The Institute five defeated Tufts last night at Medford, 35-25. The Beavers got off with a fine start and led by a large margin for the first 15 minutes. Tufts then went into action and delighted the crowd with a rally which brought the score up to 18-17.

Continuing the rush during the early part of the second session the Medford outfit ran its total up to 25 before Coach Allen's Engineers got under way. Regaining their stride the Institute five played the finest basketball shown this season for the remainder of the conflict.

Cook, at right guard, played a great game for the Beavers totaling three goals from the floor in addition to keeping up his work on the defense. Tillie Tonon also caged three double-deckers and so did Cyp Blood. Dave Davidson netted two and threw three foul goals.

Tom Kelly of Harvard officiated and was very liberal with personal fouls. Cub Hubbard accumulated four.

Coach Kanaly is planning some fast work on the boards for the track men tomorrow, though no actual time trials will be held. The half and quarter milers are receiving the major share of Frank's attention just at present for the mile and two mile relays will be the first of the Beaver track aggregations to get into action. A host of stars is at hand to pick from among the 440 sprinters, though the middle distance is not as well taken care of. It is probable that Kanaly may try shifting a few of the aspirants for the quarter into the longer distance.

Stars in the Quarter
To the list of Captain Chittick, Bill Gurney, W. L. Smith, A. D. Smith, Poole, have now been added Frank Howlett and John Tench. All these men are going strong and the competition for places on the relay is bound to be keen. In the 880, Jack Hennessy, Art Flanders, and Charlie Snow are available from last year's relay, so that Kanaly has a good basis on which to build up a new combination. The work tomorrow will be fast enough to give an idea of what the men can do and will be important as the start of the rivalry for team places. Definite time trials will not be held, however, Kanaly says, until the sprinters have had a little more training, as the first meets are still three weeks in the future.

Frosh Entered in B. A. A.
The management of the B. A. A. in charge of the coming meet announced yesterday the addition of three more relay races to the list of events already decided upon. One of these was the expected triangular mile relay between the freshman teams from Technology, Boston College, and Holy Cross.

The frosh sprinters have shown sufficient promise to insure a good race, though no definite choice has been made from the large number of candidates. George Leness, Lawrence Cusolito, and Glen Bateman have been turning in some speedy performances but they are by no means without competitors. At least ten frosh are doing very good work and a snappy team should result.

They sent swimming Manager Ed Miller best wishes for the coming season but added that they expected to do quite a lot in the way of swimming themselves this winter. Good Season Expected
