This arrangement is necessary due to a conflict in dates with the basketball team which plays in the evening of the 18th.

**GAME WITH MCGILL**  
**SHOWS FINE RESULTS**  
Although Defeated by Canadians, the Institute Players Give Great Promise  
BEAVER DEFENSE IS MAINSTAY

Although the Beaver sextet met defeat at the hands of the McGill Hockey team, no one connected with the team is at all discouraged with the showing the Engineers made against the Canadians. This bunch of puck chasers from the Dominion played a game against the Institute aggregation that showed that they well deserved the name which they have made for themselves as being first rank hockey players.

**Technology Defence Strong**  
Much credit is due the defence players on Technology's team on account of their work in forestalling more goals by McGill. Captain Hugh Nickle at goal deserves all the praise that has been given him for work in staying the puck off from the net. Aply assisting were the veterans of last year Duve Duvernet and Neil MacNeil. Both these men showed excellent form in their pursuit of the opposing forward linemen when they approached too near Technology's goal.

The defense's work in supporting the forward line by carrying the puck through was also good. Both Neil and Duve repeatedly carried the puck far into McGill's territory. It is to be expected that there was no other Beaver man open on the ice for the two to make a passing shot for goal; this will come with more practice.

**Forwards Show Up Well**  
The forward line showed up better than anticipated in the fight they gave the Canadians, Vernon Ayles played an especially fast game. What is most needed for the Institute offense is more team work, this was sadly lacking in the work of the forwards in the game Thursday.

It is the custom of Coach Ed Powers to play a line together in practice, that is to make up a line of first string men and second string men and have them practice together as a unit throughout the period. This custom should have its effect in the showing of the front line in future contests.

**McGill Stiff For Opening**  
The play of the Candians was rather fast for the opening game of the season for the Engineers, and their work against the Institute was more open and fast than on the two other occasions which they played in Boston. Their forward line is nearly perfect in its approaches and shots showing both speed and ability to handle the puck.

The Canadians defense did not have much opportunity to show its mettle against the Institute, but in the contest with Boston College. The Maroon defense showed that it had real strength against offending forwards. The captain at goal repeatedly deflected B. C.'s shots from the net, and the point and coverpoint made fast work for shots essential.

**Probably No Stronger Opponent**  
The Institute team will probably meet no stronger opponent than McGill before its game with Harvard. The game with Yale January 7 will prove a stickler, but with practice Technology should prove that she can do much on the ice.

Smith, and Poole, being the men who showed the best times. The two mile relay will also compete but, as the weather prevented holding the 880 trials, it is not decided who will compose the relay. Charlie Snow and Art Flanders, both of the two mile relay last year, have been giving hints in their practice periods that they are all set for this season.

**Devise New Way to Aid Fund**

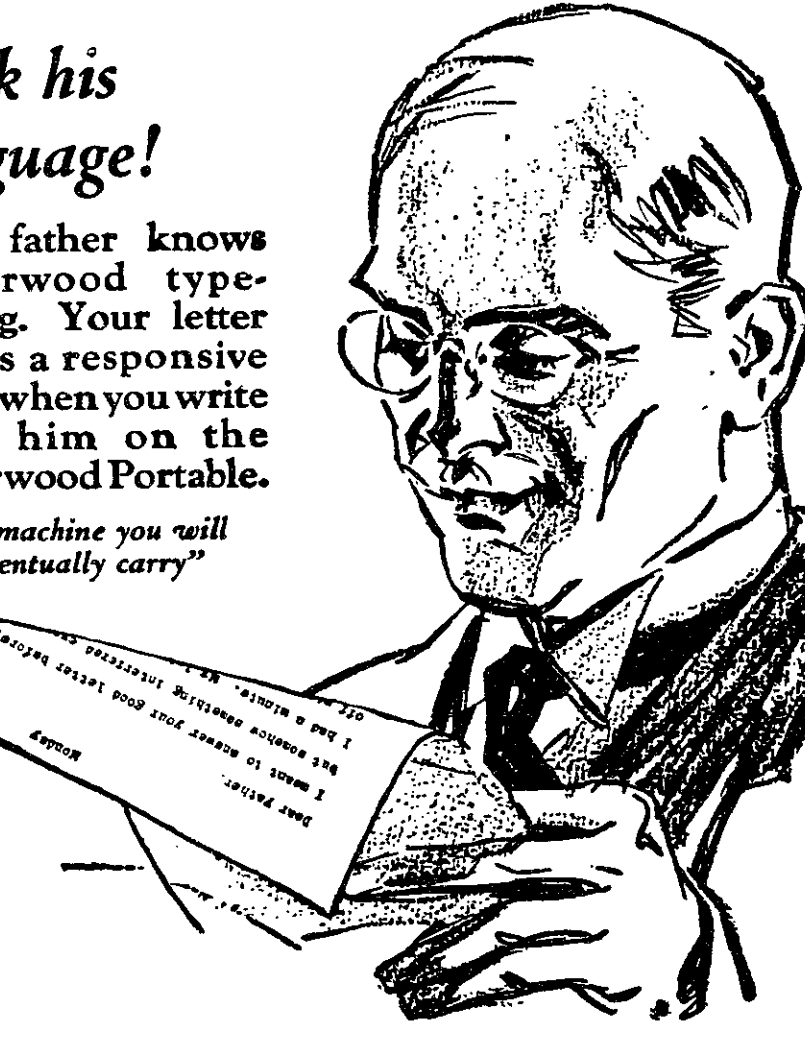
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**Wellesley Plans Wilson Club**  
A number of students interested in the work of former President Woodrow Wilson are forming a Woodrow Wilson Club in Wellesley, which will be similar to clubs which have been organized in about fifty other colleges. The students will meet to discuss politics, using Mr. Wilson's works as a background for their study. In principle the organization is in favor of the League of Nations. The first Woodrow Wilson Club was organized at Harvard several years ago. Since that time similar organizations have grown up in other colleges. The organization as a whole is planning to establish International Memorial Scholarships in History. Memorial collections of Mr. Wilson's works, as contributing to world peace, are also being established in colleges where the clubs have been founded.

**M. I. T. REPRESENTED**  
**AT INVITATION MEET**  
The Institute will be represented at the 33rd annual B. A. A. indoor invitation handicap meet which is to be held at the Arena February 4. The relay races, which always have been a feature of the games, may be arranged between the following universities, colleges, and clubs: M. I. T., Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Cornell, Colby, Dartmouth, Williams, Holy Cross, Maine, Bates, Syracuse, Amherst, Bowdoin, Brown, Vermont, Boston University, Boston College, New Hampshire State, Worcester P. I., Tufts, University of Pennsylvania, New York A. C., B. A. A., Millrose A. C., Massachusetts A. C., Meadowbrook Club, Andover and Exeter.

The special events will be the Hunter Mile, the Williams three mile run, 50 yard dash, and the 50 yard high hurdles. The handicap events are the 660 yard run, 35 yard limit, 1000 yard run, 50 yard limit, mile run, pole vault, one foot limit, and the running high jump, three inch limit.

The track will be 12 laps to the mile. Short and sharp spikes will be allowed. No club or college is allowed more than two entries in the 50 yard dash. Entries positively will close January 21 with Albert Geiger, Jr., chairman athletic committee, B. A. A., Exeter Street, Boston.

**Sanborn in Hunter Mile**  
Capt. Sanborn of the Beaver cross-country team will try for the Hunter Mile trophy again this year. In the 1921 meet he found the pace too fast
