The work of the men Monday showed possibilities to be developed but even allowing for the great handicap of the unfavorable weather they did not approach that of the quarter-milers last week.

Quartet Tentatively Chosen
A strong icy wind cut up the runners as they took their tryouts and made fast times an impossibility but Kanaly hopes that the day of the final trials will be more favorable. Charlie Snow of last year's two-mile quartet turned in the fastest time with Jack Hennessey, Art Flanders, both also of the '21 relay, Tommy Gill, and Poore close behind. Holt, Robertson, and Vadner, all of the cross-country team, were next in order but considerably behind the first four fliers. The Syracuse relay has not received as much press agent boosting but is looked upon by Kanaly as a real foe.
