COACH PLEASED WITH HOCKEY TEAM ON ICE

Makings of Successful Team in Present Squad of 20 Men Says Coach Powers

GAME WITH MCGILL DECEMBER 29

Coach Powers, and others who have witnessed the Institute hockey team at practice on the Arena ice, seem quite pleased with the form shown by the squad since it was cut to 20 men. The first game of the season comes December 29 with McGill University of Canada.

More men are showing up for practice than was expected before the cuts were made. Some of the skaters who just made the squad are beginning to handle the puck with ease and precision. After the team has been on the ice a couple of weeks the men will be showing some fast work, predicts coach Powers.

McGill Has Strong Team

The sextet from McGill which is coming to Boston to play Harvard, Boston College, and Technology, is one of the best Canadian teams. This outfit is extremely good as has been shown by its past performance at the

sport, and will be a strong match for Technology.

The last regular practice of the team will come this afternoon for those men who are hard pressed for time during the examination period. For others desiring to keep on the job during this time in preparation for the game, there will be practice three times a week on the regular days, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. There may be a drill on Saturday if this can be arranged. Notice will be posted on the bulletin board.

VARSITY SHOWS SPEED IN 440 RELAY TRIALS

Saturday's Races Indicate Fast Season on Boards

TODAY'S RESULTS GRATIFYING

The results of the time trials for the mile relay, which were held Saturday, were especially pleasing to Coach Kanaly, who states that the times turned in were the fastest ever clocked at Technology at this period of the season. Plenty of competition was in evidence. W. L. Smith ran a particularly fast trial. Captain Chittick, running against Harry Poole, not only trimmed his opponent but beat the time set by Smith, with Poole close behind him. Then, in one of the last trials of the afternoon, Bill Gurney went out like a shot and was clocked at a fifth of a second better than Chittick.

These four plainly outshone the rest of the 39 varsity men who took the trials but the margin was not so great as to make them wholly secure in their places on the team. A. D. Smith ran the fifth best time with Snow, and McHenry, last year's best freshman sprinter, close behind. Gill, Read, and Deming were tied for next place.

Frosh Squad Large

The frosh put the Varsity to shame, in point of numbers, with 47 men taking trials. Their work was generally good but no exceptional times were made as was the case with the veterans. Leness gave the fastest exhibition while Cusolito, Gardiner, and Bateman followed in the order named. Four other '25 runners, Norton, Boardman, Campbell, and Sandberg, were near enough to the leaders to count as possibilities for the coming season.

The middle distance trials, which had been scheduled for Monday, had to be called off on account of the severe rain. The mile trials were also postponed until after vacation, when the track became covered with sleet yesterday. This was a serious handicap to Coach Kanaly in determining just what kind of material he has to pick from but the work on Saturday was so promising that he has strong hopes for the milers and half milers as well as the 440 men among the squad.

Mile Relay First to Compete

The mile relay team, which Saturday's time trials tentatively picked, will be the first varsity combination to get into action. The big winter meets will find them right on hand through the other distances may not get started until the B. A. A. games. The first contest for the relay will probably be the Millrose A. C. meet in New York on February 4.

Of the four men showing the best for the relay, Yard, Chittick and Bill Gurney are veterans of last year's combination. Bill Smith was ineligible until this season as he is a transfer to Technology. Frank Howlett,

who ran in particularly good form until he hurt his leg, was also on the sprinters' quartet during part of the year. He is rapidly rounding into shape this season and though Kanaly did not think it safe to let him run in Saturday's trials, he is sure to be heard from before the team is finally chosen.

BAN OXNARD CHOSEN '25 SWIMMING CAPTAIN

Has Shown Speed in 100 Yard Swim and Relay

BOTH SQUADS WEAK IN DIVES

The yearling swimming squad has elected B. A. Oxnard captain. Ban shows promise of being a hard man to beat in the 100-yard event this winter, and will be one of the fastest men on the relay. His home is in Savannah, Georgia, where he did a little swimming with the High School team. At Exeter, where he prepared, he did not go out for the squad, but that he has not lost speed from this relax in swimming is evident from his performances in early season tryouts.

Stewart Strong in Breast Stroke

Of the new men who have come out for the varsity squad, Bill Stewart, a Junior, has shown the most promise. His principal event, the breast stroke, is a new one in Eastern Intercollegiate swimming. He has also shown up well in the 100-yard swim and may be able to close the gap in that event left by Babe Colton who did not return to the Institute this fall.

Captain Bert Weber is doing well in the 220-yard swim. He will take up his duties as captain this week. One of the strongest events for the Beaver natators this winter will be the plunge in which several men have shown up well. John Henninger, a member of last year's freshman team, has been close to 70 feet while his time for 60 feet has been very fast. Stalbird, a veteran, was not up to scratch at the beginning of the season but he is at last getting back into his usual form. Galliger, although he has a fast field to compete against in his event, is consistent in his plunging and has done good work.

Last Practice This Afternoon

The last regular workout at the "Y" will come off this afternoon at 4 o'clock. However, Alec Sutherland will be on hand Friday afternoon to give individual coaching to his men and to advise them as to the amount of training that will be necessary during the holidays. The training during Christmas is important this year as the first scheduled meet is unusually early, being on January 15.

Bob Purinton is again out for the dives. Although he is a good diver the varsity is in need of more material for the event, while the yearlings need divers worse than does the varsity as they have had but few men out for the event.

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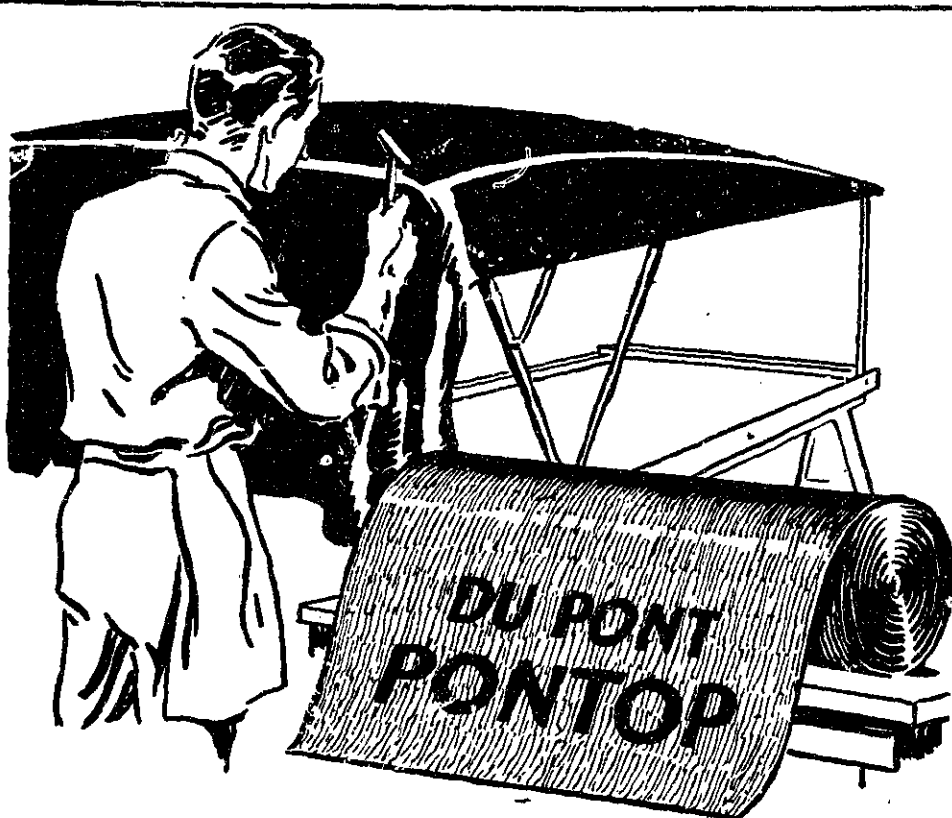
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
