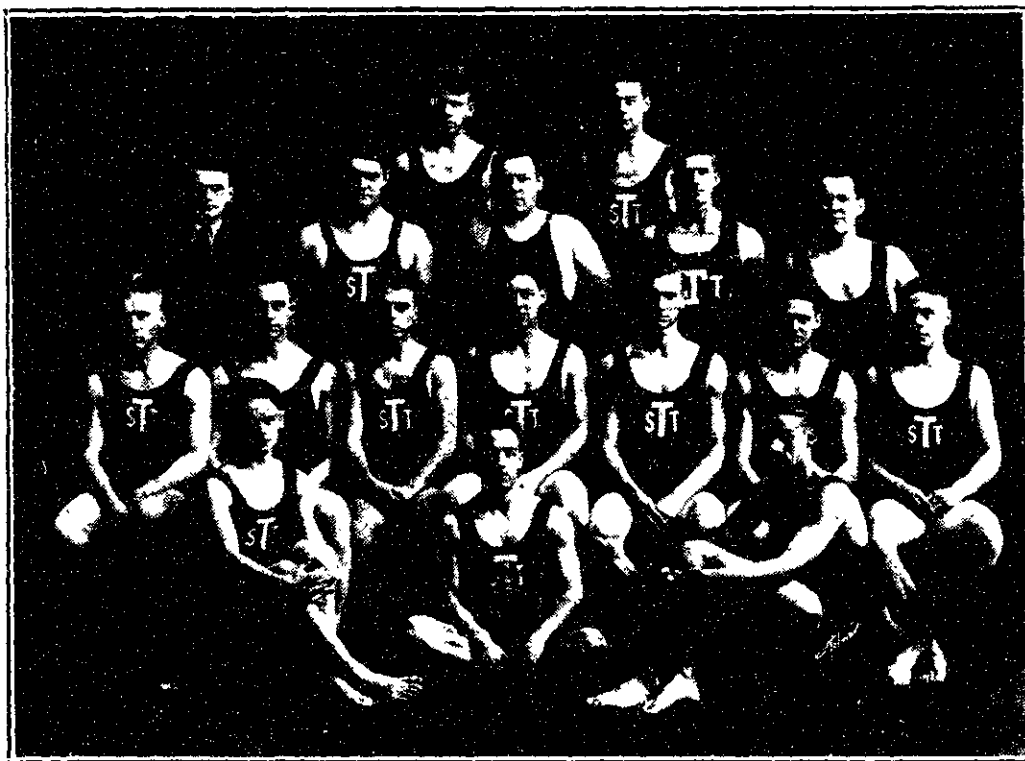

A short time ago an article appeared in a Boston paper to the effect that a number of Technology boxers were training outside the school. In like manner the men on the swimming team must be members of the Y. M. C. A. to get the necessary practice.

These expenses should be met by the team funds but the shortage in the athletic budgets created by the present inadequacies in the Student Tax makes this impossible. It would be much easier for the school to carry this load than for these individuals, and it would much better express the spirit the school should show to its teams. By increasing the Tax we relieve these men of this obligation that naturally should be ours.

INSTITUTE COMMITTEE PASSES RESOLUTIONS

Presents Former Dean Burton
with Ford Sedan

SOCIETIES RE-INSTATED

The donation of a Ford Sedan and a mahogany table with a silver plate to Alfred E. Burton, former Dean of Technology, from funds voluntarily contributed by the student body last spring, was formally approved at a regular meeting of the Institute Committee, held late yesterday afternoon.

The funds given by the students out of appreciation of the work of Dean Burton were turned over to the Institute Committee to be dispensed at its discretion. It was originally planned to present the former Dean with a library set, but since he preferred a Ford Sedan, the gift already mentioned was sent.

At the suggestion of D. R. Linsley '22, it was decided to draw up a series of resolutions expressing the regret of the Institute Committee at the death of F. M. Foster '25, formerly a member of the undergraduate governing body.

Members Receive Additional Points

Following the work of a subcommittee appointed last fall to decide rating in points to be given to members of the executive committee, it was decided that an additional points be given to members of the Institute Committee serving on this body. This will go into effect next fall. In the meantime, the points given under the old system to C. C. Taylor, president of the Class of 1923, have been commuted.

The Mechanical and Electrical Engineering Societies were reinstated upon the Institute Committee; both organizations had lost their seats because of failure of their representatives.

STUDENTS VOTE FOR ECONOMIC CONFERENCE

500 Aot on Resolutions to Be
Sent to Mr. Hughes

OTHER COLLEGES MEET

About 500 students from the various colleges and universities of Greater Boston gathered in Faneuil Hall and unanimously voted a resolution declaring "that the conference of the powers, including Russia and Germany, which shall deal with the economic consequences of the peace, as arranged at Cannes, is the logical sequel of the Washington armament conference, and that such a conference is fundamental to the civilization of Europe and to the prosperity of the United States.

By a vote it was also declared that "a discussion on the cancellation of debts should in no way act as an impediment to the United States being represented at the Genoa conference."

A resolution asking the United States to immediately join the league of nations was rejected and a motion asking the United States government to recognize the Soviet government was set aside. The meeting decided to ask both houses of Congress for legislation to suspend Austria's debt to the United States for at least 20 years. The chairman was instructed to forward the resolutions to Mr. Hughes.

The meeting was called together by the National Student's Committee on Limitation of Armaments and was held in conjunction with similar meetings which are being held in other college centers through the country. Robert Wormser of the Harvard Liberal Club presided. The speakers who addressed the meeting were Maurice Casenave, financial advisor to the French delegation to the Washington Conference; Giuseppe Gentile, economic advisor to the Italian delegation, and Dr. John Mez, correspondent of the Frankfurter Zeitung. All spoke on the economic conditions in Europe.

BEAVERS FACE LORD JEFF IN BOSTON "Y"

Tankmen's First Home Meet
Tomorrow—Damon Will
Star for Enemy

ENGINEERS BETTER BALANCED

The Beaver swimmers will face Amherst tomorrow night in the Boston "Y" in their first home meet of the season. Captain Stow Damon of the visitors is the holder of the Intercollegiate and New England records in the 50-yard dash and will make it warm for the local matadors. The Lord Jeff delegation, however, is not as well balanced as the Beavers. Where the visitors will leap ahead on Damon's first places the Engineers will go steadily ahead with their quota of seconds and thirds and several first places.

Nip Marsh in the 100-yard dash will be able to stick close to Damon, although the Beaver is not expected to win the event. J. J. Evans of the Lord Jeffs is backing his leader up in both of his events, the 50 and the 100.

Captain Stew Damon of the Lord Jeffs is bringing his delegation here tomorrow for the clash with the Beaver tankmen. The battle will begin at 8 o'clock at the Boston "Y." Damon is the National Intercollegiate 50-yard champion and will give the Engineers all they want in that event and the 100, besides being anchor in the relay. J. J. Evans, an Amherst freshman, is reported as backing up his leader well and will be a contender for second honors in his events.

To offset this, the Engineers are calculated to lead in the plunge, Amherst's weakest event. John Henninger and Stalbird have both given good accounts of themselves and the Beavers should tally heavily against Henry, the strongest Amherst entry. The 100-yard breast stroke promises to be another point winner for Technology. Bill Stewart has shown speed in this event. Gerald Nauman, a native son, is an experienced swimmer but has never before competed for the Beavers.

To Inaugurate Back Stroke

Captain Bert Weber and S. F. Brown will represent Technology in the 50-yard back stroke. Little can be predicted as to this event as it is new to Eastern swimming circles. Both the breast and back strokes have but recently been incorporated in the order of events and this is the first year that they have been swum.

Bert Weber and Brown are again paired together in the 220-yard swim. They will have keen competition here as Parker of Amherst is an expert. In the dives Bob Purinton will match his skill against Bristol, the Amherst

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NORTHROP TALKS TO FACULTY CLUB ON ENGINEERING FEAT

Mr. Northrop's subject was the Caribou hydro-electric development on the Feather River in California. It will probably be repeated before the Electrical Engineering Society in the near future.
