an accurate measure of undergraduate opinion.

Owing to the approach of exams and to a lack of publicity at this time on the matter, no action is to be taken now by the joint committee. It is planned that early next year the meetings will be held and the question will be discussed and a conclusion reached.

A Report Committee is now drawing up a detailed account of the findings of the Student Tax Revision Committee and the vote of the section leaders will be considered one of the strongest indications to be portrayed in the report. The report will then be subjected to the Executive Committee of the Corporation which will consider it and act accordingly. It will require action by the Corporation to increase the tax and the question will be considered by it at its meeting the last Wednesday in March.

D. F. Carpenter '22, president of the Senior Class, has appointed L. S. Vodner, chairman of a committee composed of A. S. King '22, M. M. Shirey '22, H. R. Boyer '22, and T. R. Tonon '22, to supervise the elections of Senior representatives who are to serve as section representatives in this class.

been principally in the line of alternating currents and machinery. He has done much toward perfecting the induction motor, and the results of his experiments with core losses and transients in an electric circuit are generally utilized throughout the industry.

He is the author of many books on subjects appertaining to electricity, both pamphlets on his experiments and longer treatises on special branches of the art. His best known works are those on his deductions on core losses and transients, he being the author of many empirical equations much used in designing alternating current machinery.

To the Members of the Instructive Staff:

In the necessary routine of the work of the day it is likely that you have not given the thought you would like to give on the Student Friendship Fund that is opened in Technology this week. For that reason, we the undersigned, being especially interested in the use of this fund for the aid of professors in the universities of Central Europe, are writing you this letter.

The Institute Committee has taken the Fund in charge, joining the Institute with the entire college world of America in a work of friendship and good will for the needy university world of Central Europe. That splendid work is the reconstruction of the university life of those nations that are blindly, yet courageously facing the terrific problems of peace. A practical work has been done in the way of feeding students and professors; supplying equipment for scientific schools; enlarging every avenue of self-help that is opened and in creating at every university center a new life and a new hope. The student relief work of the World Student Christian Federation, comprising the Christian stu-

dent movement of forty-two countries, has been done in a spirit that has prompted a movement of reconciliation and good will which is a new chivalry of twentieth century culture. The American college world can now express a friendship which these brethren abroad sorely need.

You have been supplied with a brief report of the work that has been done. It is hoped that you will help in any way you can. What you do give will be a real effort in practically meeting the needs of the University work of Central Europe. Professor Walter Humphreys will act as Treasurer of the Instructing Staff Fund. Your check or cash can be sent to him or left with any of the undersigned. Contributions may be expressly given, if desired, for any University in Central Europe where the donor may have studied, or to a special group of professors.

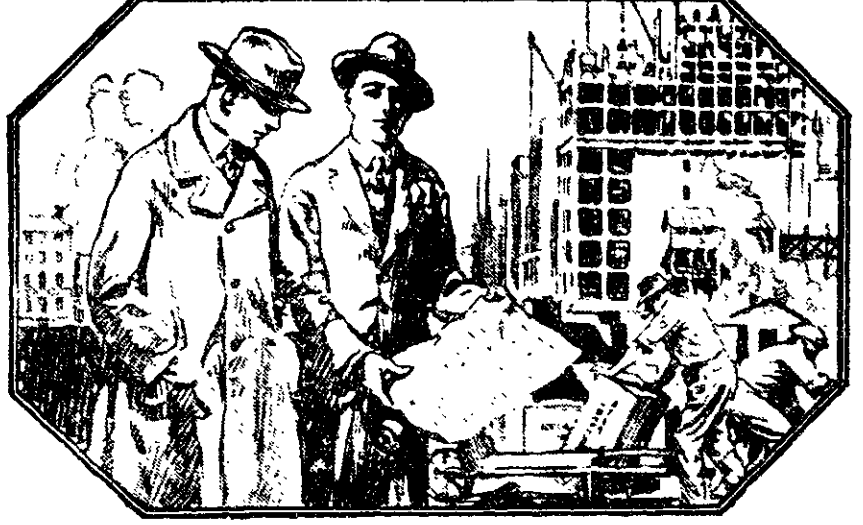
