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SWIMMING SQUAD HAS PLACES FOR NEW MEN

Coach Wants More Candidates to Strengthen Squad

A call for more candidates is being issued by the swimming team, due to the decreasing attendance at the last few practices. Nearly 75 men signed up for the sport, but scarcely 50 of these have shown up and Manager Miller is throwing the door open to any new men who have not as yet come out.

Practices have been held by the team for the past two weeks, but nothing definitely has been decided as yet on cutting the squad down. The coach promises the new men who come out a sufficient time to develop their form before time trials will be given them.

The freshman squad is in line for a cut in the near future, but only for the purpose of weeding out the men who reported for swimming to escape the physical training class, and whom it seems inadvisable to attempt teaching the proper racing stroke. Quite a few of the freshmen have had experience in the swimming line before, and look like a good foundation for a successful 1925 team, if more of their classmates turn out to fill up the vacancies in the squad.

Practice was held in the Boston "Y" tank, Monday, as usual, and the coach continued to correct the form of the men and to pay no attention to speed. Because of the length of the training season, the team not having a meet until the second term, the coach can afford to follow this program, and it is unlikely that times will be taken inside of the next ten days. At Monday's practice Coach Sutherland also gave quite a lot of attention to the plungers, and seems hopeful of developing sure winners in this event.

MIKE HOAR WILL RUN AGAIN IF OCCASION ARISES

Mike Hoar states that he is willing to run again if a race can be arranged. It was rumored that Mike was to race W. A. Steadman, chief janitor of Walker Memorial. In regard to this Mike says that he will race any time it is arranged, giving Steadman a handicap in the bargain. Presumably Coach Boutellier is going to arrange the match, as he did last April.

Field Day, Mike raced W. C. Hull '23, making the distance of 71 yards in 10 2/5 seconds. The reason for his running at all, Mike says, is to show the younger generation of athletes that leading a good, clean life will help them greatly as years advance, and always stand them in good stead. There is no limit to a man's activity and usefulness as he ripens with years. "He will only take care of himself when young," states Mike. "The kind of a life that the athlete must lead if he wishes to succeed is the kind of life we all should lead, regardless of whether we are training or not, for what is life after all but a race, and the man that takes the best care of his physical self is the man who generally wins out in this world." Mike himself is a surprising example of his doctrine, and can make as good a showing on the track now as many younger men.

KANALY AND DR. ROWE '01 ADDRESS HOCKEY CANDIDATES

Team Has Secured "Ed" Powers, Canadian Athlete, as Coach

"The Amateur in College Athletics, Especially Hockey," was the subject chosen by Dr. A. W. Rowe '01, in his address to the men interested in hockey at the meeting yesterday. Mr. F. M. Kanaly addressed the men on training, giving them ideas which he has gathered in his past experience as regards the best ways of preparing for the coming season. There were short talks by both Captain H. D. Nickle '23, and the Manager, F. A. Kinch '23.

The coach for the coming year is Ed Powers noted in Canada both as an amateur lacrosse player and hockey coach. The arrangement whereby he was secured has been adjudged quite a feather in the cap of the Institute, Manager Kinch says.

The plans for the team include practice in the afternoons on the Arena ice, starting December 1, and games both here and abroad with such college teams as Dartmouth, Princeton, and Harvard. The freshmen schedule includes games with the freshmen of the above colleges, and several of the better preparatory school teams.

Talks on the College Amateur

Dr. Rowe in his speech gave a brief history of hockey at Technology, telling of the hardships of the first teams and the various difficulties under which they labored. He went on to state that all of these had since disappeared and nothing of this sort will mar the coming season.

Dr. Rowe said that the men would be in the semi-professional atmosphere of the hockey ring where they associated with the members of the various amateur teams. These men, out to gain a win, and thinking that the Technology team is also, will try to show the Institute athletes some of the underhanded tricks of hockey. He urged that this advice be disregarded, and stated that he, speaking for the Advisory Council, desired to state that the members of that Council were anxious to see Technology win, but that they had rather see them win by clean sportsmanship, or not at all.

Mr. Kanaly gave an outline of training rules for the men to use in preparation for the coming season. He told of a schedule to be followed in eating, certain rules to be followed as regards personal hygiene, and of various other ways in which the men might prepare themselves for the strenuous exercise of hockey games. He urged that the advice of the coach be taken wherever the advice he had given was different from that of the coach.

VARSITY QUINTET HAS FIRST CLASS SCHEDULE

Harvard, Brown and Dartmouth Among Opponents

Despite the loss of the Varsity basketball manager an excellent schedule has been arranged by the assistants. Some of the foremost colleges of the East are included in the list. T. A. A. naming the manager for the season of 1921-1922.

He emphasized this factor last year on the Varsity squad and wishes to make it a strong point on the freshman team. The men who are now out seem exceptionally small for a Technology quintet.

NOVICES' BOXING TOURNEY SHOWS UP GOOD PROSPECTS.

Mike Hoar, Timer, Says Freshmen Material is Promising

Action started right off the reel between Barron and Rogers, two of the cub claimants to the 115-pound crown. Rogers took the offensive and his right and left hooks to the face were well-countered by his opponent, who played a waiting game. Barron landed well and although there was plenty of swinging on both sides, Barron covered well and was able later in the fight, to hit his opponent at will. The bout was awarded to Barron.

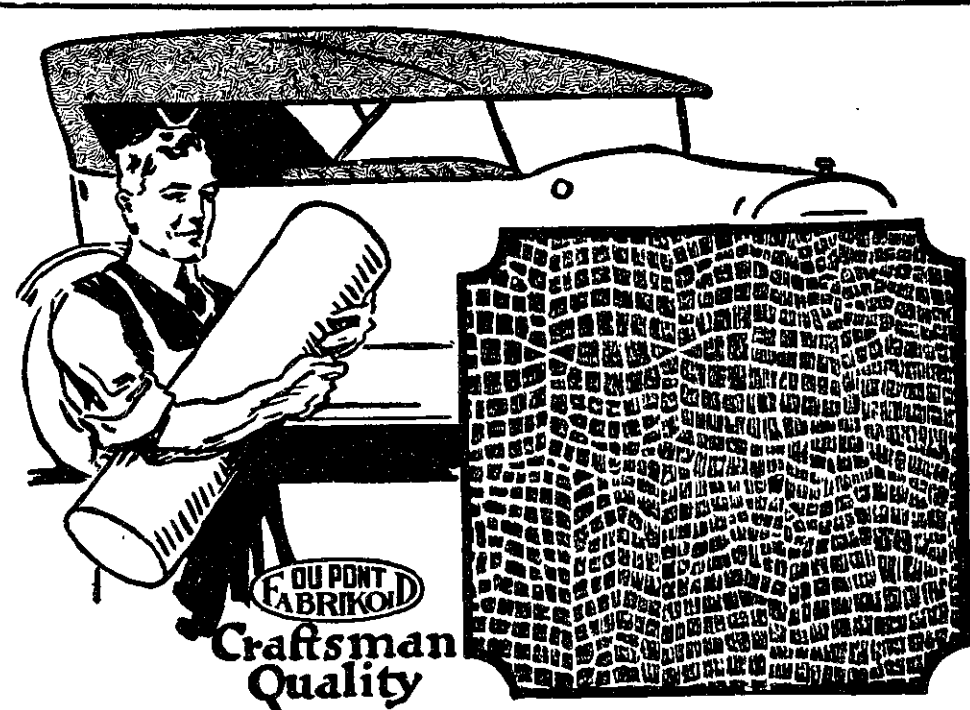

Second Bout Starts

R. W. Chatelaine '25, and J. C. Betts '25, were the mittmen in the 125-pound contest and mixed things well from the start. Chatelaine started off with right and left swings, keeping Betts under guard all the time, the bout getting too hot for the latter and finally given by Referee Dickson to Chatelaine. Both contenders were rangy chaps, Chatelaine's method of attack and cover indicating a good candidate for the frosh team.

The next bout, a 125 pound fray between P. E. Hess '25, and M. Glickman '25, afforded the spectators with much interest and amusement, and was a good exhibition of good wind and endurance against science and hard-hitting. Glickman was plainly the better boxer, covering up well against the attacks of his opponent and following up his punches. Both men evidenced a desire for action, and there was plenty of retaliation. The first round was Glickman, but Hess made a good come-back in the second and with the beginning of the last round both men were well winded. Hess was in better condition, however, and his right jabs to the face staggered Glickman who was pretty well out of wind. The judges awarded it to Hess. Practice for Glickman in countering jabs and the development of a good wind would make him an excellent contender in the 125 pound class.

The Nickerson-Parker contest for the 135 pound crown was of doubtful outcome, Parker carrying the fight and Nickerson covering up well and hooking to the stomach on countering Parker's hooks.



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
