Just as Napoleon met his Waterloo, so the Harvard varsity football team was defeated by the Centre College eleven, 6-0. Penn State with its mighty warriors was unable to do the trick, but Bo McMillin, Red Roberts and company were.

Just as reported, Centre did come to the stadium this year with a stronger team. The line made a much better showing this time and on the offensive Centre easily had the edge on the Crimson. The interference on end runs was all that it could be; on punts the ends were right on the Harvard man who was to receive the ball.

Penalties were numerous and mostly for off side. It appeared that the Kentucky Colonels were so keen to get at Harvard that they couldn't wait for the ball to be passed. In addition, there were several fifteen yard penalties for holding inflicted on both teams.

As in last weeks battle with Penn State, several of the Harvard team were injured. As was expected Coach Bob Fisher did not use many of his first string men. Buell, Churchill, Gehrke, Gratwick and Ladd were in the lineup.

Bo McMillin, last year's all-American quarterback played a stellar game and fully lived up to the expectations of the 46,000 that came to see him and his running mate Red Roberts in action. McMillin certainly looks like all-American material again this year, and we wouldn't be surprised to see Roberts all-something. As he plays so many positions so well it is hard to give him a regular assignment.

radial type having several banks of cylinders arranged in tandem.

Professor Warner also described a number free flight tests, which provide the only means of ascertaining certain types of experimental data concerning the true state of affairs when the machine is in flight. He likewise explained the action of the supercharger which has made flying at enormous altitudes possible, as well as the leak proof tank, reversible propeller, etc.

With regard to the usual accusations

that flying is dangerous, expensive, and not what it is claimed to be, the speaker merely stated that the safety is increasing steadily, whereas the cost of flying will diminish as the construction of the airplane continues to be simplified. The moulding of public opinion as to the use of aeronautics depends in large part upon the friendliness of the press.

Show Pictures of Tests

Motion pictures were thrown on the screen showing tests carried out at McCook Field in parachute jumping.

These were explained by Captain Wright, of the Military Science Department here at the Institute.

The recent bombing tests carried out by the army planes against a former German dreadnought, as filmed both from sea level and from the air, were shown.

It is the plan of the society to run similar smokers in the future, possibly going into the more technical side of aeronautics by means of black board talks and the presentation of papers by members of the society.

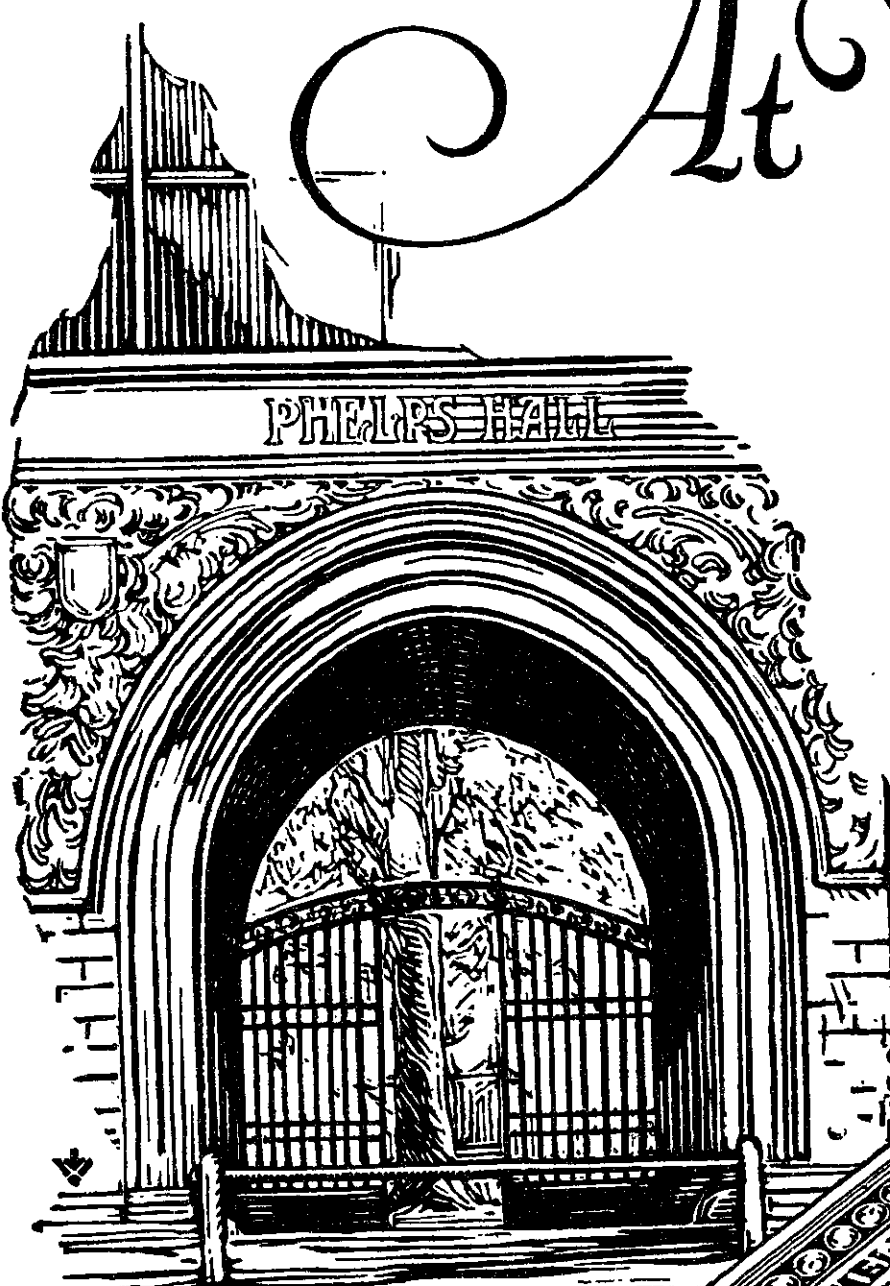
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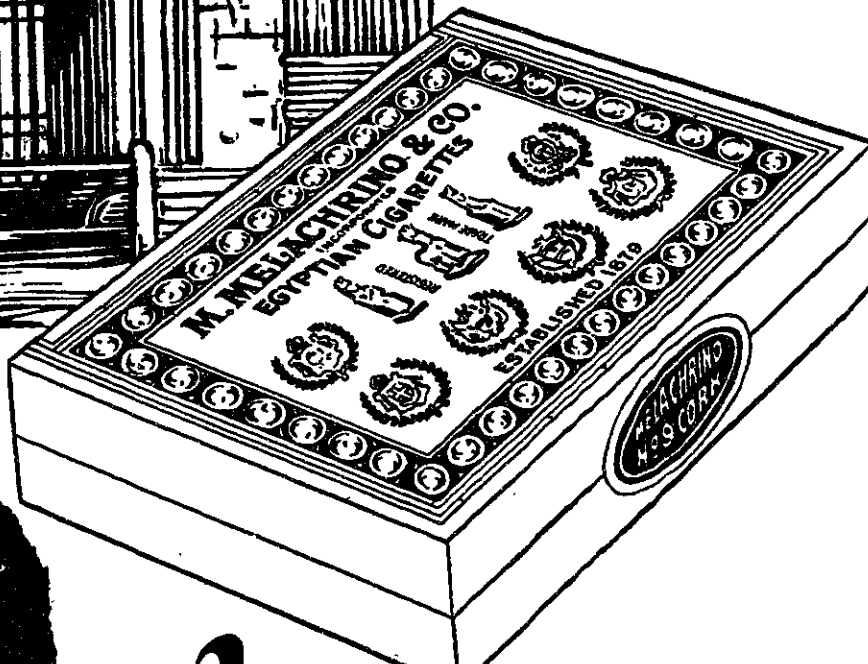
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
