have their ills a greater part of which are imagined. There is a lot of plain, sound common sense spoken by the characters without any approach to preaching, or moralizing. While the scenes are laid in the Blue Ridge Mountains, the people who live and love and struggle might be the people we meet in every day life. That is why they are so interesting, so lovable. We go through their troubles with them, love with them, and laugh with and at them, just as we do with and at our neighbors.

The action centers about a handsome, big hearted young doctor, who inherits a sanitarium filled with rich and seemingly eccentric patients, with the provision that he must cure ten patients within a month or the sanitarium is to go to his rival, who is also his assistant. The patients like many people met in every day life take absurd pride in their imaginary ailments, as if their sickly limitations were to be preferred to robust appetites and perfect health.

How the young Doctor Pendergrass sets out to change their mode of life and though, how he is blocked in his efforts by Dr. Parker his rival, and by a beautiful heiress furnish material for drama full of simple whole hearted interest and delicious humor.

BOXING SUBSTITUTE FOR PHYSICAL TRAINING

The ball was passed back up the right side of the field, and in to the center where Macorra took it through the goal for the only marker of the game.

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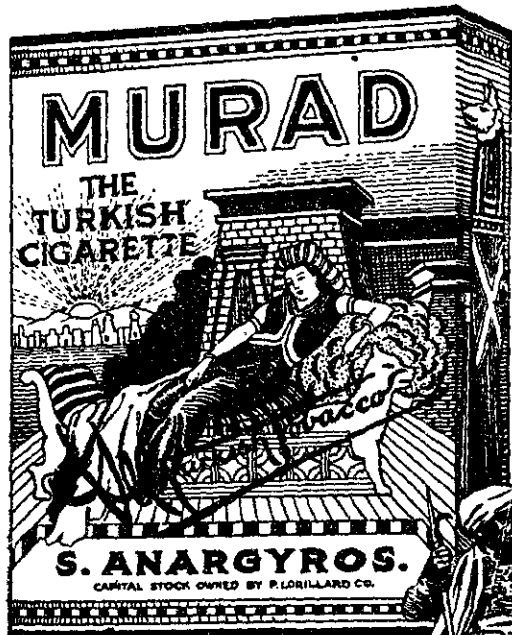
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
