

MRS. COX PATRONESS FOR WINTER CONCERT

Wife of Governor Sponsors
Annual Affair of Clubs
at Copley Plaza

SELL TICKETS TOMORROW NOON

Mrs. Channing H. Cox, wife of the governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has consented to act as a patroness for the Winter Concert of the Combined Musical Clubs at the Copley Plaza on Friday evening, January 27. Tickets for the affair of the Clubs will be on sale at the booth in the main lobby tomorrow noon. Signups will also be redeemed at this time, and seats will be distributed to the holders. Mrs. Cox's consent to act as a patroness for the concert and dance was given yesterday and forms one of the first patroness acknowledgements to be received. The patroness list now contains 20 names, which will be announced when the list is complete at the end of this week.

Dancing Until 3 o'clock

Signups for the concert and dance which were sold last Thursday will be redeemed tomorrow noon upon the presentation of the signup and the payment of three dollars. Tickets on the floor of the Copley are arranged on the theatre seating system for the concert. The dancing which will begin at about 10 o'clock will last till 3 o'clock and music will be furnished by Bert Lowe's Orchestra.

A contract has been signed with Bert Lowe for fifteen of his best men to play until 3 o'clock. Lowe is planning to present his first string orchestra at 10 o'clock, and he will call in the remainder of his men from other functions after they are over. His failure to present a 15-piece orchestra of the highest calibre will forfeit his wages.

VOTE FOR TWENTY-FIVE MEN

WALKER MEMORIAL COMMITTEE RENEWES YOUTH BY COMPETITION

The Walker Memorial Committee has announced the result of its mid-year competition. Those finally chosen were H. V. Shipley '23, K. C. Kingsley '23, and D. B. Jennings '24.

On January 9 the competition was formally opened, with 26 candidates in all. Of these, 16 tried for two Junior vacancies and 10 entered for one Sophomore position. The candidates were assigned to routine office work, including compiling the calendar which appears in the Walker lobby, assisting Mrs. King in the Walker library, tabulating room assignments and making out midyear reports on such subjects as the present capacity of each room in the building, the room's capacity, should more chairs be added, and the cost of serving meals from the Walker kitchens. Personal reports were also rendered by each candidate entailing suggestions as to the management of the building, with the idea of discovering how much working knowledge of the duties of the committee he possesses. The results were determined largely by these reports, according to H. M. Shirey '22, chairman of the committee.

The new committee held its first meeting at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Make Plans Tonight for Dance in February

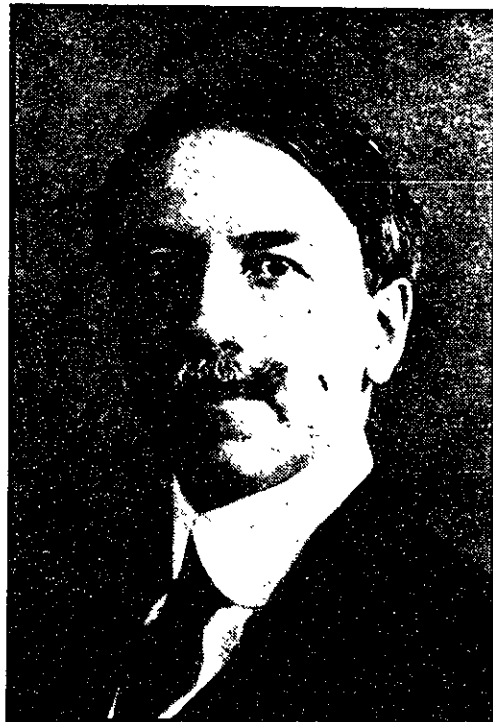

FRANCE DECORATES ARCHITECT BOSWORTH

Designer of Technology Given
Cross of Legion of Honor

HAS HAD SUCCESSFUL CAREER

W. W. Bosworth, architect of the new Technology buildings, has recently received the decoration of Chevalier of the Legion of Honor from the Government of France.

Since returning from the Ecole des Beaux Arts in 1900, Mr. Bosworth has been active in many channels in aiding the interests of the French in this country, particularly during and since the War.

In the competition among the members of the Society of Beaux Arts Architecture for a monument to Major L'Enfant in the Arlington Cemetery at Washington, he was acknowledged the winner and given the task of designing the monument. It presents the plan of Washington as L'Enfant conceived it, and one may look out across the Potomac and see in its beauty the realization of his dream. Ambassador Jusserand was unusually pleased with this monument, and noted it in his book on his experiences while Ambassador to the United States.

Exhibition Conducted During Summer

During the past summer, one whole wing of the Salon was given to an exhibition of American Architecture. The drawings and photographs, chiefly of Technology, sent by Mr. Bosworth, made such a favorable impression that his name, already on the lists, was immediately put forward for the decoration, which quickly followed.

The French public are accustomed to seeing great schemes for groups of buildings presented in the form of projects—but seldom, if ever, do they see them realized as in this case of living stone. Let us hope that means may soon be forthcoming to complete the effect—with the definite treatment in the courts. Felicitations to Mr. Bosworth.

Should the Student Tax Be Raised?

SENIORS UNANIMOUS FOR TAX

Last Monday at 5 o'clock in Room 10-275 the assembled representatives of the Senior Class unanimously voted in favor of the proposed increase in the Student Tax. Two meetings were held to discuss the measure, one last Friday and one Monday. Donald F. Carpenter, president of the Senior Class and Chairman of the Institute Committee, presided at the meeting and A. L. Johnson, president of the T. C. A., acted as secretary. About 92 % of the delegates were present representing the 26 sections of the Class.

Every aspect of the proposed change was discussed and the representative of the Tax Revision Committee answered such questions as were brought up. When the vote was taken there was not a dissenting vote. The assembly was thoroughly representative of the feeling of the Senior Class, the members being elected by their respective sections for the express purpose of voting on the Tax. The sentiments of the meeting seemed to show that the Class of '22 is behind the movement and strongly in favor of its adoption by the student body.

SMOKER PLANNED FOR PROFESSOR FERRAN

Welcomed by Friends on His Arrival at the Institute

BIG PROGRAM ARRAIGNED

An informal smoker will be held as a welcome to Professor Albert Ferran, who has just arrived in Boston from Paris to take up his work as professor of architectural design in the department of architecture. It will be held in the Common Room of the Rogers building on Boylston Street, Wednesday evening, January 18. Professor Ferran is a native of California, born of French parents. He lived in this country until 1902, when he went to Paris to study. He received his degree from the Ecole des Beaux Arts in 1910, and in 1914 was the winner of the Grand Prix de Rome.

Examples for Work in Annual Prize Contest

Two exhibitions of interest to the men in the architectural department of Massachusetts Institute of Technology have been hung in the Rogers Building on Boylston Street. One is the show sent out by Pencil Points, an architectural magazine that is trying to encourage a better grade of sketching among draftsmen. The annual prize offered by them is \$100. Last year it was won by Kenneth Conant of Harvard, honorable mention going to George R. Wren '22. The sketches will remain on exhibition until next Tuesday in the Rogers Building, when they will be taken to Harvard. The second group comprises of the travelling exhibition of the Society of Beaux Arts Architects, and will be shown for one week. It is made up of about 40 medal drawings of large projects, which represents the work of several architectural schools.

DEAN OF LAW SCHOOL ADDRESSES CHEMICALS

His Subject is "Legal Ethics"—
Movies of Sugar Shown

ANNOUNCE TRIP TO EVERETT

The Chemical Society held a smoker in the main hall of Walker last night at 7:30 o'clock. The speaker of the evening was Dean Homer Albers of Boston University Law School. The topic of his talk was "Legal Ethics." He brought out the position of the lawyer in connection to the layman, stating that it is the lawyers job to give legal advice and not to give his private opinion. He also remarked that, like a doctor, a lawyer must hold in strictest confidence anything that is told him in the course of a case. It is the jury and not the lawyer that is trying the case. The lawyer is merely conducting the case in such a manner that the jury will understand to the best advantage what is meant by the evidence.

"Justification of Lawyer's Fees" Another of his topics was "The Justification of Lawyers Fees." In this connection, he said that at least a percentage of the fee should be paid in advance, and he discussed the advisability of the state paying a counsel which it has summoned to take care of a person who has no attorney.

A six-reel moving picture was shown giving all phases of the manufacture of sugar, from the planting of the cane to the finished refined sugar. A trip to take place next week to the Beacon Oil Refinery at Everett, Mass., was announced at the end of the smoker.
