PENNSYLVANIA CO-EDS
WILL START OWN PAPER

Resent Attitude of Present College
Daily

Co-eds of the University of Pennsylvania are thinking of starting a newspaper—a real daily, with a city editor, news editor, cockroaches, editorial writers, foreign correspondents and libel suits.

There appeared on the bulletin boards of various buildings on the campus notices asking for suggestions as to a name for the paper, an editorial policy and for nominations of a managing editor, advertising manager

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and so on. Only Seniors and Juniors, the poster said, will be eligible for such offices.

The reason for this near-venture is doubtless the general dissatisfaction among co-eds with the Pennsylvanian, the editors of which, for some reason, have never been cheerful about the co-educational aspects of the University.

OHIO HEATED OVER CO-EDS

In the January number of the Pictorial Review two prominent American women had much to say on "The Deterioration of Our Young Womanhood." To further the argument, the editor wrote to several co-educational institutions, asking for contributions presenting the co-ed's point of view. A representative co-ed of Ohio gathered current opinions and answered with startling frankness, yet defending her point of view. Her article appeared in the college paper, and so shocked some of the school of conservatives that one organization telegraphed the Pictorial Review, pleading that the article not be published, and one young man was so moved that he took up the argument in favor of the maligned co-eds.

Women Organize Rifle Team

Northwestern University has organized a Girls' Rifle Battalion composed of 150 members. Similar organizations exist at several other colleges. Northwestern picks her team from the woman's unit of the R. O. T. C., selecting those making the percentage in competitive firing. Meets are being arranged with other schools.

HUNTINGTON SCHOOL OUTSWIMS

Coach Frank Kanaly's freshman track team was outclassed Saturday by Worcester Academy in the first dual meet of the season. The score was 37 to 26.

The meet was started by the shot put and the high jump, and in these two events the freshmen did very well, gathering in 13 points to their opponents 5. But from then on, things seemed to be in favor of the Academy men, for they won the 40-yard dash, mile, half-mile, 440-yard run and the 45-yard high hurdles in rapid succession.

Coach Kanaly says that the open track campaign will offer an opportunity for revenge next spring. Worcester will then come here and meet the same array of opponents who are planning to reverse the defeat administered them. The meet was held on a 120-yard board track outside in a cold, drizzling rain. Poor times were made because of the damp cold.

Technology Cubs Lose Close Meet by Single
Point Margin Saturday

DRAW IN 175 POUND CLASS

The Worcester Academy wrestling team barely conquered the Institute freshman, 10-9, at Worcester Saturday afternoon. The meet was in doubt until the final minute and the academy lade were finished with all the heaving they could well handle. This is the second time that Coach Cyclone Burns' cubs came within an ace of winning, the match with Andover also being very close.

Ted Coyle won his match in the 115 pound class over Whidden, of Worcester, in a rather easy fashion. Brigham, the Academy's 125 pounder, has a top-notch reputation but he had all he could do to pin George MacDuff's shoulders to the mat. Morris Cohon, Engineer entry in the 135 pound brawl, came through with a decision, trimming Phelps. Sargisson performed for the prep school against Charles Bowles and in spite of the fact that he is rated as one of the best schoolboy wrestlers at his weight barely conquers the Institute representative.

Fred Greer and Cobb fought the entire nine minutes and two extra periods and still the judges were unable to award the decision. Art Sheppard, of Technology '25, defeated Preston in the 158 pound event.

LOWELL INSTITUTE COPIED

The Carnegie Institute of Technology has recently offered an extension course which is modelled after our own Lowell Institute. They have especially offered courses in mining engineering for men who have had some practical experience and only a common school education. One of the recent additions to the Carnegie Institute is an underground tunnel arranged as a mine thus giving the men actual opportunity to study and operate the machinery used in mining under ideal conditions. The co-operation with the U. S. Bureau of Mines work at Pittsburg is a feature of the Carnegie Institute.

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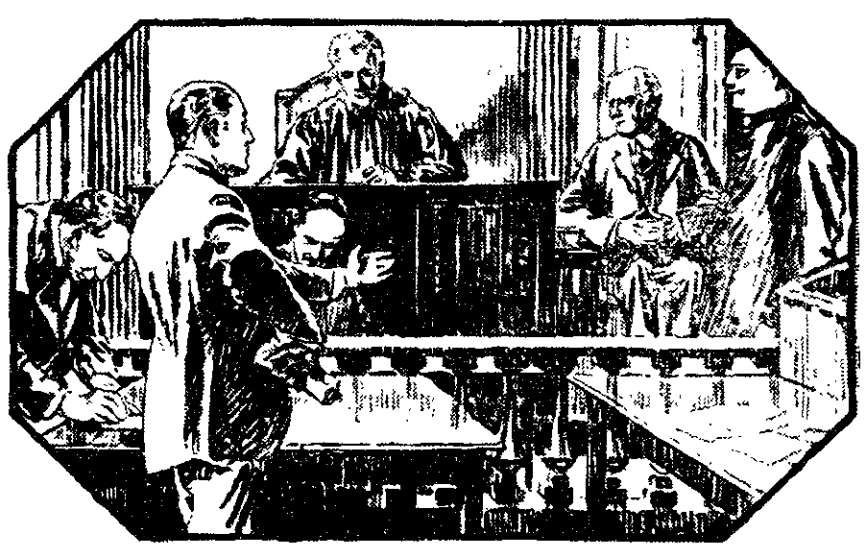
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
