PLANS FOR BOXING SEASON RAPIDLY BECOMING SETTLED

Medals for Freshman Tournament
Have Been Ordered

Both the boxing program and the team are taking form. The schedule for the season is rounding into shape, and the ablest men are coming into prominence. The medals which Mr. Fitz Patrick is giving to the winners of the freshman tournament have been ordered, and will probably be awarded before the Christmas vacation.

The first boxing meet of the season will take place on January 21, with either Boston University or Springfield. The final elimination will probably be made about January 10.

The schedule will include West Point, Boston University, Annapolis, Yale, Springfield, and either McGill or Princeton. This program is harder than the Technology pugilists usually take on, but the management feels that the varsity material is showing up sufficiently well to justify it.

Candidates for the 115-pound class include G. L. Lindsay of last year's freshman team, Tom Barnard, and Fitz Paul, varsity veterans, and Smith of last year's freshmen. A new man, Cook, also shows up well.

In the 135-pound class the team will have L. R. Phillips, the amateur champion of Australia. He has injured his hand, but will be in the ring again by the first of the year. Charlie Kuhn, of the '24 team, and A. O. Schultz, are also fighting for a place.

In the 145-pound class, E. I. Moll, this year's captain, and also last year's freshman leader, assumes the principal role. There is, however, other good material.

BEAVER GYM CAPTAIN HEADS CONFERENCE

Dan Sayre will take on 160-pound opponents if he can train down to it. His maximum limit thus far was attempting to whip Eddie Eagan. I. J. Konrisky, and Marks of the last frosh team, will be in this class.

From present appearances the 175-pound fighters will all be from the lower class, unless Charlie Reeves of last year's varsity can be persuaded to come out.

An effort will be made to see that the men do not break training to too great an extent while celebrating their momentary liberty after Santa Claus' visit.

UNDERGRADUATE MEETINGS

A committee has been appointed by the Institute Committee to consider the advisability of holding undergraduate meetings on Sunday afternoons. The gatherings are to be addressed by men prominent in the affairs of the nation. This was the practice at Technology in 1916, but was discontinued during the war.

C.A.A.G.A. HOLDS BIG NEW YORK MEETING

Intercollegiate Gym Meet Will
Be Held Next March
in Walker

MANY RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

The annual meeting of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Gymnasts of America was called to order at 2:30 o'clock last Saturday in the Trophy Room of the New York Athletic Club by Nesmith Thompson '23, captain of the Institute gym team, who acted as chairman for the association. The meeting was conducted in a business-like manner by Thompson whose convincing personality was reflected in the enthusiastic manner in which those present expressed their desire to further gymnastics as a sport.

At this meeting the date of the Intercollegiate Gym Meet, which is to be held in Walker, was announced as March 31, 1922. The Technology team manager, L. J. Porter '23, announces that the meet will probably be over at 10 o'clock and will be followed by a dance.

Partial Schedule Is Arranged

The following colleges had representatives at the conference: M. I. T., Annapolis, University of Pennsylvania, Yale, Harvard, Haverford and New York University. The Institute has received an invitation from Annapolis to a meet on March 18, and has been accepted pending the approval of the M. I. T. A. A. There will probably be a meet with Brown on February 4. The Beavers have definitely arranged a triangular meet with Harvard and Haverford on February 18. The team expects to take a trip to Dartmouth between February 18 and March 31.

Kramer Allowed to Compete

The case of Kramer, a noted gymnast of New York University, was taken up. Last year there was a question in regard to his eligibility on account of his being confused with his brother, who is also a member of the N. Y. U. team. It was decided that inasmuch as the four year ruling of the association applies only to intercollegiate meets, and Kramer has only participated in three, he is eligible this year. Since the by-laws have not as yet covered dual meets he can also compete in dual meets as well. The importance of Kramer's case lies in the fact that the existence of a gym team at N. Y. U. this year depended on his being eligible due to the fact that he is capable of placing in four of the events. The association was anxious to have him compete in the interest of gymnastics in general.

Several Resolutions Adopted

Several resolutions were presented at the meeting and the following were adopted. The Intercollegiate Gym Meet will be held at M. I. T. on March 31, 1922. Hereafter this meet will be held on the last Friday of March unless it is Good Friday in which instance it will be held on the preceding Friday. Managers will be required to send their schedules for the year to Mr. Krauss, secretary and treasurer of the association, before December 15, 1921. Mr. Krauss is to be notified immediately of a change in the schedules, and the judges are to be notified at least four or five days before any particular meet. Suggestions as to available judges in the vicinity of the various colleges should be sent to Mr. Krauss before December 15, 1921. In the future all meets will be provided with special score board which will have all the events listed in an effort to increase the interest of spectators by enabling them to understand thoroughly each event.

A New Point System Inaugurated

According to a new ruling the maximum number of points obtainable is ten, five for form and five for difficulty. A new four place system was recognized to be used in triangular meets only and will count as 5, 3, 2, and 1, thus giving the winner a decided victory and the poorer men a chance to score. Even in these meets it is optional. This was adopted as a result of Harvard objecting to the three point system on the grounds that the only the stars were given the opportunity of displaying their ability and consequently did not show the worth of the team.

Hereafter it will be the duty of one of the assistant managers of each team to write up each meet in which it participates, the story to be taken to the Associated Press the night of the meet in person to insure publicity and to create public interest in gymnastics. Copies of write-ups as they appear in the papers are to be sent to Mr. Krauss so that a record may be kept of the various meets.

I. C. A. A. G. A. Joins Olympic Asso.
Krauss reported that he had registered the I. C. A. A. G. A. as a member of the American Olympic Association which assures colleges a voice in the selection of candidates to be sent to the Olympics.

Most of the cross-country veterans are out on the boards training for the wo-mile relay. Bob Hendrie, however, is starting right in on the two-mile run which he expects to run this winter and probably in the Penn Relays this spring.

TWENTY PUCK-CHASERS SURVIVE HOCKEY CUT

With only 20 men surviving the cut in the hockey squad made last Saturday and Monday, intensive practice will begin. The original number of 50 who came out for the team made it very difficult for the men to practice in any kind of form or for the coach to give the men the required amount of individual attention. If there are any other men who desire to try out for the squad, they should report to either the captain or manager of the team at the Arena at the time for practice as posted on the hockey bulletin board.

The Beaver skaters will probably face McGill during the Christmas holidays. Many of the men on the squad will remain in Boston during this period and the team will be picked for this game from these men. However, the composition of the team will be altered from time to time as the athletes show up in practice.

Practice for the squad will be held at least three times a week. No definite schedule of times for practice has been announced, the dates being posted on the bulletin board in front of the bursar's office. As soon as definite arrangements can be made with the Arena certain days and times will be set aside for practice.

A call was recently sent out at Cornell for candidates for the winter track team. It was well answered. Their winter track work is confined to the board track which has recently been constructed.

OPEN BASKETBALL SEASON SATURDAY

Team Picked for Opening Date
with Northeastern—Three
Veterans in Lineup

YEARLINGS SHOW PROMISE

The Beaver Basketball team starts its season on Saturday with a home game against Northeastern University. The coach has announced the lineup to start against Northeastern: Coleman, center, Tonen and Landis, guards, Captain Hubbard and Blood, forwards. Of these all but Coleman and Landis are last year's regulars. Burke is the only man not available this year but Bretting, last year's center, has not been attending practice regularly and will not start the game Saturday.

With all except one of last year's team on hand and a number of promising new men reporting regularly the prospects for the season are very good. Coach Allen has twenty men left on his Varsity squad, after making the first and second cuts, and these are working in the Walker gym three times a week. Whenever the crowded facilities permit an extra drill is held.

The Beavers have scheduled a number of hard games for the coming season and are looking for a strenuous year. Several of the games have not been definitely decided upon, however, and the complete list will not be given out by the management until these are arranged. It is intended to run dances in the gym after the games this year as was done last season, but it has not been decided whether or not arrangements for Saturday night can be made.

Frosh Team Rounding into Shape

Coach Nelson, in charge of the 1925 basketball men, says that a large number, including some promising material, have reported for practice which has now been going on for over a week. The first cut in the squad was made Tuesday after a short scrimmage with the Varsity outfit. This cut, Nelson says, is in no way important in forming the team, as one or two more will still be necessary before a final choice is made. It was needed, however, to bring the squad down to a more manageable size and to enable him to give individual attention to those who show the greatest promise.

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
