TECHNOLOGY PLEASES JAPANESE COMMISSION

Kanejiro Matsumoto Gives Merchants' Opinions

SURPRISED AT ENDOWMENT

New York, Dec. 6. (Special to THE TECH)—Kanejiro Matsumoto, connected with Dr. Takuma Dan's commission, was interviewed today concerning the opinion of the Japanese business men in regard to American educational institutions. Mr. Matsumoto consented to prepare a few words on the opinion of the merchants, after they had inspected the school of their leader, the Institute. Dr. Dan graduated with the class of 1878.

Expresses Visitors' Appreciation

Mr. Matsumoto wrote: "I was greatly pleased to see the various departments of Technology, especially with the colleagues of one of its old alumni, Dr. Dan. I will try to give a few lines about what the members of the party felt when they saw that wonderful institution.

"There is no doubt that this is one of the biggest and most perfect schools of technology in the world," said a member of the party, "and both the system of its laboratories and the way they teach are the most modern and seem to be giving marvellous results."

Surprised by Private Gifts

"Another member of the party says, 'It is just wonderful that this institution has made such a quick development in such a comparatively short period. We are surprised especially by the fact that this whole project has been completed solely by private donations. This would be impossible in Japan, now, and will be for some time in the near future. Such an enormous amount as \$12,000,000 donated by a single person, Mr. Eastman, is simply wonderful. It shows how important the eminent men of this country think this sort of an organization is to the cultivation of a nation and to the world at large.'

"As Dr. Dan said when he met the students, alumni, and faculty at Walker Memorial the other day, 'This institution was that of America in older days, but has become now that of the world. And when I think of this fact, I hardly know how to conceive all that these donors contributed to the happiness of mankind.'

Admires Donors' Spirit

"Still another member says, 'This is a source where students can get both scientific study and practical experiences at the same time. This can be done only with such magnificent equipment as is in these buildings. And such equipment wealth alone can not afford unless it is accompanied by the men who are well aware of the importance of such an institution. Thus what we have to bring home as a souvenir from Technology is not only the fact that the enormous wealth of those individuals of your country built such a magnificent edifice of education, but also that there was something besides wealth which brought the completion of this institution to success,—that is, that these eminent men were fully aware of the importance of such a school.'

Vaudeville of an extremely good character is to be seen at Keith's this week. There are several good comedy and dancing acts from which it is difficult to pick the best.

The Mosconi Brothers and Sister Verna offer their well known dancing act. Trixie Friganza opened her "Little Bag of Tricks" and made a hit with some very funny songs and stories. Perhaps the greatest en-

thusiasm came when she began to dance. Harry Burns and Steve Freda, in a comedy skit entitled "I Think You Touch," drew more than the usual amount of applause. Jimmie Dooley and Corinne Sales presented their act which has been seen before but which proved to be still popular.

Others were the "Eight Blue Deamons," a sensational acrobatic act, Howard Langford and Ina Frederick in "Shopping," Jack Wyatt and his Scotch Lads and Lassies, Martha Pryor, with repertoire of songs, and Laura and Billy Dreyer in a dancing act.

"BUNTY PULLS THE STRINGS"

The revival of "Bunty Pulls the Strings" at the Copley Theater is remarkable for its intelligent characterization of Scottish life. The Jewett Players are thoroughly at home in the piece, speaking the Scottish dialect as if it were their native tongue.

"Bunty Pulls the Strings" is a fairly modern farce-comedy, plausible and enjoyable as well. The scenes are laid in a small Scottish village about the year 1860, and the play concerns itself with the fortunes of a country tradesman and his family. Bunty, the daughter of the tradesman, is the household diplomat, whose management of domestic affairs is the basis of the plot and the humor of the play. She shows her father how to manage his son, she shows the elders how to run the Presbyterian church, she aids her father, a widower, in striking a sensible match, and recovers a fortune for her own sweetheart. In fact, there is little she does not do, serving the modern playwright as the "deus ex machina" served the Greeks.

ADMIRAL TSAI SPEAKS BEFORE CHINESE CLUBS

A reception was given last Sunday afternoon by the Chinese Clubs of Boston and vicinity, in honor of Admiral Ting Kan Tsai, who is a delegate to the Washington Conference. The meeting was held in the Philips Brook's House at 2:30 o'clock.

Thirty Per Cent for Food

The money contributed here in America is expended by the International Relief Committee in conjunction with its own work of relief. The funds have been approximately apportioned as follows: Food and medical aid, 30 per cent; Clothing, 17 per cent; housing, 3 per cent; books, 7 per cent; self help, 3 per cent; refugee students, 23 per cent; Administration, 17 per cent.

Nearly all the work of relief is done by voluntary workers, many of whom have come to the service of the Federation directly from work on the various commissions which functioned during the war, and thus are trained in such work.

ROGERS BUILDING HARBORS VARIED EXHIBIT NEXT WEEK

The exhibition being held this week in the Rogers Building is one of more than ordinary interest. It includes the traveling exhibit of the Beaux Arts Institute of Design; studies by Mr. Lloyd Morgan, winner of the Paris Prize of 1921; studies by Mr. Carla, winner of the Grand Prix de Rome in 1920; and a large number of sketches by George R. Wren '22, who, it will be remembered, designed the clever poster for Tech Show 1921, The Purple Dragon.

Perhaps of even greater interest is a model of the "National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception," to be erected at Washington, D. C. When completed it will be one of the world's greatest cathedrals. Magennis and Walsh of Boston are the architects.

The exhibit is one of many which are to be held during the year, and is open to the public.
