

BEAVERS MEET BEARS
TOMORROW EVENING

Only Common Opponent De-
feated by Both Teams

BRUIN HAD BETTER HIBERNATE

This week is due to be a strenuous one for the Beaver quintet for they are to have no rest after last night's hard fight with the Johnnies but will meet Brown in Providence tomorrow. The Bears' strength is not very well known as regards comparison with the Engineer five, although he is credited with having a snappy team on the floor. The only team both Brown and the Institute have met this year is Northeastern, who naturally fell victim in each case. Last season Bruin sent the Beavers down to defeat but Coach Allen says that the team that goes to Providence tomorrow is a vastly different aggregation from the one that lost its contest there last year.

Use Same Line-up as Against B. U.

Coach Allen will start the same men against Brown that did so well Saturday night against Boston University. Gyp Blood seems to have permanently made good at the pivot position and will begin the game there. Captain Cub Hubbard and Stan Cook will hold down the guard berths, while Tillie Tonon and Dave Davidson will make up the attack.

Down in Bruinville Captain Miller, like Captain Cub a defence man, is considered the mainstay of the five. One of the Providence quintet's best tricks is to use this clever back in heading a guard attack on an opponent's basket. Miller will have a running mate named Pittinger in the other guard position, while a veteran of last year's team, Williams, will oppose Gyp at Center. Mitchell and Wagon-knecht will probably fill the forward berths.

Brown Has Beaten Springfield

The hosts of the Bruin conquered the fast Springfield quintet last Saturday by a decisive score and since B. U. was trounced 33-20 by that same aggregation it is plain that if the dope can be relied on Brown will be a dangerous opponent tomorrow. Round about estimates of team strengths have a habit of turning out wrong, so Cub Hubbard's crew is not the least worried over the prospects ahead.

Frosh Meet Northeastern

While the varsity is journeying to Providence the yearlings go to meet the Northeastern freshmen on the latter's floor. Just as Northeastern was easy for the Beaver major team so it is expected that the '25 aggregation will have a little trouble with their rivals. Coach Nelson will start the same five men that he sent against B. U. frosh with the possible change of Hammond for Ingram at right forward.

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FINAL TRIALS FOR MILE
RELAY RACE TOMORROW

Half Milers Will Perform Friday to Decide
Makeup of Two-Mile Relay

FAST TIMES EXPECTED

Tomorrow will be a big day on the boards if the weather holds fair, as Frank Kanaly is planning to have the final trials for the mile relay run off. At least eight good men have their eyes on team places and though Captain Yard Chittick and the two Bills, Gurney and Smith, are the general favorites, there is plenty of competition to force them to the utmost.

With the Millrose A. C. meet in New York only two weeks from today and the B. A. A. games three days later, Coach Kanaly has decided it is time to settle on his quartet for the relays. The 440 men will get their chance tomorrow, while the half-milers will perform Friday to settle the makeup of the two-mile relay. This will leave Saturday for the teams to get together and begin work as units. There are three relays to be picked, the varsity mile and two-mile and the frosh mile team, and each has at least double as many likely candidates as there are places.

Main Interest in Mile Relay

The contest for places on the varsity mile relay is bound to be interesting tomorrow afternoon. Besides Captain Yard there are the two Smiths, Poole, Frankie Howlett, who is completely recovered from his injury and running in old time form again, Bill Gurney, McHenry, and Read. All these men will be on their mettle and some fast times will undoubtedly result. Kanaly says the prospects for all three combinations are good but the future of the mile team is especially rosy. This year's quartet should be faster than last and since Harvard was humbled at the B. A. A. games by the Beaver relay last season the chances of upsetting the Johnnies again look hopeful.

DARTMOUTH'S VIEWPOINT

The following editorial appeared in the columns of *The Dartmouth* for January 11:—

"Breach of Faith"

The public would find it hard to reconcile the sentiments expressed in two letters from the athletic authorities of M. I. T. which are in the hands of the Dartmouth Athletic Council. They are at variance, especially on the central point of the "breach of faith," and suggest that Technology in trying its case in the newspapers is possibly not making public all the facts in the matter. A good deal can happen between November 12 and January 9, the dates of the two letters; it is unfortunate that the Tech authorities either cannot or will not reveal the inside workings in the matter.

On the face of things as they stand at present, the action of the M. I. T. Athletic Council seems to be shortsighted and even peevish. Misunderstandings are bound to occur in college athletic relations, especially where undergraduates are in charge of negotiations. Usually, these mistakes are overlooked. In dealings with other institutions it is found that there is no disposition to magnify incidents, and Dartmouth might very conceivably expect that Tech would take the broader-minder attitude in the present case. Round table conference between the parties should settle intercollegiate difficulties.

The letter received by Dartmouth from Dr. Rowe, secretary of the Athletic Council at Technology, specifically acquitted Dartmouth of any charge of bad faith. The same letter concluded with the hope that the future might see a continuation of the friendly relations between the two institutions. Dartmouth regretted extremely the circumstances that brought about the misunderstanding, and very readily expressed that regret. And at that time M. I. T. seemed inclined to view the matter from a rational viewpoint.

What has brought about the change? What is it that prompts Tech now to say that "the advisory council and the undergraduate body feel there has been a distinct breach of faith?" Is not the public entitled to know the whole truth of the matter? If there has been a change of sentiment in Cambridge, should it not be made known to the thousands who read of the "break" in the papers and form an unfavorable opinion of Dartmouth's athletic ethics in consequence of the "breach of faith" charges?

The whole matter is inexplicable. Apparently there is some reason why Technology does not wish to make all the facts public, or the authorities there are acting in a childish and unreasonable manner.

Yale to Have Graduate Team

If present plans are carried out, Yale will be represented not only by an undergraduate track team, but also by a graduate team. Charles Taft, the leader of this idea, is very much interested in the work. He hopes to see eventually graduate teams in all the big sports, and in most colleges. Last year the plan was a failure, but arrangements are already under way by which a graduate team will take part in the interclass team.

5000 Women Athletes in France

Five thousand women of France between the ages of fifteen and thirty are taking part in athletics in which men have figured mainly in the past. One hundred yards in 11 4-5s, and 1000 metres in 3m., 17 4-5s., stand as a joint British and French feminine record. Miss Lines of England and Mlle. Blead of France covering the respective distances in time that many men would be glad to equal. Mlle. Therese Brule of the French Sporting Federation went over the 110-metres hurdles in 17 1-5s., just 2 1-5s. slower than the world's record.

Football Medal to Lafayette

Lafayette College, because of its undefeated football team, has received the award of the Eastern football championship trophy for the season of 1921 from the Veteran Athletes of Philadelphia. This medal is presented annually. The award went to Boston College in 1920.

Athletic Co-Eds Duck College Men in Pool

When the Women's Athletic Association held their annual circus at the University of Kansas recently, they objected to the attendance of men. Five college men, however, disguised in women's clothing, stole into the festivities. The intruders were soon discovered and the women athletes attacked them, carried them to a swimmin pool near by, and threw them into the chilling waters.

Half an hour later the victims sneaked into their respective fraternity houses declaring that their escapade was worth the outcome. "Oh, those hula dancers," they added.—*Columbia Spectator*.

The jump will be 85 feet high and 165 feet long.

BROWN MAY HAVE STADIUM
CONSTRUCTED ON NEW PLAN

Waste Space Under Seats will be Utilized for
Students' Rooms

WILL SEAT 6000 PEOPLE

Brown may have a new stadium which will embody several innovations in stadium design. The plan is to have three floors of dormitories built under the seats in the space which is usually wasted in stadiums. The idea is to help the rooming situation and to increase the revenue from the stadium. The building will be constructed of reinforced concrete, and finished with waterproofed cement of a warm gray tone. Each section will seat 575 people, with enough sections to surround the field, probably ten or twelve.

In the space under the seats are three floors of dormitories. They would be arranged in suites, each suite consisting of a study, two bedrooms, closets, and storage space. The corridors of each floor would run clear around the building, connecting all the suites on each floor. Stairways would be constructed at intervals to avoid the necessity of a student going the entire length of the corridor to get into his room.

TALKS BY "GOLDEN RULE NASH"

Those who are looking forward to the three-day series of talks to be given by Arthur Nash, known in the middle west as "Golden Rule Nash," will be interested to hear of Mr. Nash's late labor success.

According to the copy of the *New York Tribune* dated January 3, Mr. Nash, whose suit and clothing plant is said to be the first American corporation to be operated on a wholly co-operative basis, has been able to raise the wages of his employees 10 per cent and reduce their number of working hours from 44 to 40 hours per week. Mr. Nash claims to conduct business strictly on the "do as you would be done by" principle. All employees of the corporation are stockholders in it and are carefully watched with an eye to advancement.

"Wallie" Ross of the T. C. A. expects that these talks, coming on January 15, 16, and 17, will have much of interest for Technology.

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
