DALHOUSIE EXPECTS HEAVY TEAM TO SHOW REAL HOCKEY

Nova Scotian Sextet Brings Squad of Top-Notch Veterans

HALIFAX N. S., Jan. 10—Last year the Dalhousie team was rated as the best in Eastern Canada and it was much regretted in the Maritime Provinces that it was unable to go into the Allan Cup games, it being felt that the team would compare very favorably to anything that Canada produced last year. During the season Dalhousie played 22 games, and of that number 18 were won, 2 tied and 2 lost. The heavy schedule proved somewhat of a handicap, and critics felt that the loss of the two games and the two ties played were a result of too much hockey. Incidentally those lost were by a margin of one goal. The team's slate would probably have been clean had the players had sufficient rest at certain times. The University of New Brunswick, winners of honors in the college ranks in their section and very highly rated, was defeated by a score of 9-1.

Of last year's team, now regarded as one of the outstanding ones produced by the province since the game started here, five of the regular six will take the ice in Boston. These men are: Captain McIsaac, goal; Fluck and McNeil, defense; and Haslam and Lilly, forwards. McIsaac is far and away the leading goal-keeper in Eastern Canada and his services have been sought by many of the pros this year.

Defense Men Rated High

The two defense men Fluck and McNeil are the greatest pair in their positions in the province. The latter is rated as the best defense man ever to play hockey in Halifax. Haslam is the old St. Paul's School of Concord, N. H., player, and captain of the 1919 team which defeated Yale and Dartmouth and which lost to Harvard's champion team by a one goal margin. Haslam was chosen on the All-Scholastic Team, and was St. Paul's heaviest scorer. Last year he led the Dalhousie team in scoring and was also in all probability the leading scorer in the Maritime Provinces. Lilly the other veteran is a very steady and clever man. The team also retains half a dozen of last year's spares, and also has the services of some of the best of last year's men from the other colleges. Bates, captain of last year's St. Francis Xavier team, is available. He is one of the fastest and most efficient defense players in the province. McKenna, a team-mate, was the best forward that his team had. He is an All-College choice.

Dunn, of Sydney, is supposed to be one of the fleetest from that section where he starred last season. Horseley, of last year's Sussex team is another candidate of promise, having a big reputation. Others are Beaton and Langwith of last year's Acadia College team, and Dunlop of King's.

Haslam Carries Punch

The Dalhousie team is a rather husky one, but it is also a very fast one. All the members are extremely fast and skillful skaters, and are very good stick handlers. Haslam has perhaps the most wicked shot on the team and this resembles the canon balls of Skilton and Percy. Fluck will be a delight to the Boston fans as he stands 6 feet 3 inches and weighs 215 pounds, none of which is fat. He is a Connacher and a Skilton combined when he goes down the ice. Of course he is much bigger than either one of the two. McNeil, his partner weighs 170. He is the peer of the defense men of the province.

Haslam weight 180 which sounds pretty heavy for a forward, but his record need only to be consulted to get an idea of his speed and efficiency. McIsaac, Lilly, Bates and McKenna are all well built boys and each weighs over 160. These seven above-mentioned together with Dunn, the lightweight of the team weighing but 150, will probably do the bulk of the playing at Boston. Ten men will go to Boston and the other two will be selected from Smith, Hickey, Beaton, Langwith, Dunlop, and Horseley. The team that takes the ice will average probably between 175 and 180 pounds.

GIVE SUNDAY LECTURES FOR PUBLIC'S BENEFIT

Society of Arts Offers Course in Popular Scientific Subjects

PROF. GOODWIN'S TALK FIRST

For the purpose of giving the public an opportunity to enjoy to a greater extent the resources of the Institute, the Society of Arts is planning to give a series of four lectures of popular scientific interest. The lectures will be given on one Sunday afternoon in each of the next four months. Admission to them is free, and tickets may be obtained by sending a stamped, addressed envelope to the Registrar of the Institute.

At the first lecture, which will come on January 20, H. M. Goodwin '90, professor of Physics and Electrochemistry, will take up "Light—Visible and Invisible, Illustrated by Color Phenomena." On February 12, Earle B. Millard, assistant professor of Theoretical Chemistry, will talk on "The Chemistry of the Household." At the lecture of March 12, "Radio Communication" will be taken up by Frederick S. Dellenbaugh, Jr., assistant professor of Electrical Machinery and secretary of the Research Division of the Department of Electrical Engineering. The subject for April 9 has not yet been announced.

The lectures will come at 4 o'clock on each of the above dates, and will probably be held in Smith Hall, room 10-250. Spectacular experiments are expected to feature each lecture.

STUDENT AND FIANCEE FALL THROUGH THIN ICE

Freshman From Boston University Rescues Couple

NO ILL EFFECTS SUFFERED

Archie P. Wilks '22, while skating on the Charles River near the foot of Granby street with a girl friend from Simmons College, at about 9 o'clock Monday evening, broke through a soft place in the ice and fell in.

Their cries for help were heard by several students in the Chi Sigma Chi fraternity house at 306 Bay State road, and they rushed to the rescue. Thomas M. Hill of Niantic, a freshman at Boston University, crawled out to the edge of the hole where the couple were struggling in the icy water, and managed to draw them to firm ice.

The two were then taken to the house at 270 Bay State road, Miss Williams into the apartment of E. Norman Hunt, and Wilks into the apartment of Russell Stearns, where they were revived. Except for a slight chilling, neither suffered any ill effects.

When the anxious rescuers pulled the two from 10 feet of water in the basin, they were amazed to learn that the couple had just become engaged to marry which accounted for the surprisingly cool manner the students took their experience in the water. Here were two young people who had skated into water over their heads, rescued only after yeoman work, who apparently considered it all of little moment. But then the rescuers learned that the two young people had just settled satisfactorily the most important question of their lives. It has since come out that Wilks had put the question but the breaking of the ice prevented the answer being put into words.

Both were able to attend their classes yesterday as usual and both were congratulated on their rescue by their fellow students.

Miss Williams is from Utica, N. Y., a senior at Simmons College, and president of the New York State Club at Simmons. Wilks is from Newport, R. I.

DRAWING CREW BOAT HOUSE

Students of the department of architecture of the Institute are at work on a problem to be completed January 15 which embraces designs for a hypothetical building to be added to the Technology group in Cambridge for housing all the student publications of the Institute. These include the Alumni Review, The Tech Engineering News, THE TECH, and Voo Doo. The plans are to include suitable offices and lounging quarters and the exterior must conform to the general architectural style of the group. The architectural students are also at work on a plan for a hypothetical boat house for the Technology crew.

Offer Prizes For Poster

The Technology Musical Clubs have offered as a prize for the design for a poster adjudged best in a competition of architectural students, two tickets for each of the fall and spring concerts in Boston next year.

On the bulletin board in the Rogers Building, the headquarters of the department of architecture, has been posted a list of the various prizes offered in the department with space for the name of the winner of each as he is announced. With each prize goes also the department medal which Professor William Emerson, head of the department, had struck last year. The total number of awards is 19 and the amount available is \$2030. This includes three new prizes of \$10 each donated by architectural fraternities, two by Luxor Temple of the Scarab fraternity and one by the Triglyph fraternity.

Albert Ferran, the new professor of Architectural Design, arrived in New York Tuesday with his colleague, Professor J. J. Haffner, who will occupy a similar post at Harvard Architectural school. They will be the guests of Professor and Mrs. Emerson until they find living quarters. As a welcome to Professor Ferran the Architectural Department will hold a smoker in the Common Room of the Rogers Building January 18 and early in February a formal reception is planned.

Dartmouth College and the Institute of Technology.

"We have not taken this step hurriedly, in fact, we have arrived at this point only after a considerable amount of careful deliberation. We have no complaint to offer in any way concerning the sportsmanlike attitude of the individual Dartmouth teams or the members composing them, and we always have enjoyed our competitions with Dartmouth on the athletic and on the social side. We do feel, however, that with such a lack of responsibility in the formulation of agreements as would seem to exist we are unwilling in the future to imperil the schedule of our several teams by entering into relationships which apparently are not binding on both parties.

"Enclosed please find copy of a

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letter sent to Mr. Horace G. Pender, graduate manager of the Dartmouth athletic council. Speaking for the athletic association of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, I wish to assure you that there is no feeling on our part toward any of the Dartmouth athletic teams or the individual members of such teams other than that of good will and sportsmanlike appreciation. We have taken the step outlined in the letter to Mr. Pender only after mature deliberation and with a sense of keen regret. The difficulties entailed, however, by such cancellations as those in question seem to us sufficiently grave to warrant the step that we have taken.

"Speaking again for the organization which I represent, I wish to assure you of our feeling of appreciation of the very pleasant quality of social and athletic contracts which our teams have had with those of Dartmouth. The pleasant associations engendered by our relations in the past persist. The interruption of them brings us only regret, I am,

Dear Professor Talbot:
As you are probably aware, the Combined Musical Clubs from the Institute, gave a concert in Cleveland, on the evening of Dec. 23th, and I am writing to tell you

how very pleased and gratified we all are over the showing that they made.

Some of the older alumni were at first rather skeptical as to the advisability of our boys coming out here, particularly as they would, in a measure, be in competition with both local talent and the dramatic organization of some of the best known Eastern universities. However, the concert they gave, very definitely proved to everyone present, that the Institute undergraduates were fully as good, if not better, than anything the other colleges had to offer.

To my mind, however, the more important conclusion is that the Technology student is not of necessity limited to the laboratory or the drafting board. This criticism has been made to me by prominent business and professional men of this city, on more than one occasion.

The boys were a clean-cut and thoroughly likeable crowd and deported themselves in a highly satisfactory manner during their stay in town and at the close of our party the husband of one of our most influential patronesses informed me that he was particularly pleased at the total absence of what he chose to term "hip pocket stuff." He added that this was a very marked contrast to some of the other college men who were in town during the holidays.
