ANNOUNCE SCHEDULE OF BEAVER BOXING MEETS

The schedule for the Institute boxing season is as follows:
Jan. 23—Meet pending with N. H. State; Feb. 4—Army at West Point; Feb. 10—Boston University at Technology; Feb. 18—Yale at New Haven; Feb. 25—Navy at Annapolis.

In view of the fact that the schedule for this year is one of the hardest that the team has ever faced, stringent training and practice will be enjoined. Varsity practice will be held three times a week with Coach Boutellier on hand to dispense gloves and instructions. For those who desire to gain some knowledge of the fistic art Boutellier will be present two days a week to give lessons.

Elimination bouts will be held in two weeks or so, and a cut in the squad will be made immediately afterwards. There will be a meeting of all the candidates this afternoon and all those interested, especially in the heavier classes, are asked by Manager Joe Nowell to report.

Will Hold Intercollegiates
For the first time in the history of collegiate boxing, boxing intercollegiates will be held. Philadelphia will be the scene of the contests for the championships and March 16 and 18, the dates decided upon. The prevalence of spring examinations makes it impossible for the Beavers to be officially represented but, as some of the members of the wrestling team did last season, it is possible for members of the mitmen to make the trip and compete for individual honors in their weights.

The colleges that will be probably represented in the intercollegiates include Yale, Lehigh, Johns Hopkins, Arizona, Pennsylvania, Penn State, West Point, and Annapolis.

PLUNGERS HOPEFUL

As if trying to obliterate the results of the practice meet last Friday the swimming team is at last showing signs of life, and water is beginning to splash in earnest in the "Y" pool. Under the coaching of Alec Sutherland the natators are speeding up but they are still far from being fast enough to get away with a difficult schedule. With Navy, Yale, Army and Brown occupying prominent places the Engineers are due to meet a number of tough customers. If the swimmers get away with a majority of their meets they should be handed a lot of credit—they will have earned it.

Springfield No Weaking

Springfield "Y," with which the team clashes Friday, will also be swimming its opening date, so its standing this year is unknown. The Springfield papers, however, seem optimistic of a win for the local "Y." They have no outstanding stars, but neither have the Beavers, and their team is composed more largely of veterans. Springfield has a good schedule, including Dartmouth, Amherst, Wesleyan, and Army, and evidently counts on Technology to help them start the New Year right. The meet in any event will not be a runaway but the enemy can claim a slight superiority before attempting to prove it.

Swimmers Show Improvement

The plungers, headed by John Henninger, have shown marked improvement. The Beavers boast of four plungers, all of nearly equal merit, so competition for a berth in that event will be strong, as only two men in each event will take the Springfield trip. Earl Palmer, Ed Taylor, and L. P. Botting are working hard on the 100-yard event, which is still a little weak. Palmer is also on the relay, together with Nip Marsh and C. L. Dunn, the two 50-yard entrants. The fourth place is being fought over by Johnny Robinson, Ed Thimme and Dave Evans.

Captain Bert Weber and S. F. Brown are paired together in both the 220-yard swim and the 50-yard back stroke. Johnny Robinson being also entered in the latter event. Bob Purinton has a clear advantage over the other Engineer divers. M. J. Buerger, S. J. Miller and H. M. Schley are all fighting for the remaining position. The Beavers will not swim the breast stroke when they meet the Springfield "Y" this Friday but it is scheduled to come off in the clash here next week with Amherst. Bill Stewart, who was captain of the '23 freshman team, and Gerald Nauman will uphold Technology's end.



It is rumored that W. L. Smith, the Beaver track-bound, has been training hard all during vacation. This looks like an attempt to revenge himself on Captain Yard Chittick who bested him in time trials before Christmas.

Elmer Sanborn has announced his intention of entering in the Hunter mile at the B. A. A. Games February 4. He was one of a fast field that entered in the run last year. The field was rather too fast but we have seen lots worse runners than Elmer.

Babe Colton '22, who was succeeded by Bert Weber '22 as captain of this year's swimming squad, is again back at the 'Stute. Unfortunately he will not be able to come out for swimming due to the abnormally heavy schedule he is taking to enable him to graduate with his class this year.

Chubby Green '21 is back among us this term. For years he used to be a mainstay of the swimming team, holding, for a while, the New England 220-yard record and captaining the Beaver squad in 1920. He is not eligible for competition but is helping Alec Sutherland train the candidates for the distance swims.

Nearly all candidates of the fall season who escaped the vote have reported for practice again and some new material, though none of particular promise, has shown up in addition. Saturday, the big day of each week for track work, was most successful.

Injured Men Return to Team

Kanally has stated that he was well pleased with the showing of the squad. Nearly all the candidates expected were on hand and the work done was encouraging. No trials were held but Frank watched the performance of each man closely and got a good line on the material for the coming meets. The return of Frankie Howlett, one of the best of last year's men and member of the mile relay, was a good omen to the Beaver hopes. Howlett ran well and gave no indication of feeling the old injury to his leg that put him out of the competition over two months ago. It is quite possible that some of the relay men will have to keep in the best of shape if they wish to retain their jobs. Howlett was unable to take the trials for the mile relay last term but the team has not been definitely picked as yet and he will undoubtedly be a strong contender for a place.

Another sprinter, Johnny Tench, who has been out with a bad leg, did his first real work Saturday and seemed in a fair way to regain his old form. Tench was one of the stars on the frosh team last year and is counted on in the sprint events for the varsity this spring.

Manager Attends Conference

Coach Kanally is spending this week in hardening his men and will probably give them some fast work on Saturday. No definite time trials such as closed the season last term are on the cards before the end of the month, however. The first meet of the year is the Millrose A. C. affair at New York on February 1, and some trials will be held before then to determine the team which will represent Technology.

M. N. Waterman '23, manager of the track team, has just returned from attending the conference of the Executive Committee of the I. C. A. A. A. in New York. Chief among the affairs of the conference was the decision as to what events should be included in the program for the Indoor Championship Meet of March 4, which will be held under the auspices of the Association.

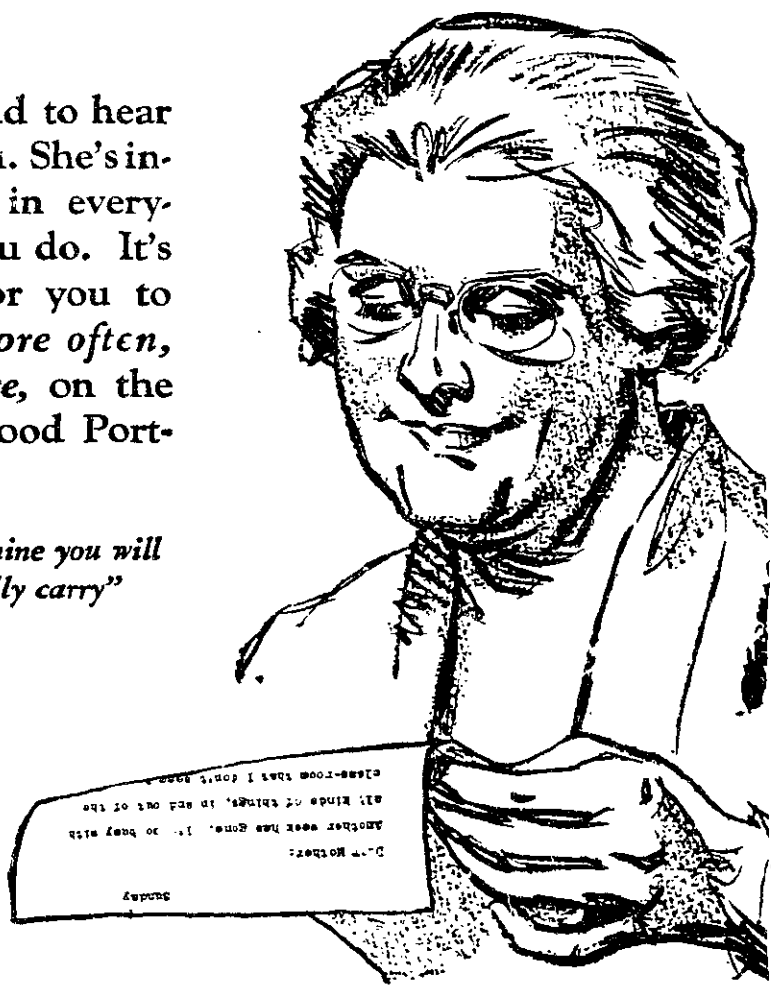
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
