The Intercollegiate champions are favored to win though by a good deal closer shave than Mr. John Harvard will find comfortable.

Captain Hugh Nickle's team proved in the Dalhousie and Mass. Aggies games that it can put up a whirlwind brand of hockey and if there's one game the six Engineers want to win it's the one tonight. Last year Harvard defeated the Institute 8-2 after a 2-2 tie for the greater part of two periods. The Crimson sextet seems slightly weaker than the combination last winter while there is no doubt that the Beavers are much faster.

Harvard Forwards' Hands Full

The University will have its hands full trying to penetrate Neil MacNeil, Neville DuVernet, the defense men, and Hugh Nickle in goal. Johnny Martin and Sonny Baker did the scoring last week when Harvard shutout Princeton, 3-0, and they are likely to show the most skill this evening trying to evade MacNeil and DuVernet. Captain George Owen, though playing left defense, is probably the most serious threat to the Beavers but he will have a real job getting the rubber past Nickle.

Flint Taylor, Joe Dalton and Herb Hayden are the three Engineer forwards who have been improving so rapidly. Harvard will find the trio a hard bunch to outskate and may be surprised by the passing Coach Ed Powers has developed. Ted Crosby, right defense, and Dick Higgins, in the net will help Captain Owen keep the Engineer forwards at a safe distance.

N. E. A. A. U. CHAMP IN "Y" LINEUP

The Beaver wrestlers journey to Springfield tomorrow to meet the Springfield Y. M. C. A. College matmen. Last year the secretaries triumphed to the tune of 14-11, and they claim a better team this year. For the Institute, Tommy Barnard is scheduled to fill the 115-pound berth, while his opponent is Pasho, a new man, who is rated as pretty good by the "Y" coach. Anderson, who figured rather prominently in the 115-pound event last year for the "Y," is now coaching the team. Anderson held the 115-pound N. E. A. A. U. championship two years ago.

Harry Bruner of the Beaver aggregation meets an experienced opponent in Staley, who has wrestled in the 125-pound class for the past two seasons. V. J. Weatherley of the Technology matmen will represent the Institute in the 135-pound bout. Zimmerman, who wrestled in that weight in the meet with Technology last year, will be his opponent.

Buttler vs. Mazeski in 145-pound Event

Very little worry will be given to the outcome of the 145-pound contest. According to Springfield authorities, their candidate, Mazeski, is expected to give Buttler a hard run for his money. Captain Buttler will officiate for the Institute in this capacity. Hereford will uphold the 158-pound position for the Engineers. He started out the wrestling season well in winning his first bout by a fall. For opposition Hereford will meet Whitney, of the Secretaries, a veteran for the past two seasons in the 145-pound class, and is now figuring on obtaining the 158-pound crown.

Tommy Thomas of the Beavers and Simon of the Springfield squad are slated for the combat in the 175-pound class. Simon covered the berth for the "Y" team last year. In the unlimited class affair Heath will again fill the position as the Beavers' representative. Captain Mooney of the Springfield team, who wrestled in the heavyweight class last year, will be Heath's opponent. Mooney holds the N. E. A. A. U. 175-pound title for 1920.

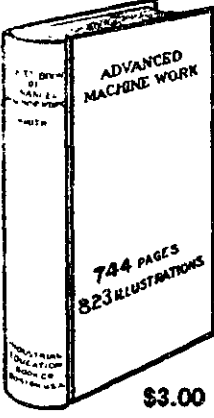
