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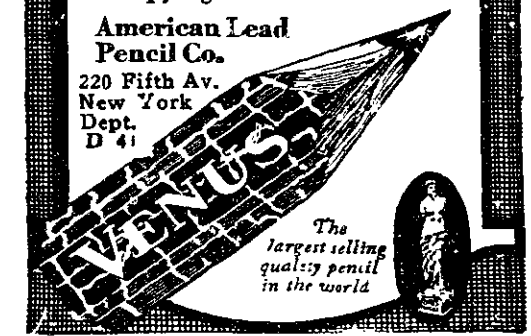
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TEN RIFLES ARRIVE FOR GALLERY TEAM

The ten rifles, ordered by the Military Science department for the gallery rifle team, have arrived. They are of the new Winchester type, single shot, and brand new.

The rifle range is to be open daily except Saturday and Sunday, from 1 until 3 o'clock, in addition to the time it is open for the Institute riflemen. All men who have signed up for the team are to come as soon as possible and try out. At present it is proposed to have all men fire in standing, sitting, kneeling, and prone positions, in addition to their sighting shots.

The R. O. T. C. rifle team is to be picked from the men making the best scores, and competition is open to all men in that department. The range is now ready and competition will start at once.

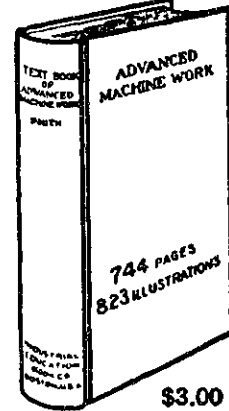
LATIN AMERICANS WILL HOLD FIRST OF LECTURES SERIES
