

DISCUSS SUCCESSOR TO DR. E. F. NICHOLS

Dr. A. D. Little '85 Outlines
Desires of Alumni at
Annual Banquet

LETTER TO DR. NICHOLS READ

"We want a president as soon as a man fitted and qualified to carry the heavy burden of that high office can be found," was the keynote struck by Dr. Arthur D. Little '85, President of the Alumni Association at the 46th annual Alumni banquet held at Walker Memorial Saturday night. Over 350 representatives of the classes from '68 to '22 were present for the annual gathering.

Technology Bridge Advocated
Dr. Little stressed the four things desired by the Alumni a successor to Dr. Ernest Fox Nichols, an alumni director who should solidify the Alumni and link the gap between the former students and the Institute, new dormitories, and a new bridge across the Charles in place of the old Harvard structure, to be known as the Technology Bridge.

He paid tribute to two prominent members of the faculty who had died within the past year: Professors William T. Sedgwick and Charles R. Cross. Dr. Sedgwick established the first biological department in any institution of learning in America. Professor Cross who graduated with the class of 1870 had exerted a profound influence on the early development of the Institute. Dr. Little spoke with regret of the resignation of Dr. Nichols and read letters which he had exchanged with the former president.

Institute Most Efficient
Mr. Everett Morss, president of the Boston Chamber of Commerce and now the new treasurer of the corporation, compared the Institute to a highly efficient business corporation. He outlined the balance sheet of the Institute, stating that among the efficient colleges of the country, Technology heads the list. He agreed with Dr. Little that the Institute is in urgent need of a new president and asked each graduate who knew of a man qualified for the leadership of (Continued on Page 4.)

The concert at Simmons next Friday and the Sargent appearance of the clubs on January 21 will prime the clubs for the climax of their winter season. The reception received by the clubs on their western trip may be characterized by a quotation from the Chicago Tribune of December 31, which said "they proved that logarithms and cosines do not entirely absorb young men who can still find time to court the muses. The old standbys, by the banjo, mandolin and glee clubs came in for a large share of applause, and perhaps the best hand went to the jazz band and to G. P. Rupert with his xylophone. INSTITUTE COMMITTEE WILL LIMIT DRIVES

Use of Main Lobby Restricted to Approved
Organizations

REVISE CLASS CONSTITUTIONS

No longer will the unfortunate undergraduate have to avoid the main lobby on all occasions lest some classmate touch him unexpectedly for a worthy cause—and a dollar. It has been decided by the Institute Committee, at its first meeting of the term, Thursday night, that all drives of any nature whatsoever, conducted by personal solicitation in the main lobby, will have to be approved by the committee before they can go forward. Instead of scattering the available funds over two dozen drives, only those which pass the committee will be given the use of the halls and lobby. These approved drives will be able to work more efficiently and reach a larger number of students than any of the numerous small drives of the past.

In order to prepare a report on the proposed revision of the constitution of the undergraduate association and of the class constitutions, a committee was appointed, with D. F. Carpenter '22, chairman of the Institute Committee, as chairman.

Elections for the Junior Prom committee were approved, as well as elections for Voo Doo and the Aeronautical Society. The application of the Electrical Engineering Society for reinstatement was tabled.

Should the Student Tax Be Raised?

THE INSTITUTE COMMITTEE

The inadequacy of the present Student Tax has burdened not only the activities in general but has limited the sphere of the governing body of all the student affairs—the Institute Committee. This committee performs an extremely important function in that of controlling and supervising all of the school activities.

The present Tax was designed to support only the All Technology Smoker, a spring smoker, Walker Committee and office expenses. Now, however, the body has grown to include five committees, only one of which is provided for in the Tax. The financing of the Budget, Finance, Elections, and Point System Committees must be arranged by cutting down on other things. Consequently, there is no spring smoker, office equipment is not as complete as it should be, and even then the committees have an amount that really does not meet their needs.

The revision of the Student Tax would arrange for the financial support of all five of the sub-committees. No organization can function efficiently when financially crippled. By increasing the Tax we show our approval of the work of the Institute Committee and we increase the efficiency with which it will be able to serve us—and Technology.

RESULT OF COMPETITION FOR TECH SHOW CAST ANNOUNCED

Difficult Task of Choosing Cast for "Sacred
Cow" from Large Turnout of Candidates
Completed by Coaches

MANY MEMBERS OF FORMER SHOWS CHOSEN

HOCKEY TEAM NOSES OUT BULLDOG, 1-0

Engineers Score in Final
Period of Fast Game
at New Haven

YALE GOAL-TENDER SKILLFUL

NEW HAVEN, Jan. 7.—Technology beat Yale tonight, in one of the most spectacular hockey games ever staged at New Haven. Two scoreless periods and most of the third had passed when Joe Dalton, Beaver center, pushed the puck past Bell, Yale's apparently impregnable goal-tender, for the only counter of the conflict.

Forecasts predicting a mighty close game certainly were fulfilled. Bell was a big factor in keeping the Bulldog neck and neck with the Beavers. Dalton's drive was the only one of 38 shots to ooze past the Blue netman. Captain Hugh Nickle also did well in the Institute goal, though he was subjected to by no means as continuous a bombardment.

First Two Periods Even

The first two periods were very fast and close hockey, the opening session being exactly tit for tat. Both teams possessed highly developed systems of defense while neither showed a sustained attack. In the second act of the battle the Engineer's offense got under way and Bell's prowess was the only bar to a Technology score.

After 11 minutes of the third period had joined the fruitless first two, Flint Taylor secured the puck near the Beaver end of the rink. Flint carried the disk almost the full length of the ice only to have his shot carom off the alert Bell. Joe Dalton hooked the puck from the midst of a scrimmage and slipped it past the Yale netman, who fell after countering Taylor's drive.

The Bulldog tried hard in the remaining minutes to gain the lost ground. Though the conflict raged more furiously than ever no more scores were recorded.

TECH ENGINEERING NEWS MAKES MIDYEAR CALL FOR CANDIDATES

The Institute's scientific publication announces its second general call for candidates. The new men will meet in the T. E. N. office in the Walker Memorial at 5:15 o'clock next Wednesday.

According to R. K. Turner '23, publicity manager of the magazine, this is the last good opportunity for men to become eligible for responsible positions before next October. Successful candidates in this competition will be elected to the various departments in March.

The Tech Engineering News feels that it can no longer be classed as a minor activity. Its outside circulation has increased 200 per cent during the past year and representation has been given it on the Institute Committee. It has also been found that a new field of newspaper and trade journal publicity requires an enlargement of the staff so that positions are open for men fitted to do journalistic work drawing and cartooning.

The research department under T. B. Drew '23, maintaining a news staff and information bureau; the undergraduate department under F. P. Squibb '23, covering Institute affairs; the features department under C. W. Maschal '22, dealing with articles outside the Institute, the publication department under B. P. Lane '23, which makes up and prints the issue; the advertising department headed by E. A. Ash '22, and the treasury, managed by Rex Hall, are the departments for which candidates may try.

The competition for the cast of Tech Show 1922 has progressed to such a stage that the coaches are now able to announce the different places on the cast. Due to the fact that there were about one hundred men who tried out for the cast, the task of picking only one man for each place was a difficult one. Among the candidates were a good many who possessed considerable talent as actors, some of these having been on the casts of previous Tech Shows and others having acquired their experience in other places.

Freshman Plays Leading Lady

The leading lady, Marian Rewitt, will be played by H. McIntosh '25. The two male leads are assigned to F. D. Gage '22, who played the part of Phillip Morris in Tech Show 1920, and W. C. Groce '23, who was Reggie last year, will play respectively the parts of Richard Tate, an inventor, and Jerome Farr, a Senior at Tech who is engaged to Marian Rewitt. A. C. Read, Jr., '24, is cast to play the part of Sam K. Surtax, foster father of Marian. Lord Hubert Bathbrick of the Secret Service has been assigned to M. G. Davis '25, and Mustapha Kemal, his oriental servant, to E. H. Schmitz '23, who took the part of Jaynes in last year's production. M. B. Beattie '23, will play Robert Omlette, a famous detective. The part of Gaston Hautemille, a perfect of police in Paris, will be taken by P. J. Lamoureux '23, while J. D. Cochran, Jr., '24, is cast for Ida Claire, a professional chaperone. W. J.
