NEW COACH TO BE ANNOUNCED

Dr. Allan W. Rowe, secretary of the Advisory Council on Athletics, and F. M. Kanaly have consented to speak at a meeting of all men interested in hockey at 5 o'clock Tuesday, November 22, in room 10-275. Topics vitally concerning the hockey team are to be discussed at this time. Announcement will be made of the coach for the coming year.

All candidates for both the freshman and varsity teams, and freshmen desiring to enter the competition for freshmen assistant managers are requested to be present. All others interested in hockey here at the Institute and in a winning Technology hockey team are also invited.

Reveal Name of Coach at Meeting

Arrangements are on foot at the present time to secure the services of a well known coach to instruct Institute men in the art of puck-chasing. This man is recognized as one of the best coaches in the hockey game. He has had much previous experience in coaching college teams, having been in the service of the premier colleges as hockey coach.

No announcement will be made as to his name until the arrangements for procuring his services are completed. This will have been done, it is expected, before the meeting, and the announcement will be made of his name at that time along with a few facts concerning himself and his past work.

Further discussion at the meeting will be on topics such as the arrangements made for practice, for meets, a tentative list of the teams with which the Institute teams are expected to meet.

Arrangements are under way to secure the arena the opening night, December 9.

Seats for the meets will be on sale by the T. A. C. These seats will be in the best part of the house, and ample opportunity will be given before the game to purchase them.

All the supper tables are being numbered, and the supper tickets are being printed similar to theatre tickets in that they are numbered by tables. This necessitates that those who wish to sit together buy their tickets together.

Dance Is Formal

The affair is formal and limited to Juniors only. Means will be taken to see that this last stipulation is complied with. At the time of selling the tickets, which will go for \$3.25 a couple, supper tickets and preliminary dance orders will be distributed. The surprises of the evening have not been divulged, but the first will be the form of the tickets, which are probably unique among tickets for any Institute affairs.

The music is in charge of the Copley Plaza Orchestra under the direction of W. Edward Boyle. When Mr. Boyle was asked for his order of dances, it was strongly impressed upon him that all the dances were to be played and no omissions made. In view of that fact, he has allowed plenty of time for each dance, promising three or four encores.

SIAMESE STUDENT INJURED ON BRIDGE

Large Touring Car Skids on Wet Pavement

M. C. Sidhyakorm '25, a student at the Institute and a native of Siam, was severely injured Monday morning on the Harvard Bridge when a machine driven by the chauffeur of Whitney Rhodes '24 skidded into the sidewalk.

Sidhyakorm was crossing the bridge from Boston on his way to the Institute when the large car, occupied by Whitney Rhodes '24 and another student, skidded from the road and veered onto the right hand sidewalk of the bridge. Sidhyakorm was unable to escape from the path of the car and was pinned between it and the bridge.

He was evidently suffering from the injury, and was unable to stand after being released from his dangerous position. After being rushed to the Cambridge Relief Hospital, an examination showed a fractured left pelvis, right jaw, collar-bone and lacerations about the face.

While he is resting fairly comfortably, he is on the danger list, and it is expected that he will be confined to a hospital for at least three or four weeks.

ALUMNI TAKE STEPS TO ORGANIZE CHORUS

Advisory Council Committee Calls Undergraduate Meeting Friday

TOWNSEND TO DISCLOSE PLANS

The Alumni Advisory Council in its last meeting expressed itself as willing to back the proposition of the Musical Clubs for the formation of a Choral society at the Institute. Immediate action was taken and Dr. A. W. Rowe was named as chairman of the sub-committee of Alumni who are to stand behind the organization. Dr. Rowe has called a meeting for undergraduates and Alumni this Friday night at 5 o'clock in room 10-250, at which the first steps will be taken for the permanent formation of the Institute's chorus.

As a fitting opportunity now presented itself for Dr. Rowe to introduce the proposed coach for the chorus, the famous Mr. Townsend of the Detroit and Philadelphia Symphony Orchestras, Dr. Rowe hopes to have Mr. Townsend give a short recital to the assembled undergraduates, during which he will be accompanied at the piano by John Marshall, the organist of Symphony and head of the department of music at Boston University.

Committee Outlines Plan

The outline of the proposed plan of Dr. Rowe, Professor Pearson, and Professor Park, who are the other two members of the committee, is to organize a choral club on a firm basis at the Institute, having as a nucleus those undergraduates who may have had any experience in church choirs or other bodies where high class choral music was used. Then as a second class of men there would be those who could not spare the time or did not care for the lighter class of music as used in the Glee Club. The third class would be men who are interested in music by a love for it, and are desirous of taking advantage of this opportunity to receive coaching under so famous a man as Mr. Townsend. These were the divisions into which Dr. Rowe classified the men to whom he wished to appeal.

Notice of this undergraduate meeting were sent to 3000 Alumni, who were invited to be present at the meeting Friday in order to assist in the formal organization of the chorus.

Dr. Rowe hopes that an organization may be developed which will be able to give perhaps one concert this school year, that to be in Symphony Hall with some well-known soloist as a supporting artist.

Mr. Townsend who is now actively in connection with the Detroit and Philadelphia Symphony Orchestras and with the Society of Friends of Music in New York, so that a great part of his time is taken, will attempt to get a consensus of opinion from the undergraduates as to the time which will be most convenient to all the interested men, to meet him at rehearsals.
