Skiing Season on at McGill
McGill University recently began preparations for the coming winter sports when the first general meeting of the Ski Club was held and plans for the coming season formulated. Arrangements have practically been completed whereby a jump will be erected in the University Stadium which will provide for a jump of at least thirty feet. A smaller jump will be provided for those who are putting on skis for the first time and arrangements have been made with the Department of Physical Education permitting first and second year men to substitute skiing for the regular requirements of that department. Negotiations are also on foot for the use of the Montreal Ski Club jumps on Cote des Neiges road, which have recently been rebuilt, and it is expected to see some of the Eastern records broken this winter. It is thought possible that the club may make a few week-end trips to some point in the Laurentian Mountains.

Work on the new jumps in the stadium is to begin in the near future and their completion will provide means for sufficient practice. In the past the lack of facilities has made it impossible for jumpers to practice without going to the mountain course. Weekly handicaps will be held on the new jumps throughout the winter.

There will be two Intercollegiate Ski Meets this winter, the first will be the first week in February at Dartmouth and the second a week or two later at McGill. Neither date has been definitely arranged. It is expected that two more American colleges will enter the Ski Association this year, one of them being Colgate University. The Eastern Intercollegiate Ski Association, which was formed last spring, will meet at an early date to draw up schedules and rules.

Marquette Has Unique Club

What promises to be the rarest and most unique organization of its kind in the world is in the making at Marquette University and is called the "Proletarian's Club." Though little has been known of it until recently, it has been in existence since the first of the term. During the last few weeks its membership has increased over one hundred per cent and promises to assume even greater proportions.

The purpose of the club, as the name signifies, is to bring together students from all walks of life and there are no officers, no dues or anything that will give one man prestige over another. The chairman for each meeting is determined by drawing lots. All excessive and unnecessary expenses are avoided; any that do arise are paid for by a collection taken up among the members.

In 1897, while he was travelling through Europe and America on Government's commission, ownership of the Miike Colliery was transferred to the Mitsui family, whereon he entered the service of the Mitsui as manager of the Miike coal mines. Upon inauguration of the Mitsui Mining Company he was promoted to its chief managing director.

Since then his services have been requisitioned by various departments of the Mitsui enterprise until he has now become general managing director of the Mitsui Gomei Kaisha, the holding company of all the Mitsui interests. Following are some of the positions with which his name has been identified: director of the Mitsui Mining Company; chairman of the board of directors of the Hokkaido Colliery and Steamship Company; chairman of the board of directors of the Nippon Steel Works; director of the Shibaura Engineering Works; and advisor to the Electric Chemical Industry Company.

Held Many Important Posts
Dr. Dan holds various posts in public and semi-public institutions, nota-

ble among them being chairman of the board of directors of the Industrial Club, special member of the Tokio Chamber of Commerce, councillor to the Labour and Capital Cooperation Society, manager of the Mining Association and many other posts of note.

In 1884 Dr. Dan was married to Yoshiko Kaneko, sister to Viscount Kaneko, and has six children—two boys and four girls. His favorite pastime is in reading and hence he has a wide range of books.

Dr. Dan's services have been officially recognized with the following honors: Degree of Doctor of Engineering, and the Third Class Order of the Sacred Treasure. He was also honored by the Chinese Government in

1918 with the Second Class Golden Ear Decoration.

Saturday evening the class of '78 gave a dinner at the University Club in Dr. Dan's honor.

Dr. Dan came to Boston from New York and Washington and after his visit in Boston will return to New York and will sail for England on December 13.

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
