\$40,000 Pledged
The colleges of the so-called Eastern Area, being the largest and most numerous in the country, have had \$200,000 of the \$500,000 to be raised in the United States assigned as their quota. No definite time has been set for the drive, however, and as a result many schools are postponing their campaigns until after the Christmas holidays.
The returns thus far cover only a small portion of the sum needed. Twenty-five thousand dollars has been actually received by the Federation while definite pledges bring the total up to \$40,000. Beside Technology, Wesleyan, Wheaton, Vassar, U. of Pittsburgh, U. of Penn., Rochester, and Rutgers are completing their drives this week and can be expected to add materially to the total, while Harvard, Princeton, Brown and many others have scheduled campaigns shortly after the return from the holidays.

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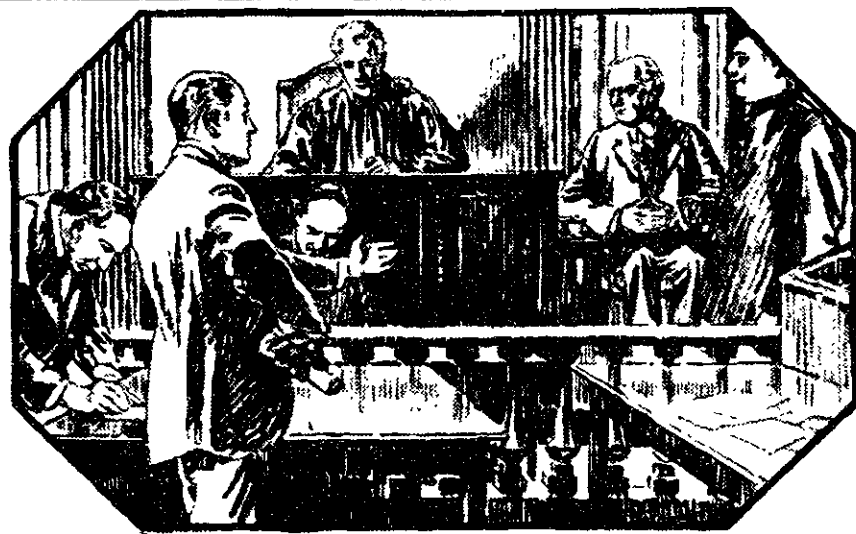
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
