

FRENCH ARCHITECT MAKES PLANS FOR EASTMAN COURT

M. Jaques Greber, the French architect who won the competition for the conversion of the fortifications of Paris into housing space, is a visitor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology for the purpose of studying the dormitories of the Institute in connection with the mission on which the French government sent him to America.

He is also engaged, in connection with Welles Bosworth, the architect of Technology, with whom he studied in the same atelier in Paris, in drawing up a plan for the architectural treatment of Eastman Court, the large space immediately in front of the main entrance to the Institute, which is flanked on one side by duPont Court and on the other by Lowell Court. This plan Mr. Bosworth hopes to be able to present to the Corporation before long.

MECHANICALS VISIT PLANT OF SIMPLEX WIRE COMPANY

He has been active in many scientific societies, and received the Rumford medal of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1905. He has received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science from Dartmouth, Doctor of Laws from Colgate, Clark and Wesleyan in 1909, from the University of Pittsburgh and Vermont in 1912, from Dennison in 1914, and from Dartmouth in 1916.

THE ELEVEN BEATS THE T. E. N.

Once more THE TECH'S gridiron warriors plunged through with a 31-0 victory, when Tuesday afternoon they met Tech Engineering News' polished team on Tech Field. Playing an even better game than last week, the journalists' line-men careened hither and thither across the grass, while "Bad" Dickson zigzagged up and down the field with the ball.

Whenever THE TECH had the ball, the scientists held firmly except where the play came through. In the last quarter, with 7 to go on the last down, Charlie Toll rushed through a skin-tackle play for an 11-yard gain.

Both teams seemed a little leery of passes, although Dickson slipped two overhands to Ferguson for twenty yards apiece. Mouse intercepted one of the Engineers' passes in the second quarter and ran it 20 yards up the field.

Among the features of the game, however, were the delayed passes, kicks, and runs by the T. E. N. Throughout the first two quarters the team advanced steadily backward as long as it held the ball, and twice came very near to scoring a touchback. In the last half of the game, however, the T. E. N. adopted mass formations for the offensive, and managed to hold their own a large part of the time.

SUBSCRIPTIONS ALMOST DOUBLE

With an idea of further boosting the circulation of THE TECH, the Managing Board of Volume XLI prepared a special issue yesterday which was mailed to 13,000 alumni. The paper was filled entirely with stories that bore special interest to former students of the Institute.

This effort to get more alumni subscribers for THE TECH is a part of the campaign for an increased circulation. Since last year the circulation of the paper has very nearly been doubled and more subscriptions are coming in every day. Shortly after the beginning of the fall term, letters were sent to the parents of every student of the Institute asking them to subscribe that they might be kept posted on the occurrences at the school where their son is a student. The response from these letters was considered very good.

Omit Advertisements in Issue

The issue yesterday was put out without advertisements so that as much news material could be included as possible. Cuts of the All-Technology smoker, Frank Kanaly, track coach, and Mr. Stephen S. Townsend, coach of the newly-formed choral society which was originated by certain alumni, and the Red Cross honor flag won by the Institute last year, were run, together with representative Editorials, Loungers, and sport stories.

A special message from A. J. Brown '22, General Manager of THE TECH, occupied part of the front page and contained an appeal to the alumni to take advantage of this opportunity to keep themselves posted on affairs at the Institute. He calls to their attention that \$400 was spent to give them a chance to subscribe and keep the Alumni in close touch with their Alma Mater.

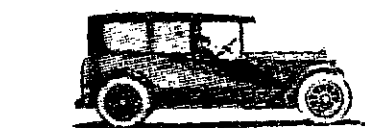
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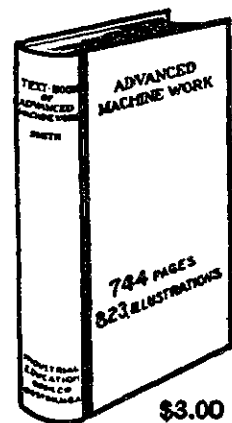
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
