TO INSTITUTE TEAM****Cardinal and Gray Victorious in
Slow Contest**

FINAL-SCORE STANDS 25-15

Technology's basketball five dribbled circles around the Amherst quintet Friday night in a loosely played game defeating the visitors 25 to 15. The game was marked by a lack of teamwork on both sides; Amherst had little to exhibit, and as a result offered small inducement to the home team to play fast basketball. Practically all of Amherst's 15 points were made on fouls, the first one being tallied at the start of the game on a technical called on Bernie Coleman.

Technology's first goal was dropped through by Dave Davidson, and was followed up by Gyp Blood's shot from a foul. Tillie Tonon was then put in to replace Dave, and before the end of the period Tonon got away with three neat shots from scrimmage and one from the circle, leaving the score at the end of the period 14 to 5 in favor of the Institute.

Visitors Score on Fouls

The second period proved slightly more profitable for the Amherst five. Walker caged four free tries in as many minutes, after which he was replaced by Captain Elliott. In addition to the fact that the visitors could not get their eyes on the basket, they had the added difficulty of getting around Cub Hubbard and Gyp Blood, Technology's crack defense men, and as a result, only four tallies were credited to Lord Jeff on floor shots.

WEST POINT WINS SWIMMING AND BOXING MEETS**CADETS WIN FROM
ENGINEER BOXERS****West Point Wins All Six
Bouts by Narrow
Margin****LINDSEY GOES EXTRA ROUND**

WEST POINT, N. Y. February 4—The strong West Point boxing team won every bout from the Technology fighters and held them scoreless, 6-0. Every bout was well contested, however, and all of the decisions were close. The Engineers started out well in every case but the Army boxers were in much better condition and were able to show aggressiveness in the end that Coach Boutellier's charges were unable to equal.

Al Lindsey and Dugan of the Academy went the only extra period bout of the afternoon in the 115 pound class. Both men were aggressive in the first three rounds and the judges were unable to agree on the decision. In the extra round Dugan's better condition told and he was awarded the decision after a hard fight.

Meister and Smith in Fast Bout

Meister and Bob Smith went a hard three rounds. Bob had a clear advantage over the Army 125 pounder in the first round but the last two told a different tale. Meister came through with some punches that the erstwhile K. O. artist was unable to stand up under and Bob weakened considerably in the last round, but was game to the end.

In the 135 pound class Harmony defeated Lew Phillips in one of the fastest contests of the afternoon. The Engineer displayed some of the best footwork that was seen in the meet. Harmony is one of the cleverest boxers on the West Point team but Phillips pushed him to the limit and the decision was the closest of the evening.

Moll-McInerney Decision Close

Captain Ed Moll of the Beavers and McInerney went three rounds of hard hitting in the 145 pound class. Ed is peculiarly adapted to infighting, which did not agree with Referee Forbs who continually separated the men and tried to make them box at a distance. Moll put up a good fight but the Army boxer was a shade more clever and secured the decision.

For a new man to the boxing game Frank Horgan put up an exceptionally game fight against Ascher, the Army 160 pound expert. Horgan has only been on the squad a week, but he pushed his more experienced opponent to the limit in every round. Frank weilds a wicked right and landed several that made Ascher stagger. On the whole, however, Ascher was the better boxer and was awarded the decision. With a little more training and experience Horgan shows promise of developing into one of the best boxers in the Institute.

Jo Scholtz Does Well

With a reputation of nursing sleep producers in either mit, Maglin of the Academy was not expected to have much difficulty with Jo Scholtz in the 175 pound class. Jo, however, pulled a surprise and managed to make the bout interesting for the Cadet. The two men proved to be fairly evenly matched in the first two rounds but, although Jo showed fight till the end in the last round, Maglin managed to land several that shook him up considerably and the decision was awarded to the Academy.
