N. L. Apollonio, a veteran of last year, is the best bet on the parallel although J. T. McCoy shapes up well.

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'25 ENGINEERS GET SEVERE DUCKING FROM WORCESTER

Yearlings Get Only One First in Prep School Swimming Tank

BALDWIN SCORES FOR BEAVERS

The freshman natators went under, Worcester Academy swimming off with the large end of the score 42 to 11. The yearlings' points were made up of one first, one second and three thirds. Everything else was copped by the prep boys. All their men contributed to the fat total of 42 which they flaunted in the faces of the cubs.

Baldwin, the Beaver star plunger, was able to grab the only first for his team. He only had to cut the water a distance of 55½ feet to win the event. However, two of the Academy's team just about canceled his good work by taking second and third. The best Captain Oxnard was able to do was to take second in the 200-yard swim after Hopkins of the prep school barely nosed him out at the finishing line.

Relay Race Close

The relay race was lost by the '25 aggregation after an exciting exhibition of good swimming. Rivas, pitted against the yearling lead-off man Foale, netted a few yards gain which his successors maintained until the anchor men, Captain Oxnard and Starrett jumped in to do their bit. For a time it looked as though Starrett's lead would give him an easy finish, but the engineer captain made a great effort to nab the race. The distance separating the two swimmers was too much, however, and Captain Ben could only make a small gain.

In the short dashes Worcester had all the stuff and placed first and second in both the 50 and 100-yard events. Carver of the Academy carved our a victory in the fancy dives. He did not have much competition as the Beavers are weak here. His mate, Serralis, registered after him.

Monie and Suttner kept the Hillmen in the lead rather easily, however, and Elmer Sanborn and Charlie Snow, running for Technology, never came within striking distance.

The Engineer freshmen turned in a mighty fair showing against Dartmouth, Holy Cross and Boston College, in one of the most interesting combats of the evening. Dartmouth came up from behind and beat the Beaver cubs to the worsted by ten yards and Holy Cross came in third. Charley Boardman started for the Institute and was passed by the entire field. Al Makepeace made up some of the lost ground and Glen Bateman, the flash from Australia, pulled the Beaver colors up to the second position. George Leness ran a peach of a race but couldn't catch Blodgett, the flying freshman from Hanover.

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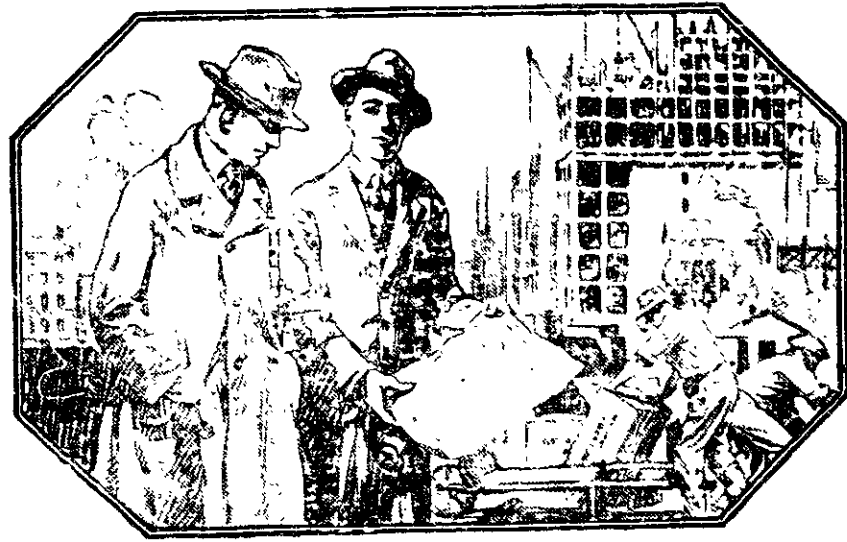
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
