He seems well pleased with the general form shown during practice. There is still opportunity for men to come out for the squad. Any freshmen desirous of trying for the position of freshman assistant managerships are requested to see Manager F. A. Kinch '23 after 3 o'clock at room N303 in the dormitories. Several more could be used.

Practice will continue three times a week at least, and the days for this will be posted on the hockey bulletin board in front of the bursar's office. These practices will come on week days except Saturdays from 5 to 6 o'clock.

RUNNERS PREPARE FOR BOARD TRACK TRIALS

The track squad is putting in this week in preparation for the final trials of the season on December 10, 12 and 13. The sprints will be run on Saturday, December 10, the middle distance on the following Monday, and the mile on Tuesday. Last spring he finished fourth in the New England and placed second and third in the meets with Dartmouth and Harvard. Hendrie has earned a full "T" with one star.

Besides Hendrie, three other members of this year's squad will be eligible for competition next fall. L. H. Poor '23 is a consistent runner who scored in every meet this season. Both R. E. Robertson '24 and G. R. Holt '24, though a little inexperienced, show much promise.

FRESHMEN BOXERS STAGE TEAM ELIMINATION BOUTS

Three Round Contests Refereed by Massachusetts
Boxing Commissioner

MEDALS AWARDED TO VICTORS

The final instalment of the freshmen elimination boxing bouts last Friday afternoon at the Walker gymnasium gave the enthusiastic audience plenty of speed and action. There were four bouts and all awards were made by Referee G. E. Dixon of the Massachusetts Boxing Commission, and medals presented to the winners by J. H. Fitzpatrick.

In the 125-pound class, R. L. Dietzold was defeated by R. W. Chatelain. P. B. Goble defeated M. Barrangan in the 135-pound contest. The 145-pound fray went to four rounds, featuring A. M. Prentiss and J. M. Lynch, in which the former was awarded the decision. H. C. Trask and A. V. Alm were the contenders for the 158-pound crown, which Trask finally copped. Half the bouts were of three two-minute rounds, the 135-pound and 145-pound contests going to four rounds. Mike Hoar officiated as time-keeper. G. E. Dixon of the state boxing commission refereed the bouts and made all decisions. The bouts were conducted by assistant boxing managers, G. F. Eaton '24, and Jack Hamner '24.

Dietzold and Chatelain put up a good bout in the 125-pound contest. Chatelain using a right hook a good deal of the time. The third round found both men strong for a comeback and willing to take for the sake of giving. Dietzold was short on both wind and face covering and a right hook to his jaw by Chatelain lost him the fight.

135-Pounders Go Four Rounds

The Barrangan-Goble fray went to four rounds, despite Goble's frantic efforts to end it in less. The first round saw Goble forcing the fight, with his opponent on the retreat, making a good comeback in the next round. The third round found both men winded and therefore the action was rather slow. Referee Dixon awarding another round. Goble again took up the gage of battle, and by taking the lead, obtained the decision.

The 145-pound contest saw another four-round bout, this time between Prentiss and Lynch. Lynch took the offensive at first, and although he kept his face well covered, his stomach was left open. Prentiss played a waiting game, however, and followed up constantly with a left hook, flooring Lynch just at the end of the second round. The third two-minute interval saw even fighting on both sides, and more foot-work than boxing. The last round saw the bout awarded to Prentiss, when he tardily awoke to the fact that Lynch's stomach was uncovered, and loosed a series of left and right hooks to that vicinity.

Alm and Trask in Fast Bout

The Alm-Trask battle for the 158-pound crown was the feature bout of the afternoon. Trask proved the more aggressive and his foot-work kept him well out of reach of his opponent's blows. Alm landed several times at first, but exhibited no punch otherwise quite a different tale would have been told. The second round saw Trask still leading, although Alm once sent over a stinging cross-counter that staggered his rival for a moment. Then Trask began using a left jab that landed well and if followed up, would have ended the fight. Alm constantly left his face open, and Trask's left hooking and jabbing blinded his opponent and gave the aggressor the fight.

SQUAD HELD MEETING FRIDAY

"One of the hardest schedules the swimming team has ever faced," is the way that Manager Miller describes the meets which are in front of the Technology tank men. The schedule includes three home meets, Yale, Amherst and Wesleyan coming to the Boston "Y" tank.

The two strong meets away from home will undoubtedly be with the Annapolis and the Brown teams. Brown has two of the best dash men in the country on its team, Davy Jones, who was a close second to Norman Ross in the 100-yard dash last year, and Gordon Smith. On the Annapolis trip Rutgers will also be met, and a more satisfactory score than the one point defeat of last year should be run by the Beaver swimmers.

Not to be forgotten in importance is the West Point meet on February 4. The Army team is an uncertain factor due to the Military Academy having had a team for only the last few years, and this being the first time that Technology has ever scheduled a meet with them. The announcement of particular courses to be given, will be advertised later.

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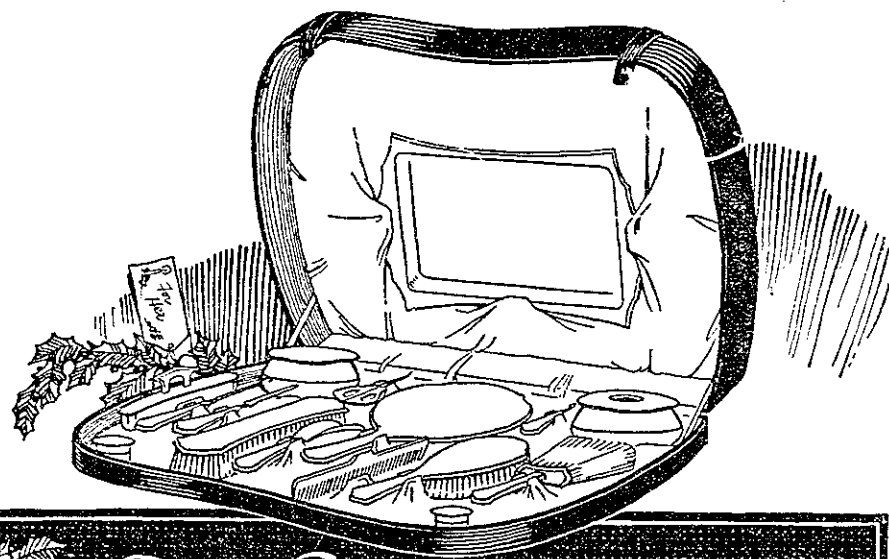
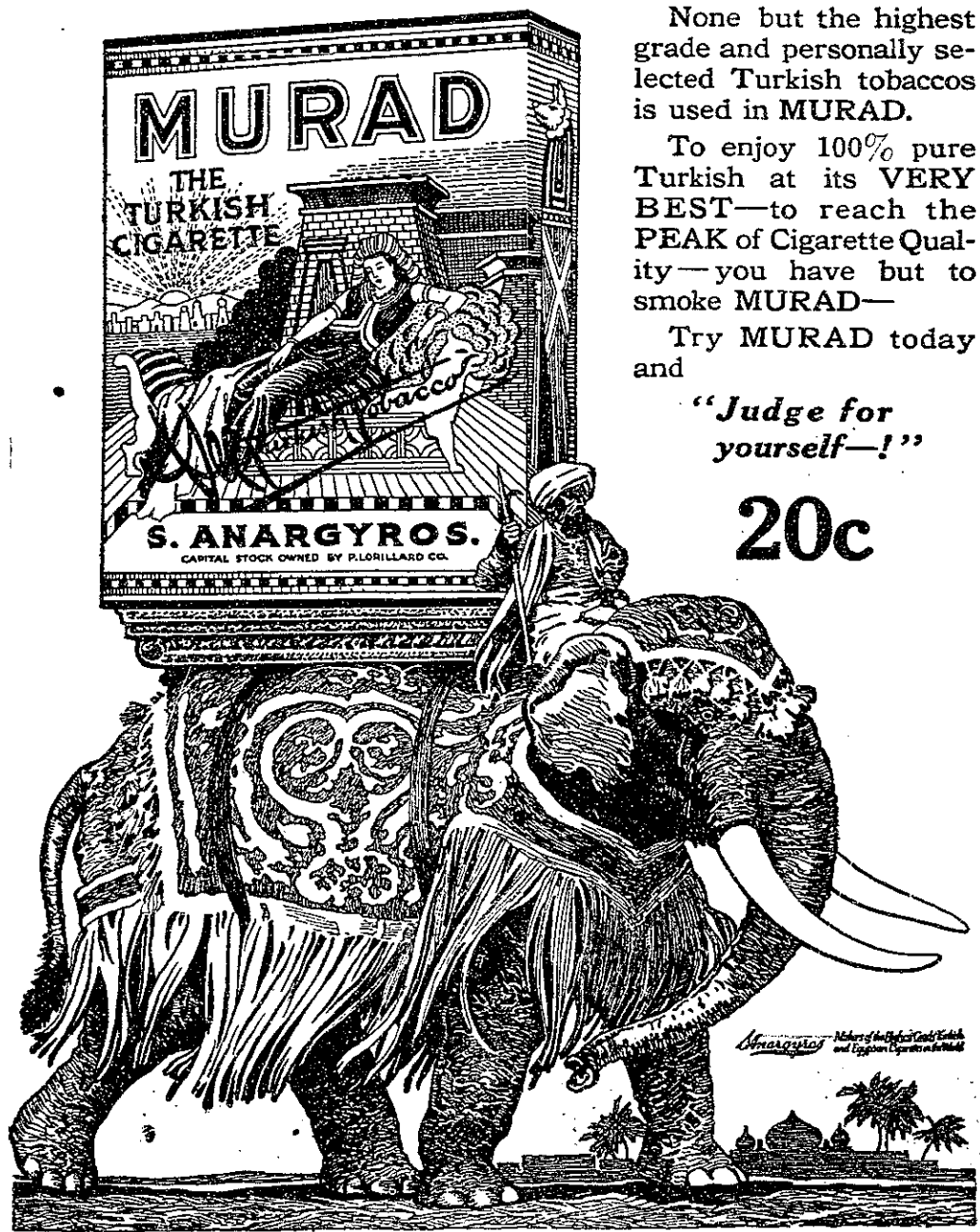
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
