

TECH ENGINEERING NEWS STARTS NEW COMPETITION

The Tech Engineering News is issuing its second call for candidates in all departments. The board states that all departments have exceptional openings for a large number of men. The general election of the paper comes in March and at that time successful candidates will be placed on the staff. MILITARY SCIENCE OFFICERS UNDERGO RIGID EXAMINATION

During the month of January all officers of the Military Science Department will be required to undergo a physical examination at the Army Base here in Boston. Examinations of this nature were not applied vigorously during the war but are to be resumed this year. Formerly the examinations were held in May but the War Department has advanced them to January. At this time the officers undergo a rigid test which determines their fitness as soldiers. There are several grades which the examining officers have to go by and the officer who does not pass the examination is usually listed in one of the three following classes: Unfit for further duty; harboring some physical defect that may be righted by treatment at some hospital or scene of duty changed; or found mentally deficient, which necessitates his removal to a house of detention where he is placed under observation.

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TERM SHOWS SMALL DROP

Figures from the office of the Registrar show that so far 3432 men have registered at the Institute for the second term. There will probably not be many more to register from now on. The above figures show a considerable decrease from the 3535 men who were in attendance during the fall. This is due not only to the fact that about the usual number were dropped because of deficiencies, etc., but also because of the fact a good many were graduated at the end of the last term. About 100 Junior freshmen were admitted at the beginning of the present term.

HARVARD INVITES BEAVER GRADUATES

School of Business Administration Announces New Entrance Classes

COURSES START JANUARY 30

In order to give men who finish their college course in the middle of the academic year a chance to begin their business training at once, the Harvard Business School will adopt experimentally this year a new policy of admitting a limited group of carefully selected college graduates on January 30, 1922. Dean Wallace B. Donham announced last night.

The program of work for men entering in January will be so adjusted that they will be able to complete the regular course for the degree of Master of Business Administration in the usual time of two years, graduating in January, 1924.

Plan Is New Experiment

"This plan is distinctly an experiment," explained Dean Donham. "Two years ago we allowed a few unusually able students to enter in the middle of the year, with very satisfactory results, but we have never admitted any considerable number at that time. Whether we shall ultimately have two groups in the School, one shift entering in September and the other in January, depends on the working of this experiment. It is entirely possible, for our larger courses are already divided into sections, and it may prove as convenient to start some sections in September and others in January as to start them all simultaneously. The School is obliged to limit numbers each year, but by dividing the group into two parts we can take care of more men than would otherwise be possible."

Need Not Wait Till Fall

"Many men of unusual ability finish their college course in three and a half years, and it is such men as these that we wish to accommodate with this new arrangement, so that they will not have to wait until September to begin their business training. The plan was suggested by a number of such men, who felt that under existing business conditions they had no other opportunity to use this period profitably."

"We shall make our selections with particular care, considering the applications in the order in which they come in. We should like to get in January a small group of men as nationally representative as the class which entered in September. This class included 46 men from Harvard College, 16 from the University of California, 10 each from Yale and Leland Stanford, and smaller groups from each of 103 colleges and universities all over the country."

CHOSEN HEAD OF THE NEW FUEL DIV. OF BUREAU OF COMMERCE

In the reorganization of the Bureau of Commerce, Henry C. Morris '00, a mining engineer of wide experience, has been chosen as chief of the new Fuel Division of the Bureau of Commerce.

The former territorial divisions of the bureau are to be retained and function as previously. The new reorganization calls for new industrial divisions, which in addition to supplying the detailed technical data, will be required to distribute current information concerning the various industries in as practical a way as to meet the requirements of the trade. The heads of the new divisions have been selected on a strictly merit basis.

During the war Mr. Morris was connected with the United States Shipping Board as an expert on fuel. He had first been with the Fuel Administration as a mining engineer and later he was transferred to the Bureau of Mines.

A recent meeting of the Liberal Club of Yale was addressed by Mr. Frank Tannebaum, one of the most brilliant exponents of liberalism. The subject of his address was "United States Labor Problems." After the speech, the floor was thrown open for general discussion by the club members.

WALKER DINING SERVICE WORKS UNDER DIFFICULTY

The Walker dining service has been accommodating a larger number of students since the reduction in prices than it has at any time during the present year. The service depends on large numbers to reduce its prices and it is believed by those in charge that as the number of students eating at Walker increases substantially, another cut in price can be made.

During the early part of the week a number of the dining room employees were absent because of illness. This made it difficult for the remaining employees to give quick and efficient service, but this condition has been remedied and with the extended hours of operation it is believed that the students will be fully satisfied.

When the cocoa was served in building 2 on the second day it was received with greater enthusiasm than on the day before. There is no charge for this service and the dining service is prepared to serve 600 students at this time. At present only about 250 have been availing themselves of the privilege.
