SWIMMERS PREPARE FOR MEET WITH WEST POINT

**Squad Works to Perfect Form
—Time Trials This Week**

BEAVERS MEET YALE SOON

For the past week the Beaver swimmers have been working hard in preparation for the meet with West Point Saturday. The week following the Boston "Y" will be the scene of the biggest splash of the season, when the powerful Yale natators will journey here to meet the Beavers. Eli holds the Intercollegiate Championship, but the Institute has put a fighting team of unusual strength into the field and the lads from New Haven will have to earn every leaf of their laurels by the sweat of the brow.

Team Working on Form
Since the Amherst meet, Coach Sutherland has been trying chiefly to improve the form of his men and no time trials of importance have taken place. The swimming squad will, however, be put through a stiff workout before the West Point trip, and any changes necessary in the squad will be brought to light then.

Earl Palmer proved himself a strong 50-yard man, and so far as can be told at present will make his change from the 100-yard event a permanent one. Nip Marsh has been working on his stroke in the longer swim and will be even faster than when he swam against Stew Damon of Amherst.

Back Stroke Giving Trouble
The greatest of Technology's worries at present seems to be the back stroke, although neither this event nor the breast stroke will be swum against West Point. They will have a place in the lineup against Yale, however. Captain Bert Weber, who is at present taking care of the back stroke, is too tired after finishing his race in the 220 to give his best performance. Coach Alec is at work trying to develop another 220 man to take Bert's place. If he is successful Bert will change to the 100 from the 220 as well as swimming the back stroke. For the 220 S. F. Brown has ably seconded Captain Weber in every meet so far, but who else to enter in the event is a question, although Phil Robinson is showing promise.

Bob Purinton, aided by Mart Buerger, will continue to take care of the dives, while John Henninger, Jim Gallagher and Stal Stalbird are fighting for positions in the plunge, the strongest Beaver event.

Against Amherst, the Institute proved that it has a team that can not be ignored. With further coaching and reorganization which Alec Sutherland will furnish this week, it will be able to send a squad to West Point that will give the pride of the Army a run for their money.

Harvard Six Beats Beaver Skaters, 9-2

Technology Puckchasers Fall Before University in Annual Conflict

The Institute hockey team was defeated by Harvard University last Friday night, 9-2, in a very clean and fast game. Captain George Owen and the teamwork of the crimson forward line proved to be too stiff a combination for the Beaver skaters to conquer.

Hugh Nickle had a rather tough evening in the Engineer net, stopping 30 drives including a number of shots that most netmen wouldn't have had a chance of reaching. Neville DuVernet, Neil MacNeil and Herb Hayden put the kick in most of the Technology rallies, Hal Wilbur caged both scores and deserves a great deal of credit for his determined chasing of the puck. Coach Ed Power's outfit, though outclassed, played a clean hard game all the way through.

First Period Is Even
Fourteen minutes of the first period were scoreless and though Nickle was kept rather more busy than Dick Higgins, in the University goal, the sextets seemed to be evenly matched and forecasts predicting a hot battle looked accurate. MacNeil took the first shot of the fray, a long one with a nice lift and loads of speed which may have have samed to Higgins an unpleasant warning. He managed to stop it and George Owens brought the rubber Nickle-ward. His drive was followed up by Sonny Baker and Ted Crosby but Hugh came through without a nick. The crimson captain tried again, his shot bouncing off Neville DuVernet and then off the Institute goaltend.

After Higgins had foiled Joe Dalton and DuVernet, who had broken through the Harvard defense, Johnny Martin came down the center of the ice, eluded the Beaver defense men and counted one for the University. There was only a minute of the period left but it was enough for 15 seconds later George Walker oozed through on a similar play and made the score at the of the first session, 2-0, with the Engineers on the short end.

Beavers Stage Rally
The Institute staged a rally for the first half of the second period and on several occasions Harvard followers had good reason to applaud Dick Higgins' work. Flint Taylor took three shots which weren't really dangerous and then put everything he had in one (Continued on Page 4)
