INSTITUTE ANNOUNCES ARMISTICE DAY HOLIDAY

Following the action of Congress in declaring November 11 to be a national holiday, and that of Governor Cox of Massachusetts in setting it forth as a legal holiday, the Institute has decided to omit exercises in accordance with these proclamations.

This action will necessitate the elimination of the plans for an observance of the day by services at the Institute, Dean Talbot says. These plans had been arranged for prior to the declaration of the holiday but now that the holiday is really a fact the services will not take place.

In his executive proclamation, Governor Cox calls upon all public institutions to observe the day in some fitting manner in remembrance of our "heroic dead." He calls for a period of prayer at 11 o'clock in honor of them.

A. I. E. E. ADMITS ELECTRICALS

Students enrolled in the electrical courses are eligible to membership in the American Institute of Electrical Engineers as student members with essentially the same benefits and privileges accorded to members. This organization which now numbers over twelve thousand includes all the foremost men of the electrical field. The objects of the Institute are the advancement of the theory and practice of electrical engineering and of the allied arts and sciences, and the development of the individual engineer.

The main advantages, it is stated, of joining as student members, consist of the small annual fee of \$3 with no entrance fee to the next higher rank and the privilege of remaining as such for three years. The Journal of the Institute, issued monthly, goes with this membership. The Electrical Engineering Society, which is a branch of the main body, is, however, a distinct organization and maintains separate membership.

TECH SHOW ANNOUNCES ITS 1922 PRODUCTION

**Names Eric F. Hodgins '22 as Successful
Author at Smoker Last Night**

"THE SACRED COW" TITLE OF PLAY SELECTED

At the first smoker for prospective music and lyric writers for the 1922 Tech Show, which was held last evening in Walker Memorial, General Manager L. K. Cowie '22, announced the winning book and its author.

"The Sacred Cow," the name by which the production will be known, was written by Eric F. Hodgins, class of 1922. The author, who comes from New York City and is a course X man, has been connected with various activities in the Institute, mainly publications. He has served on the Tech Engineering News staff, on the Voo Doo staff and as a member of the Woop-Garoo Society.

Reveal Startling Plot

Primarily, "The Sacred Cow" is a travesty. It is also, however, a fantasy, a problem-play, a burlesque, a melodrama and a musical comedy rolled into one. It is evident, early

Starting with these extraordinary circumstances it is easily seen that before the evening is over, almost anything may happen. It does. The Bayonet-and-Can-Opener, an instrument which it is expected, will completely alter the plans of the coming disarmament conference, is stolen, under circumstances of seemingly impenetrable mystery. The occurrence of this theft, taken with the social upheaval mentioned above, comes close to wrecking civilization itself. And yet, by one of the most remarkable coups recorded in dramatic history, the wilting prestige of the Institute is revived, the Bayonet is restored to safety, love comes back to its vacant dwelling, and international peace and concord are forever assured. The action of the play begins in Paris, and ends on the mystic island of Ptomania, a gem of the South Seas.

The method followed in selecting the book to be used as a basis for this year's Show was one in which the names of the authors of the plays submitted were unknown to everyone. In turning in his manuscript, an author instead of signing it, numbered it. With this he also handed in a sealed envelope containing his name together with the number he had placed on his manuscript. After the book to be used was chosen, the envelopes were opened by the committee in the presence of a representative of THE TECH and not until then was it known by anyone but the author, himself, who had written "The Sacred Cow."
