Assistant Managers

STILL CHANCE FOR NEW MEN

The gym team has secured the services of Charles Tischoff, who is coach of both the gym and swimming teams at the Boston Y. M. C. A. Tischoff comes to the Institute with a fine record of service and it is expected that, under his tutelage, the Institute team will make an excellent showing in the Intercollegiate, which are to be held in Walker about the middle of next March.

Coach Tischoff was captain of the Mt. Hermon gym team when he attended that institution. He has also taken a course in physical education at Blue Ridge College, North Carolina.

The work of the Beaver team is well under way and while many of the former stars have reported for duty, there are still a few of the veterans who have not been heard from. It is felt by both Captain Nesmith Thompson '23 and Manager L. J. Porter '23, that there are many men here at the Institute who have ability as gymnasts and any men who perform on the high bar, parallel bars, or who are interested in tumbling are especially urged to come out.

Many Stars Out

Among the men who have already reported for work are N. Thompson '23, this year's captain and a ring performer of some note; W. W. Vicinus '23, an excellent man on the horse; W. S. Bailey '22, who stars on the horizontal bar and is rounding into fine shape; L. M. Littlefield '23, a dual performer, starring in both Indian club and horse work; J. H. Keenan '22, also swings the clubs; Lubrick, a new man this year, is doing fine work on the parallel bars and is eligible for the varsity team; R. W. Wood '22, who has been prevented from working out with the team thus far this year, being laid up with a bad knee, is the team's mainstay at tumbling and it is hoped that he will soon make his appearance with the squad; and J. T. McCoy '24 and H. G. Shea '24 who have been showing up well on the rings.

Manager Porter announces that the gym team plans to give four or five public exhibitions this year before the season begins in order to get the men accustomed to working in public. This is considered an important phase of the work as a few instances of stage fright caused a loss of points for the team last year.

The management wishes to make an announcement at this time that there are competitions being carried on for the positions of assistant managers. This competition is open to Sophomores and freshmen and leads to the position of manager.

Just as sure as the team score for first honors is bound to be one sided, so is the competition for individual honors undoubtedly going to prove one of the keenest that has ever been witnessed in cross-country circles. Any one of a dozen men may cross the finish line first. N. P. Brown, R. E. Brown, Miske, Irish and Captain Carter of Cornell are all dangerous.

Malcolm Douglass of Yale, who pulled such a surprise in the athletic world when he defeated Stallard and McGinnis in the two mile at the Yale-Harvard, Cambridge-Oxford track meet last July, is sure to be well at the front. Incidentally Douglass in the Harvard-Yale dual meet this year covered the New Haven course, where the Intercollegiate were held last season, in thirty seconds faster time than Romig took to win the 1920 classic.

Captain Sanborn and Flanders of Technology, Bob Crawford of Lafayette, Coakley of Dartmouth, Head of University of Pennsylvania and Rick of Princeton are all strong runners and will prove hard men to defeat.

Penn Frosh. Seem Strong

Regarding the freshmen, U. of Penn. seems to have the best all-around team. McLane, Keer, Fisher and Peak, all have enviable track and harrier records. These yearlings swamped Mercersburg. Syracuse also has a strong lineup. Yale 1925 men have defeated the Harvard Yearlings and the Dartmouth youngsters, with Paul Jerman a former New York City prep-school star running, took the measure of Cornell by two points. The Technology team is well rounded but lacks experience.

President Thomas FitzGibbon, of the I. C. A. A. A. who is managing the meet, stated to the writer today that in view of the fact that it was being run off on a Monday, which has never been attempted before, he anticipates a record attendance and has secured a special corps of Police to handle the crowd. Due to the typography at Van Courtlandt Park practically the entire course of the race is visible to spectators standing near the finish.

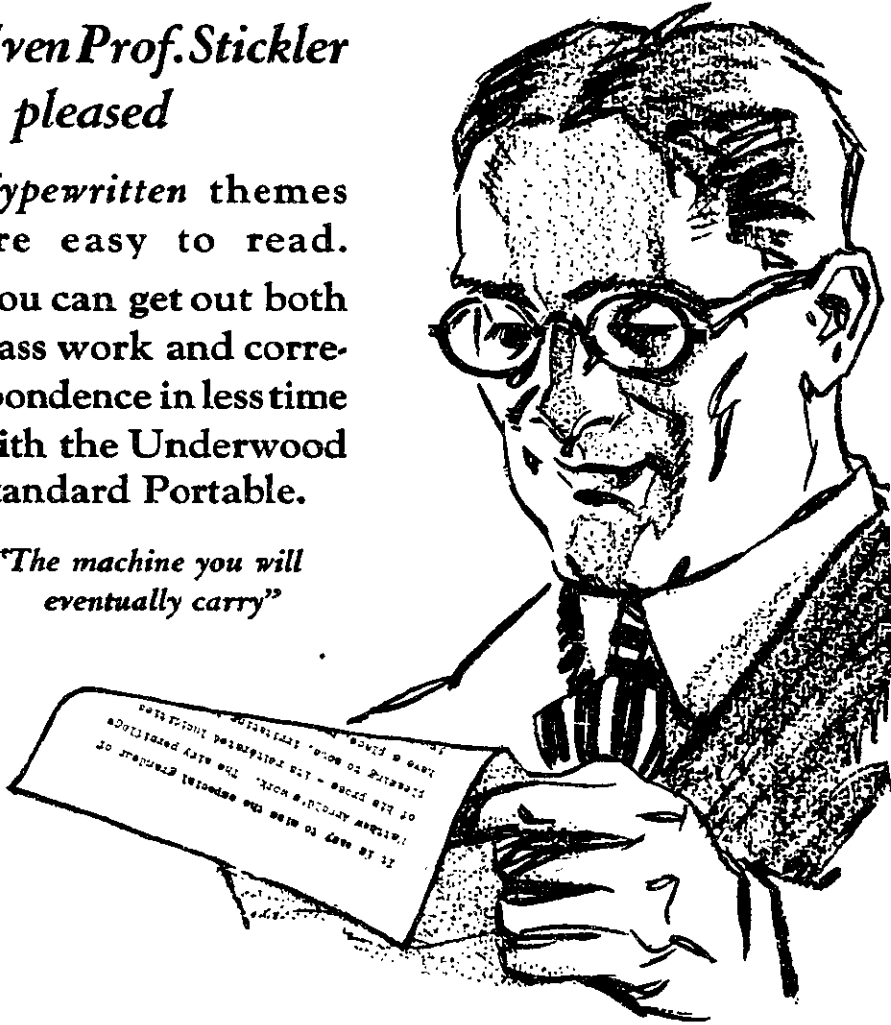
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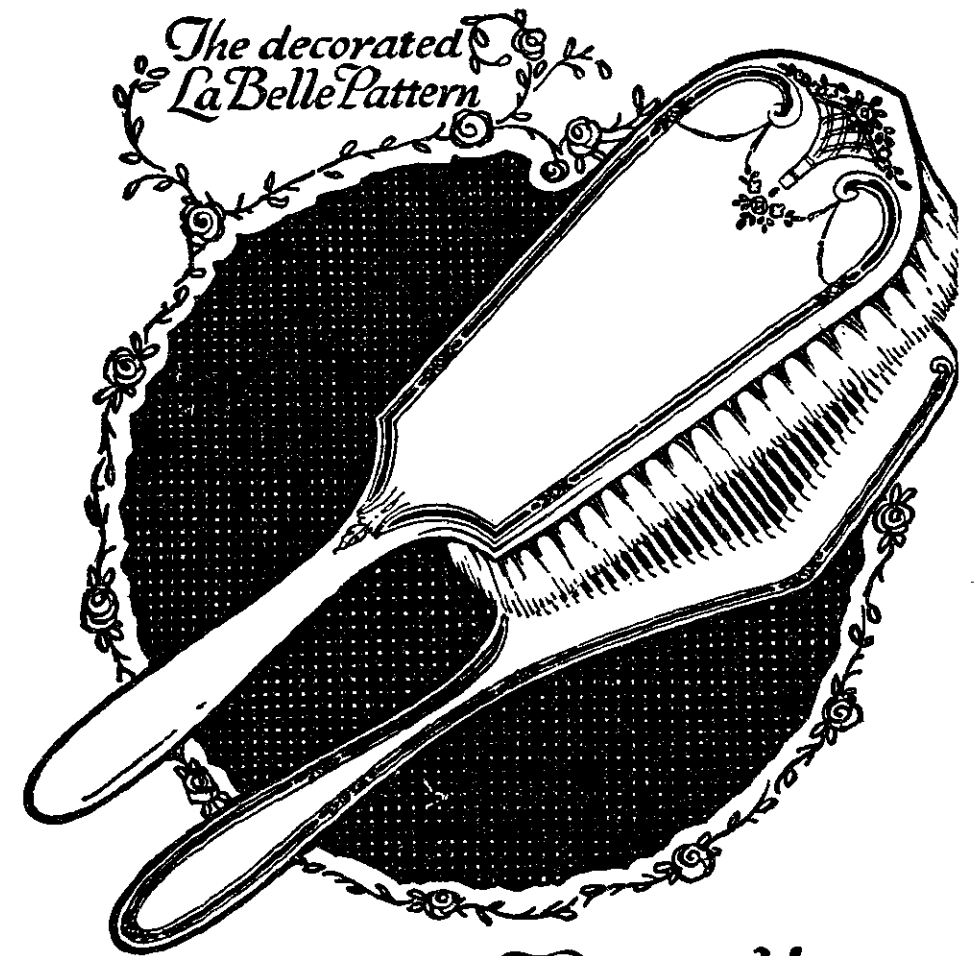
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
