

PASSING SHOW WILL ENTERTAIN INSTITUTE

Will Mingle in Annual Tech Night and Relax to Charms of Pretty Girls in Popular Revue

CURTAIN RISES AT 8 O'CLOCK

All Technology will be out with bells on tonight to celebrate with the victors of Field Day by witnessing and possibly assisting the cast of "The Passing Show of 1921," at the Shubert Theatre. The Field Day teams will occupy boxes in recognition of the part they played during the afternoon.

"The Passing Show of 1921" is up to its usual standard of pulchritude, and beside the jokes regularly fed to the public will be many new and unusual ones which can be appreciated most acutely by those who have fought and lost in the daily battles waged at the Institute.

These jokes are the result of careful deliberation on the part of George Nesbitt '22, general manager of Voo Doo, and it should be worth the full exorbitant price charged just to hear these. It is claimed that he has robbed the Voo Doo refrigerator to get only the freshest jokes, and that as a result the Voo Doo staff will have to put in overtime with the scissors to fill the gaps made by his inroads.

ARMISTICE DAY DANCE IS TO LAST UNTIL 2 O'CLOCK

The dance is to be formal and either uniform or full dress may be worn. Supper will be served during the evening.

Tickets for the dance are on sale in the lobby but the number is somewhat limited. They may also be obtained from the dance committee, which consists of A. G. Oddafson '22, H. D. Nickle '23, and H. H. Niles '23. The music will be supplied by Bert Lowe's orchestra.

CONGRESS VOTES ARMISTICE DAY AS NATIONAL HOLIDAY

By joint resolution November 11 was officially proclaimed by Congress to be the first national holiday and is to be known as Armistice Day.

On November 11 in order to honor the World War dead an official and national holiday will be proclaimed for November 11. The Arlington National Cemetery will be the scene of exercises in which the unknown hero will be laid at rest.

Governor Cox of Massachusetts has not as yet taken official action but it is assumed that he will comply with the presidential request. In that event the exercises of the Institute will be suspended for the day and plans for the military demonstration will be cancelled.

ORDERLY CONDUCT TO PREVAIL TECH NIGHT

Institute Committee Passes Resolution to Tolerate No Disturbance

CLASS OF 1922 REINSTATED

The decision to tolerate no disorderly conduct this evening at the Tech Night celebration, to co-operate with the Institute authorities in limiting the smoking in the corridors and to uphold the Walker Memorial Committee in its stand of refusing to grant permission to run tea dances in Walker Memorial were the outstanding features of the Institute Committee meeting held last evening in Walker.

Among the first matters of new business to be brought up was a motion by C. E. Brokaw '22, chairman of the Tech Night Committee, that the "Institute Committee will not tolerate any disorderly conduct on Tech Night, and that the Field Day marshals shall report any offenders to the Institute Committee." The motion was unanimously passed, thus giving the committee the power to take action on any flagrant offence of decency or of gentlemanly conduct at the celebration, which would lead to unpleasant consequences.

Back Walker Committee Decisions

In the matter of Dorm dances, the Institute Committee voted to uphold H. M. Shirey '22, chairman of the Walker Memorial Committee, in his decision to restrict the privilege of running tea dances to the Walker Memorial Committee. Shirey's stand in this matter was not to discriminate against any group of undergraduates, but rather to restrict the management of tea dances. He feels that tea dances are essentially money-making affairs, and that the building should not be put to this use except for the benefit of an organization which represents the entire student body.

Take Action on Smoking

In response to a letter from Dean Talbot concerning smoking in the corridors, the committee voted to co-operate with the Administrative Committee in an attempt to suppress the nuisance. The complete text of the Dean's letter will be published in the next issue of THE TECH.

C. C. Taylor '23 recommended the advancing of the date of election of the Junior Prom Committee to the second week in December so that the committee may have ample time to complete its arrangements for the affair.

Announce List of Delinquents

A committee will be appointed to investigate the eligibility of the Aeronautical Society to representation upon the Institute Committee.

The following men were considered absent because of neglecting to pay their dues for this year: D. H. McCreary '22, C. E. Society; R. P. Ramsey '22, M. E. Society; R. H. Brown '22, Corporation XV; E. L. Johansen '22, Mining Society; A. J. Westcott '23, and D. C. Sayre '23 of the Junior Class; D. H. Keck '24, L. P. Marsh '24 and Earle Bates '24 of the Sophomore Class; J. C. Patty '22, T. E. N.; G. S. Holderness '22, Architectural Society and R. E. Van Giesen '22, Dormitories. T. M. Taylor '22 was late.

The Class of 1922 was reinstated upon the Institute Committee following the losing of its seat as the result of absences for two consecutive meetings. In this connection, the chairman called attention to the fact that the absence of one representative of a class constituted the absence of that class at any meeting of the Committee.

FIELD DAY PARADE WILL FORM ON CHARLES BANK

The Field Day parade to Tech Field will assemble on the bank of the Charles, instead of in the Great Court. Signs on the lamp posts will indicate the positions for each class. This shift in the plans will make the parade much easier to start since the participants will be crowded along the embankment watching the finish of the crew race, which takes place immediately before the procession.

D. F. Carpenter '22, first marshal, who will be in charge, reports that nobody will be allowed in the stands on Tech Field until the marchers arrive. Consequently all the spectators are expected to take part in the exercise and so have a chance to secure the best seats.

'24 Wears Gray and '25 Maroon
A new ruling passed in regard to the colors to be worn on Field Day will allow frosh to retain their jerseys for the second year conflict. This fall the '25 wears maroon while '24 sports gray.

TEA DANCE TO BE GIVEN BY WALKER COMMITTEE FOR CREW

A Tea Dance will be held in the main hall of Walker, on Saturday, November 26, from 3 to 6 o'clock, under the auspices of the Walker Memorial Committee. The proceeds of the dance will go to equipment for the crew. Music will be rendered by Morey Pearl and his seven-piece orchestra. Tea will be served in the Grill Room during the afternoon by the Hospitality Committee, of which Mrs. R. P. Bigelow is chairman.

The tickets will be on sale by November 14, the price being \$1.50 a couple. The places of sale will be announced later. This is the first Tea Dance of the year, and H. M. Shirey '21, chairman of the Walker Memorial Committee, says that with the good music which has been secured, the dance should be not only an excellent social event, but it will also materially aid the crew management in purchasing sorely needed equipment for the coming season.

FIELD DAY TEAMS TO BANQUET TOGETHER

Cabot Medals Will Be Awarded

The annual dinner in honor of the Field Day contestants will be given in Walker tomorrow at 6 o'clock. On this occasion the Cabot Medals won last year will be awarded to the successful men and many men of prominence in the Institute will deliver addresses.

The victors and the vanquished will sit side by side, after the battle smoke has subsided, in the quiet of the Walker Memorial. In their annual get-together Dean Talbot will address the contestants, Frank Kanaly, the athletic coach, will deliver a speech and Dr. Rockwell, former medical director of the Institute, will be present to propose toasts. Dr. A. W. Rowe will also be there to address the diners.

As of old the proverbial loving cup will be passed around and each man will again renew the Tech Field Day traditions. Each man will in turn grasp the cup and give his name, class and home town, while it may be that the toastmaster will again take "one good drink for the crowd."

VOO DOO ELECTS MANAGERS

At a recent meeting of the Managing Board, Thomas W. Alder '22 was elected treasurer of the Voo Doo. William Rowe '24 was chosen to be advertising manager. As a third election, D. F. Kelly '21 will be a member of the Assistant Board of Editors.

The managing board states that openings exist in all the departments of the magazine, especially in the Publicity Department, where many good positions are to be had on the display of sufficient ability by candidates.

MUST SHOW TAX CARDS

COMPETITION KEEN FOR FIELD DAY HONORS TODAY

Teams All Set for Annual Inter-Class Athletic Contests

The Sophomore and freshman classes will settle accounts this afternoon in the four annual Field Day contests. There is not one event that can be awarded to '24 or '25 before today's tests. The freshmen are determined that they will not be a stepping stone from which the second year athletes can chisel 1924 on the Field Day cup. The rallies held by both classes have resulted in enthusiasm of a fever pitch. Opinion awards football to the frosh by a hair. The gridiron tussle counts four points. Crew should account for an equal number of Sophomore counters. Relay will yield three points but to whom they will be awarded your guess is as good as anyone's. Tug-of-war is so close that it looks as though the freshmen would pull home one of the points and the Sophomores drag off the other.

Distinguish Crews by Caps and Jerseys

So far as boatsmanship is concerned the two crews which will contend for the honors of the one-mile course at 1:15 o'clock today looked to be pretty well matched as they pulled out from the boat house late yesterday afternoon.

Weather conditions permitting, the race will end in front of Walker Memorial. The positions of the crews relative to the Cambridge side of the Charles River Basin will not be determined until immediately before the race. This is due to the fact that the most desirable course is determined by the direction of the wind.

It will be possible, however, to distinguish the rival eights by the color of the caps worn by the bow oarsmen and of the coxswains' jerseys. Grey having been assigned to the Class of 1924 and Cardinal to the frosh. Bill Haines, the crimson crew mentor, will officiate as starter and referee.

The contest will be judged by Herbert Haines, Dr. R. Heber Howe, freshman crew coach at Harvard; A. W. Stevens and W. S. Youngman, all of whom are connected with rowing at Harvard.

Preparatory to the opening Field Day contest, the second boats will race over the course at 12:30 o'clock. Only in case the wind is very high will it be necessary to have the crews race upstream, finishing in front of the boat house.

Expect Close Score in Football Battle

Football's four points this afternoon are a toss-up. Captain Bob Grant's '25 eleven seems to have a slight advantage in the matter of training. The Sophomores have the jump in individual ability and experience.

Coach Walt Metcalf backs up the frosh captain's statement that '25 may count on a gridiron victory. Doc Woodruff, chief mentor of '24, has nothing to say, preferring to let his team's fight this afternoon speak for itself. Twenty-six Sophomore warriors were on deck last evening and Manager Charles Phelps '24 saw in their determination prospects for a job to frosh pride this afternoon.

Both teams are in good physical condition. The freshmen never had a long hospital list, while Soph Captain Shipley reports every one of his outfit eager for the tussle today.

'24 Outweighs Frosh Line

The Sophomore line averages in the neighborhood of 170 pounds, while the freshman forwards furnish 160 pounds a man. The only position at which the '25 line possesses an advantage is center. Bob Grant overshadows Earle Wild by 20 pounds. One of the best fights of the scrap is looked for between these two lads. Grant is an expert with a Cornell record while Wild is a hard tackler and very elusive.

The Sophomore right wing, Blake, Stieffel and Davidson, is very husky with 180 pounds to the player. It faces an equally powerful trio, Price, Brockleman and Hastings. Pete Shipley is a strong point in the other '24 wing.

The backfields seem to be unusually close in rank. Harry Ferguson, who gets off like a flash, calls signals for '24, while Johnston, who carries a wicked drop-kick, will name the '25 plays. Halfbacks Taylor and Lehan play a big part in the Sophomore attack. Michelena has won the fullback post on Woodruff's outfit. Ray Leonard, Phil Carrier and Eger complete the frosh backfield.

Sophomore Relay Runners Injured

Tuesday afternoon Coach Kanaly put both class teams through a final time trial to settle the order of running for Field Day. Each team went through the trial as a unit, the men carrying and passing the baton and in every way following the exact procedure for the coming contest. Although he would not announce the definite times made, Kanaly said that the results were very close and to pick a winner from them almost impossible. The frosh showed up particularly well in the baton passing, a difficult feature of relay work for new men and their times were much better than in the earlier trials. The Sophs have the advantage of experience and longer training as well as the added incentive that comes from knowing this year to be their last chance to get "1924" on the Field Day cup. As a result a closely contested race, very different from the walk-away of last year, is looked for.

Sophs Handicapped by Injuries

The factor which has contributed most to clouding the situation is the number of injuries the Sophomore team men have suffered. McHenry, the fastest man running for 1924, has been forbidden by his doctor's orders to compete; Joyce had his hip go bad in practice and it is not known for certain whether he will be able to run; then to add to the troubles for the Sophs, Trench, a regular, and Robeson, a sub, have contracted muscle strains. The men appointed as alternates have not attended practice and now that they may be needed Kanaly faces the difficulty of finding men to replace the casualties. Blodgett, the second sub, will run in McHenry's place and if Joyce is unable to take part, Ambach, who is not ranked as highly as some of the alternates but the only one of them to keep up consistent training since the trials, will replace him. It is expected that either Trench or Robeson will be in shape by Friday. The frosh have had only one injury. Cusulito reported a bad leg at practice Wednesday but is expected to be in shape again in time to run.

Big Opportunity for Frosh

It has been many years since a freshman team has won the relay on Field Day but next Friday, with the Sophomore team suffering under the (Continued on Page 6)
