FROSH TANKMEN LOSE TO BROOKLINE HIGH

Oxnard Captures Both Dashes—Beavers Take Plunge

RELAY FURNISHES THRILL

The Beaver freshman swimmers were again submerged. Brookline High did it to the tune of 33-17.

The score, however, does not show the hard-fought battle put up by Captain Ban Oxnard of the Engineer yearlings. He was high point winner, garnering two firsts. He led Brookline High's array of dash men in both the 50- and 100-yard events. In the relay, Price, third man for the Beavers, handicapped Captain Ban with a distance of 8 yards. But the frosh leader proved equal to the task and all but won the relay. The finish was so close and exciting that for a moment it seemed to the onlookers as if Brookline were nosed out by a small margin. The announcer soon disillusioned any doubt on the part of anyone by declaring Brookline the winner.

Baldwin Takes Plunge

In the plunge for distance, Baldwin of the Beavers had an easy time of it. He only had to do 56 feet to show his wriggling toes to the Brookline en-

trants, Bird and Simonds, who finished second and third, respectively.

McCardy and Dunham increased the High School's lead by annexing first and second place in the 220-yard swim. Their compatriots, Meeghan and Williams, did the same in the fancy dives.

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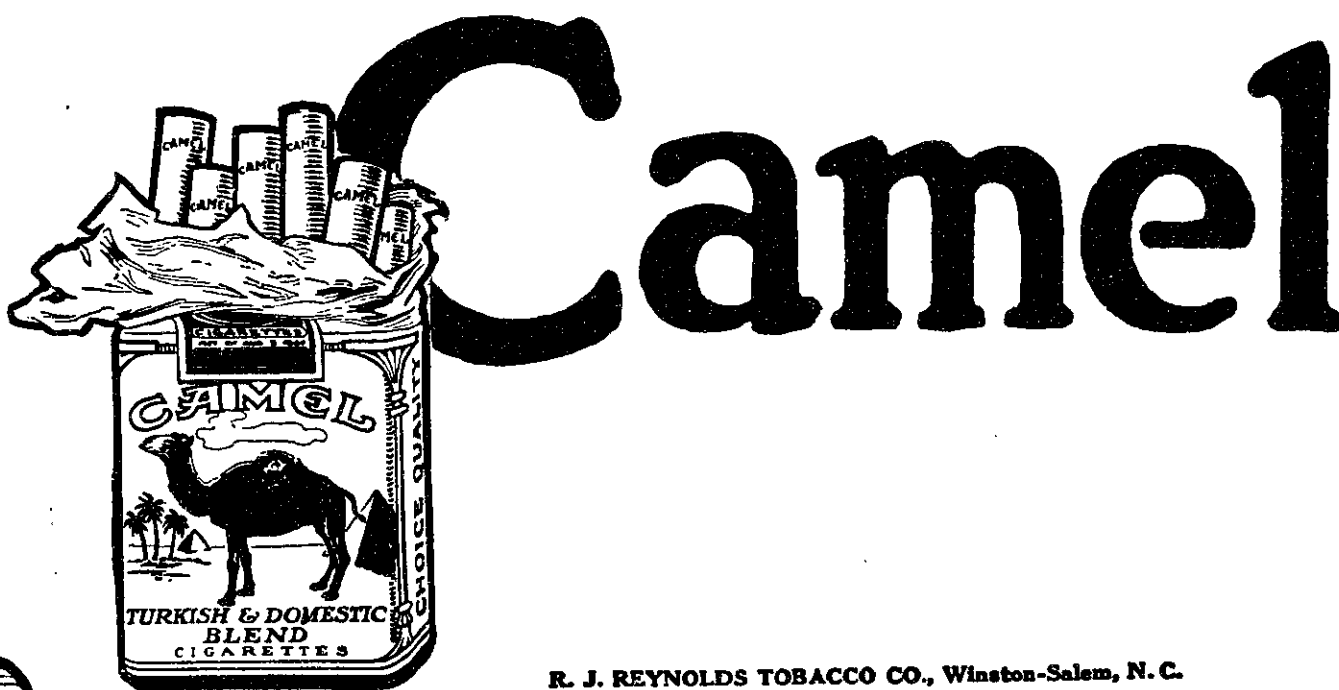
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
